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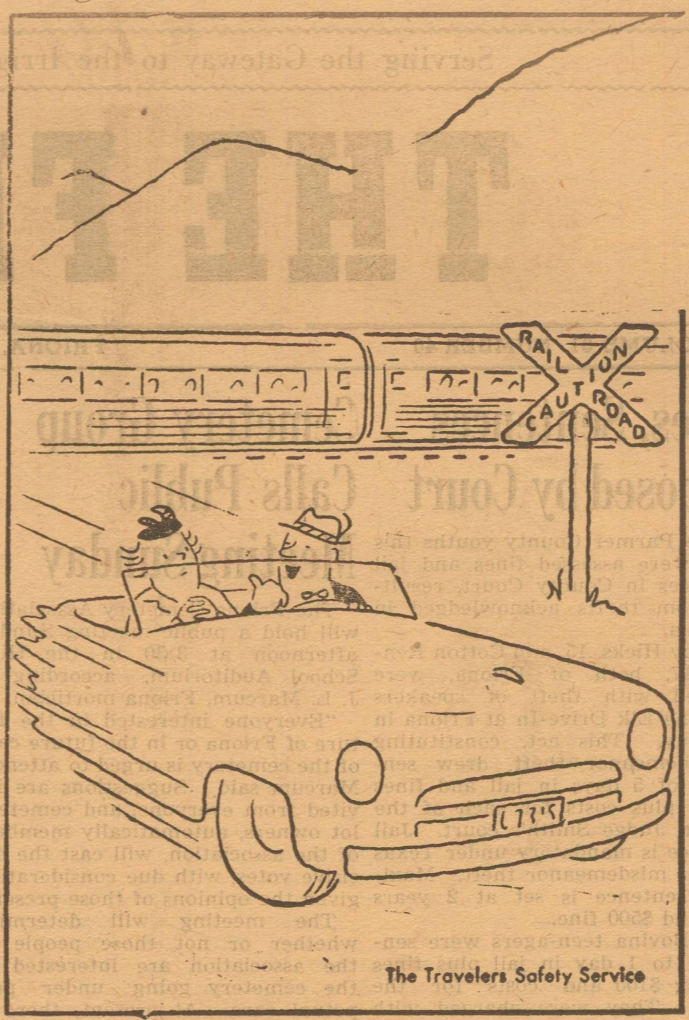

## Monday Morning Musings

Dear Parent,

This letter is being written to those of you who have been worried about whether Johnnie has learned to read, when Brother—your Johnnie has progressed much farther than that!

He evidently has grown out of your knowledge in too many instances; for while you are still coddling your "child," that same "child" is bordering on juvenile delinquency, drinking with the gang, burning rubber on local pavements, and even in some instances racing that car UPON the local sidewalks in the night hours endangering both person and property. And petty thieving (some not so petty) has entered into the picture, also.

These are not mythical allusions. They are practices in which most everyone but the parents could call the names!

The local situation is at a serious stage.

Out-of-town law enforcement officers even are taking note of the "Friona" sculduggery.

For the sake of safety for your life and mine, for our families' lives, for the sake of common decency and self-respect, let's again take stock; it may some day be too late. Let's look close to home firesides and apply corrective methods when and where they will do the most good, NOW, before penal institutions have to do it for us in a future and sadder time.

To date, responsibility for the out-of-hand youth has been evaded by two prominent concepts. (1) The youths know that the trend is to cry "delinquent parents," and they thus shrug off responsibility of their acts, saying "Pop should 'a done better by me. He'll get the blame, not me!" And then there's the parent viewpoint: (2) "MY Johnnie wouldn't do that. If he did, he didn't realize what he was doing. Why So and So's boy did much worse, or as bad, anyway."

Let's blow the lid clear off, friends, and admit there are both delinquent parents and delinquent teen-agers, and there's no salvation in blaming the other fellow. We gotta clean our own house, pronto.

We hope individual attention can be given each case before the state laws enter in. It

is not too late to correct the Parmer situation in the individual homes in a very personal manner. Maybe in your home some family understanding would get the job done. Maybe in another home the rod is needed! And some family prayers no doubt would be a drastic change in other homes.

Huntsville needs no assistance from Parmer County in increasing the population at that penal center. Let's see that our boys stay home, as honorable young men, not delinquent Johnnies!

### Predictions of things to come:

Better get set for some decisive thinking and action on the segregation issue locally, in our schools and all local institutions. The problem is going to be brought right to our doorsteps and into our homes if the colored factions get their way. And for the first time, Communist-inspired organizations will reach their tentacles into a clean and wholesome West Texas town. Friona has been earmarked for some rugged tests.

### In a brighter vein:

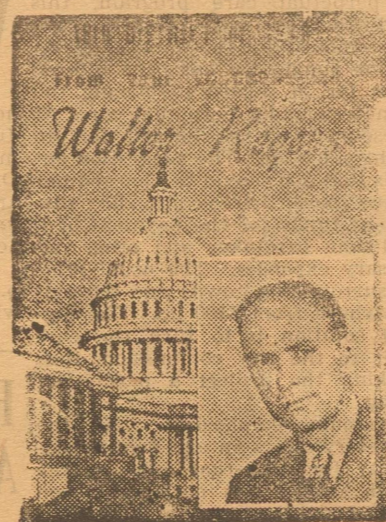

To the People of the 18th District: FOREIGN RELATIONS

The Senate has just passed the President's foreign aid program by a vote of 59 to 18. This calls for 3.4 billion dollars in new money to supplement the present unspent funds in the foreign aid program. I have been told from several sources that these unspent funds are in the amount of several billion dollars. The estimates vary from 2 billion to 12 billion. This is a wide variance. The reason for the variance lies in the fact that it is very difficult to get the entire story on a subject from a bureau. You do not receive false information, but you receive only such information as will barely answer the question that you ask. This procedure is not very enlightening. Unless you know how to ask questions, you will end up with no information at all. In any event, it presently appears that the 3.4 billion dollars in new money means that the foreign aid program will have available to it somewhere between 12 and 15 billion dollars. Part of this has been obligated, part has not.

While studying this foreign aid situation recently, I came across an article written by a prominent Italian journalist, which was originally entitled, "The Americans and Us." Actually the article undertook to explain the resentment that many Europeans have for America. It was an excellent piece of work, and I wish I could print it in full. He points up that the many claims that Americans have on the gratitude of Europeans are obscured by one incurable defect in the Americans. That defect is the craze in Americans to improve foreigners, to make them winder to each other, juster, richer and happier. He points out that good faith and honest intentions are such rare commodities on the European market that Europeans scarcely expect to find them anywhere else. He further comments that the United States as a victor in a war which was declared by Italy, asked for no colonies and no commercial servitudes, but on the contrary, accepted further taxation in order to aid the defeated. He says that the real trouble is: "The great inexplicable crime of the Americans is that they really are better than the Europeans." (Remember this is an Italian talking; not an American.) The article is very soul searching, and I repeat I wish I could make it available in full to all of you.

Concerning our foreign problems, it must be remembered that we also have the immigration problem, which has been in the news a great deal recently. No doubt, there are many, many foreigners

AUSTIN. — Despite the big news about final passage of the huge tax bill, news about Bascom Giles stole the spotlight from the Legislature the past week.

This time events took quite a different turn.

The climax came when a 75-year-old, retired mail carrier, John Cass Adrian, was arrested and charged with attempting to extort \$800,000 from the former land commissioner.

Filing of the charge against Adrian was preceded by a series of events, all kept secret, dating back to February 1.

Giles reported receiving two letters, prior to the one Adrian is charged with mailing, in which the writer each time asked for \$5,100.

Travis County Sheriff T. O. Lang revealed that the first letter, received by Giles before he was indicted, threatened to expose documentary evidence unless \$5,100 was paid.

With this letter was a crude drawing. It directed Giles to a culvert south of Austin where he was to leave the money, wrapped in a burlap sack. He was to drop the money at 4 p. m. on February 4. Included was a promise to return the money in 30 days—after using it "to pull a deal on the border" that would net \$100,000.

As Giles was out of town, he did not receive the first letter in time to act.

When the second letter arrived, dated February 9, it directed Giles to leave the money in the culvert by 4:30 p. m., February 11, or "the evidence could not be bought at any price."

A trap was set. Giles drove to

the drop site and left \$70 in a burlap sack, as deputies watched the area. No one stopped to pick up the sack. But a man later identified as Adrian drove by. After 36 hours of waiting, Giles returned to the culvert and picked up the money.

A third letter then came. It was dated February 11. It advised Giles that the writer was aware of the trap. It read, "All three of us was watching you with field glasses when you placed the law on both sides of the culvert..."

This letter directed Giles to prepare \$800,000 in \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills for delivery at a place and time to be designated in a future letter. But the promised instructions were never received.

When arrested, Adrian flatly denied knowing anything about the extortion attempt. He was released after posting a \$1,500 bond. Trial was set for June 13.

### More Taxes Coming

Jefferson Davis' birthday was celebrated by the Legislature. The solons handed Governor Shivers a tax bill! It levied an additional \$49,000,000 per year. Thus ended another bitter tax battle.

As finally voted, the measure provides \$57,038,000 added revenue for general purposes during the next two years. Also \$1,069,000 additional for road work. Thus it furnishes the funds to unblock the \$56,000,000 new money requirements of the \$1,525,000,000 appropriations bill already passed.

It's the biggest take was from beer. And a bitter-end fight by beer partisans nearly wrecked the measure in its final stages. Their argument was based on the fact

that conferees dropped out of the bill the Senate's "token" \$2,000,000 levy on "dedicated" natural gas and an intangible assets tax on gas pipelines.

On final passage the tax bill cleared the house only by a 72 to 67 vote; and the Senate by a scarce 18 to 13 margin.

Included in the tax bill was a one-cent increase in the present four-cent gasoline tax; a one-cent increase in the present four-cent cigarette tax; and an increase of \$2.30 per barrel, or six mills per bottle, on beer.

Senators voted a \$3.30 per barrel beer increase while Representatives favored small increases in beer and wine dealers' license fees.

Dropped on the final round were the House taxes on cigars, tobacco, trading stamps, and an increase in the natural gas production tax.

Rejected were numerous Senate proposals for gross receipts levies on manufacturers, hotels, motels, department stores, metals and chemical industries.

A \$6,500,000 cushion was given the general revenue fund for the next two years. This permitted passage of several small appropriation bills for new courts; for putting state employees under federal social security; another \$475,000 for legislative expenses; and grants to state agencies for further investigation of the Land Office and Veterans' Land Board affairs.

### Different Money Problems

An entirely different money problem faced the State Board of Education.

Where to find eligible securities in which to invest a cash surplus of \$12,060,095 of its permanent fund was this board's problem.

### Spending Bills

Wrapped up near the close of the session was Sen. George Moffett's bill appropriating \$7,000,000 for the construction of a new state courts building and a state office building in Austin.

It also provides \$500,000 for repairing and air-conditioning the Capitol; and \$500,000 for operation of the new State Building Commission.

All the money comes from the surplus of the Confederate Pension Fund, as authorized by a constitu-

that certainly as Christians, we would like to be of some assistance to them. However, we must face reality and appreciate the fact that the population recently passed the 165 million mark; that the United States is growing no larger in size. Every time a person is born or a new immigrant enters the country, the size of the country shrinks to that extent. This simply means

that Americans are reproducing themselves at a rate much faster than was anticipated even five years ago. It would seem to me that it would be much better if people who live in other countries would put their shoulder to the wheel to correct their own governments and try to bring to their own countries the things that we in America have. A much better balance on a world scale could be maintained.

THE PUBLIC DEBT

It is anticipated that the Admin-

istration will ask for a new ceiling on the public debt. It presently stands at around 277 billion dollars, which is a figure that is among the all-time highs in the public debt of this country. You will recall that Congress authorized an increase in the public debt authority to 281 billion on a temporary basis. (Incidentally, I voted against that increased authority.) The debt will recede a few billion when corporation taxes come in, but will increase thereafter for several months. The Administration no doubt feels that

they will need additional authority to borrow more money. Very little has been said recently about the public debt, probably because it has been increased rather than reduced, as the American people were told it would be. The Administration will have to make out an excellent case if they get the authority to increase it.

NEVER A DULL MOMENT

Last Sunday I was at home trying to catch up on some of the chores around the house. I had

been trying to put up some awnings and almost fell off the ladder three times. At one point I had a screen in one hand, an awning in the other, one leg hooked over an upstairs window and the other foot on the ladder, when the ladder started slipping. I don't know what happened, but I lost no limbs and everything worked out all right, except I didn't get the awning up. I had just come into the house and was resting when the phone rang. It was a friend of mine wanting to ask about some of the legislation that was pending before one of my committees. Just as I got into a full explanation, Susan came to the door and advised me that the kitchen was on fire. I excused myself from the telephone, went to the kitchen and found the stove on fire. Susan was baking a cake and something inflammable had spilled in the oven and caught fire. It took me about ten minutes to get it put out and get back to the phone. My friend was very apologetic and said that perhaps he should let me go, but I told him that we had put out the fire and Susan was back in the cake-baking business.

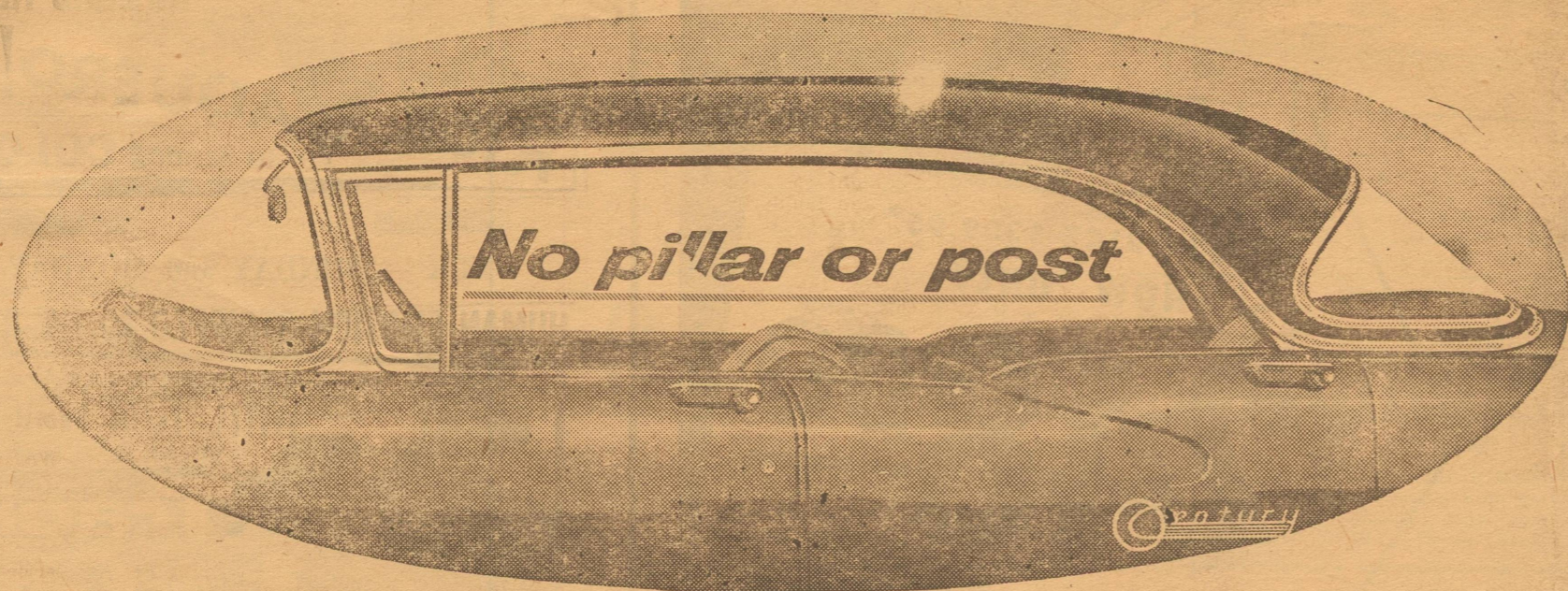

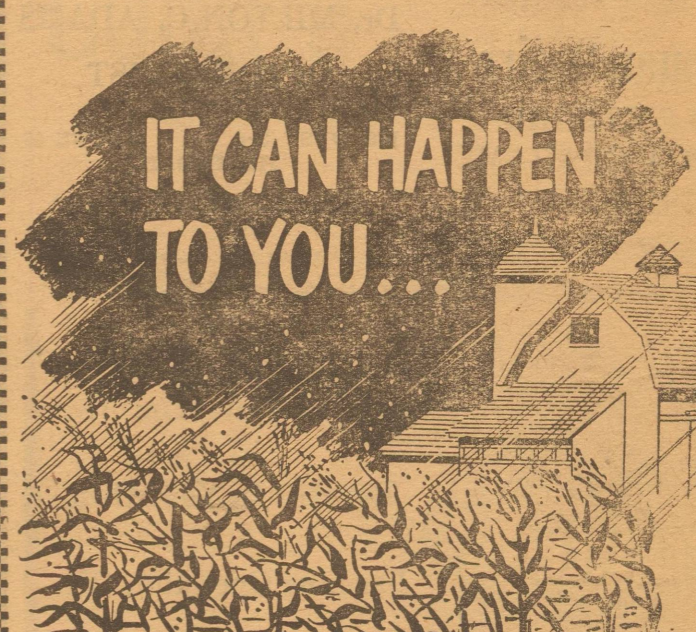
