Equivalent of a trainload of grain sorghum was unloaded in one day alone this week at a Friona elevator, signalling the peak of the bumper harvest here.

The Friona Wheat Growers received 90 carloads of grain Wednesday, a total of 9,006,060 lbs. for the single day.

Making the picture still more graphic, 653 trucks were handled during the day, 67 of these in and out in one hour.

However, traffic congestion at the elevator entrances was not as marked as in previous years, probably because of increased unloading facilities.

Elevators throughout the area are being filled this week, some waiting on rail cars before receiving any other grain, others dumping on the ground. The situation likely will remain tight for several days, inasmuch as only a few rail cars so far have been allotted to the area, certainly a small percentage of the several hundred carloads being brought to the elevators of the vicinity on the peak days.

Though the grain acreage and yield is considerably heavier this year, quality this week has been noticeably off, due to bad heads found in many of the fields ready for harvest since the freeze.

Practically all the grain is going into the loan at \$1.55 with market price several cents lower.

## Hereford Has Novel Hallowe'en Plan

This year on Hallowe'en the young people from many of the churches in Hereford will go forth to collect money for the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP), in a unique Hallowe'en "trick-or-treat" project for hungry children in Korea. Seventy-seven other towns and cities in Texas will also participate in the project.

Proceeds from these door-to-door canvasses will go primarily to distribute surplus powdered milk overseas. Each dollar received will distribute at least \$20 worth of government-donated milk; thus, 2,000 cups of milk can be "purchased" for just one dollar. In addition, Texas will raise enough money to purchase a half carload of powdered whole milk. This is not available as a surplus commodity and will cost upwards of \$6,000. It will be sent to Korean hospitals for advanced cases of tuberculosis. Distribution of surplus milk will be carried on throughout the Orient and Near East.

In discussing the project, John Gillies, Texas CROP director, stated, "Here is one way to bring back some sanity to Hallowe'en. Young people throughout Texas are learning that there's lots of real fun in service." The project resulted in more than \$32,000 during 1954.

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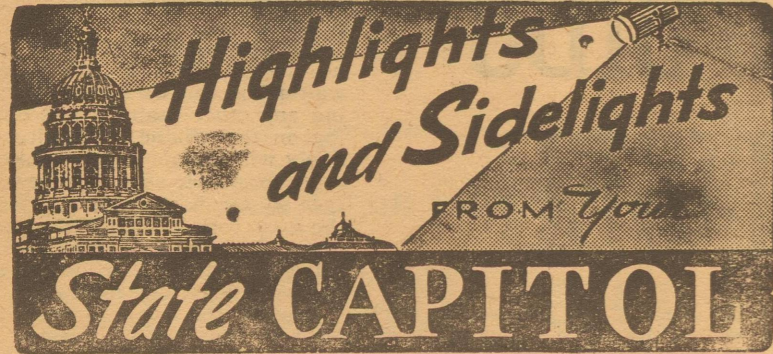

**AUSTIN.** — Speculation is running high that both Gov. Allan Shivers and U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson will have leading roles in the selection of the next Democratic presidential nominee.

Both have denied participation in any movement for a southern coalition to block re-nomination of Adlai Stevenson.

Johnson denies that he is heading up a coalition. Nomination is up to the delegates, he said, and he will support whoever wins out. And, he is not a "conservative," the senator stressed, but a "moderate."

Johnson, before his heart attack last summer, was considered a likely future contender for presidential nomination. Some believe, should he regain his health sufficiently, he again will enter the picture.

Gov. Shivers, at the conclusion of the Southern Governors conference, took a slightly different approach. He said he will vote for the presidential candidate "I think is best for the future of my country, and I hope the Democrats can produce that man." He also said he knew nothing of a drive for southern control.

**DAC vs DSE**

Texas has two Democratic organizations driving, highly competitive, under way. Selection of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey as a harmony-unity choice for Democratic state committee chairman so far has not reduced the competition.

Leaders of the Texas Democratic advisory council, set up by Speaker Sam Rayburn, say they plan to carry on organizational and money-raising efforts. This liberal group, organized to "carry on the functions of national committee chairman" during the years Wright Morrow was barred from the seat, has raised money the past four years for the national party. It now is busy organizing for control of presidential conventions next year.

On the other side of the picture is the Democratic state executive committee, conservative pro-Shivers organization. DSE is also carrying on organizational and money-raising efforts and has no intention of stopping, according to State Chairman George W. Sandlin.

A DAC meeting is scheduled for November 4, to select a leader to replace Navarro County Judge Jim Sewell.

Outside observers have suggested a connection between the resignation of Sewell from the liberal group and the ousting by conservatives of Wright Morrow. It is part of an over-all effort, they hint, to rid both groups of extreme left and right-wingers and merge Democratic party factions for a strong voice in national affairs.

**Third Shot Necessary**

Officials of the State Health Department have declared that three Salk polio shots are necessary for maximum protection against crippling effects of polio.

Children who have had two shots should take the third "booster shot" early in the Spring of 1956, the department urged.

In answer to a series of questions, the health department explained that it is not known at present exactly how long protection from three Salk shots will last. Experts now estimate protection at about two and one-half years. Perhaps after that time, booster shots again will be advised.

Persons who already have recovered from polio also should have the shots, the department said. There are three types of polio. Having a case of one type will not set up immunity against the other two. The Salk vaccine is aimed at giving immunity to all three types.

Only nine Texas children have been stricken with paralytic polio despite Salk inoculations. Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health commissioner, announced. The nine cases were among 473,830 vaccinated children.

**UT Entrance Exam Approved**

Beginning next fall the University of Texas will admit students on the basis of aptitude test scores.

Tests are to be given probably three times a year, without cost to the applicant, at centers throughout the state.

Rapidly increasing enrollment necessitated tests to eliminate students who will be unsuccessful, the board of regents stated.

**Anti-Crime Strategy Outlined**

A multi-fold educational program to reduce crime in Texas was proposed at an Austin conference of three law enforcement groups.

Suggestions included (1) greater publicity on the cost of crime, (2) establishment of a four-year college course in criminology, and (3) education of youngsters by a touring "crimobile" equipped with latest detection devices.

Participants were the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation, the Attorney General's Citizens Committee on Law Enforcement and the State Law Enforcement Advisory Council.

**Booby Prize Stolen**

Last year Austin received the "booby prize" in the Safe Driving Day contest.

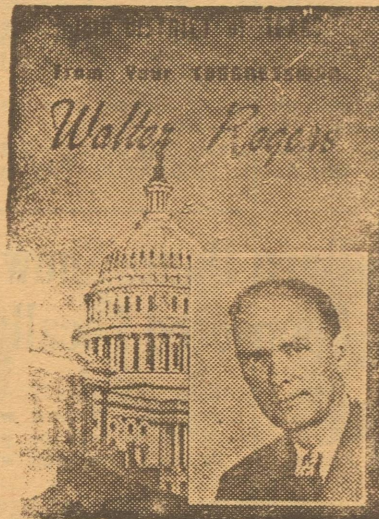
Day contest. Award was a dented fender which was displayed—but not proudly—on the city hall lawn.

Theft of the "prize" was discovered last week when preliminary work began on the upcoming S-D Day. Nobody knows who took it, or when. "We never were too happy about getting that thing in the first place," said Captain Bob Miles of the Austin Police department. "We didn't keep up with it very closely."

Bruck has urged. Even earlier mailing for personnel in Japan, Korea and the Pacific was suggested. . . . Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton said future veterans land inquiries will be hindered by complete overturn of the investigating committee. ## Washington Views:



To the People of the 18th District:

**The United States in Europe**

A sizeable group of Europeans looks upon Americans in much the same respect as many Easterners look upon Texans. They think that all have a lot of money just because they come from the other side. Another group, well in evidence, takes the view that Americans have no goal in life, other than to get as many dollars together as possible. This group feels this applies to all Americans and that, therefore, the United States does not know how to enjoy life just for the sake of living. There is, of course, the very substantial group who feels most friendly toward Americans and so obviously shows it. Some look with great suspicion on any foreigner from across the sea, but by and large, this is a marked minority.

The Scandinavian countries all enjoy a very high standard of living, with Swenden holding top rank. There are more automobiles and other luxury items that are not so much in evidence in other countries. The rural areas appear in excellent shape. Mostly smaller farms. Many women are seen wrkknkg in the fields. One Swedish woman says this explains why the farms are so well kept and in such excellent condition. Both animals and machinery are used. The horses are huge draft animals. The Swedes love their animals and take good care of them. Only the other day, while en route to a conference at the Swedish Shale Oil Company Plant, I saw an old woman driving a large horse to a small wheel wagon. Traffic had gotten congested and someone behind the

old woman blew a horn. This frightened the horse and made him skittish. A bus driver pulled his large bus to a stop, blocking traffic in all directions, got off the bus, went up to the horse and placed his hand on his bridle, patting the horse with the other hand. This reassured and quieted the horse and created a most grateful look on the face of the old woman. The driver said something to the hornblower in Swedish. I couldn't understand it, but I venture to say that the horn blower thinks twice before he scares another horse.

I mentioned that we were en route to the Shale Oil Company Plant for a conference. Sweden has no production of oil or gas other than that produced from shale or rock. This process was in an experimental stage when Germany invaded and occupied Norway and cut off Sweden from any possible oil imports. The Swedish government immediately ordered the building of the actual plant, although the research was far from finished. The plant was built and sufficient oil was produced from this rock and shale formation to answer emergency needs during the war. The end of the war brought expansion of this plant and the production of many by-products. The operation has been subsidized but the management tells me that present figures indicate its subsidy-free operation within the near future. It might be pointed out that the oil contents of this shale is only 6 per cent. The United States has a pilot plant in Colorado engaged in the same type of operation, but the oil content of our shale is many times that of the Swedish shale. The entire operation here has been the source of much helpful information in the development of the process and more is being contributed each day. Its development under the circumstances left little doubt as to the resourcefulness of the Swede and his self-sufficiency in a tight. They are a proud people, and rightfully so.

Finland is the most surprising of all the Scandinavian countries. An industrial exhibit, equal to anything any of us have ever seen, was in progress, and were escorted through and had many surprises on the way. These people manufacture everything from telephones to textiles. They are great boat builders, especially icebreakers. They have about everything you can imagine except television.

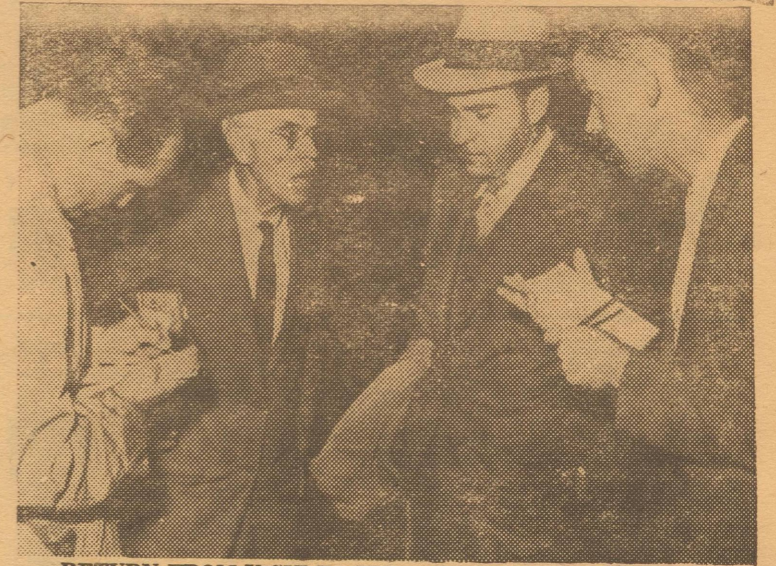
Friona received high winds and dust storms which did considerable damage to homes and businesses.

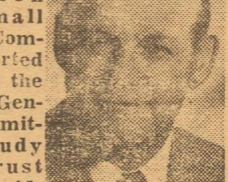

But the major oil stations outside the immediate neighborhood are given no price concessions. But in order to meet the competition of their own brand in some neighborhood, all the dealers of that brand in entire cities or counties are often forced to sell at a lower price with no adjustment in their wholesale price. Thus, the major oil company sells a huge volume of gasoline during this "good faith" price war, while only taking a cut in price on the gallonage pumped by a few of their dealers in a particular neighborhood.

Basically, testimony developed that in 1954 mortality of so-called independent service station operators reached all time high. 63 of 210,966 so-called independent retailers, 65,000 or 1/3 were forced out.

So-called independent operators have little, if any recourse, in as much as their life savings are usually tied up in the station which they hold on a six months, or year, lease which also contains short term cancellation clauses which can put them out on the street in jig time.

According to testimony, this was largely due to "all out wars" waged by major oil corporations in "good faith" defense against cut price competition from local brands.

It is expected that this matter of gasoline retailing will be gone into even more deeply. In fact, further testimony is expected to deal with tactics allegedly employed by major oil to force "independent dealers" to handle only certain brands of tires, batteries and accessories.

Often, it was charged, the cut price off brand stations they warred on were actually being supplied product by the majors.

But in waging their "war" the National Federation of Independent Business

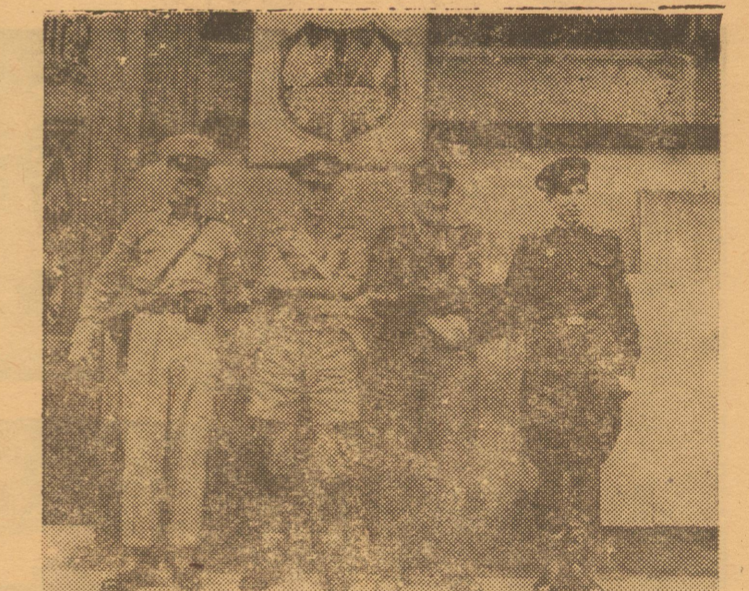

## Farm Bureau Report

Correction: Last week, in this column, we told you the minimum acreage cut for cotton on the county basis would be seven per cent. E. T. Ford, Commodity Chairman, tells us we should have said seven per cent would be the MAXIMUM CUT for any county. We are indeed happy to make this correction.

The preceding paragraph is an illustration of why farmers should look farther than newspaper articles for information regarding government programs and other things affecting their business of farming. Errors occur typographically by interpretation, misunderstanding or, in some cases by a distorted effort to make a political or personal point. The above was a misunderstanding.

It is heartening to note that more and more people are beginning to see the need for something more than a government market for farm commodities. Remarks of several political aspirants indicate that they, too, are seeing the necessity for marketing effort to produce channels of disposal rather than continuous political promises that end up in stored surpluses.

At the present time we feel inclined to compliment Robert G. Schrauner, Texas ASC Chairman of Dumas, on his fine handling of the job for which he is responsible. Every occasion your Farm Bureau Officials have had for conferring with him has been very satisfactory. He is sincere, straight forward and helpful in attitude. All advance information he has provided has testified of his honesty, an attribute that is peculiarly complimentary to one in his position in these times.

If your ginner is not aware of

your privilege of requesting re-examination of your cotton sample without showing the original classification, refer him to this office for the simple procedure. Farm Bureau tried to get this privilege for you last year, and succeeded for the 1955 crop. Use it.

The Land Fertility Bank farm program seemed to appeal to a large majority of the farmers at the convention in Bovina last Thursday night. Delegates to the State Convention next month are instructed to favor it for you.

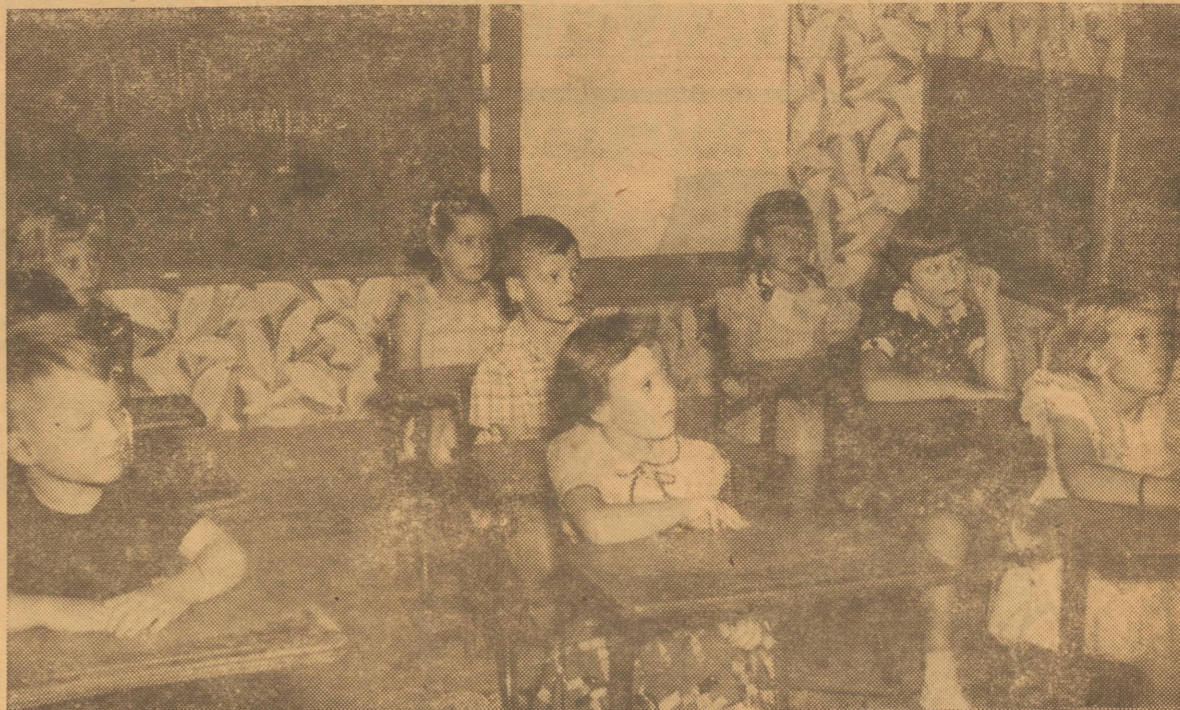

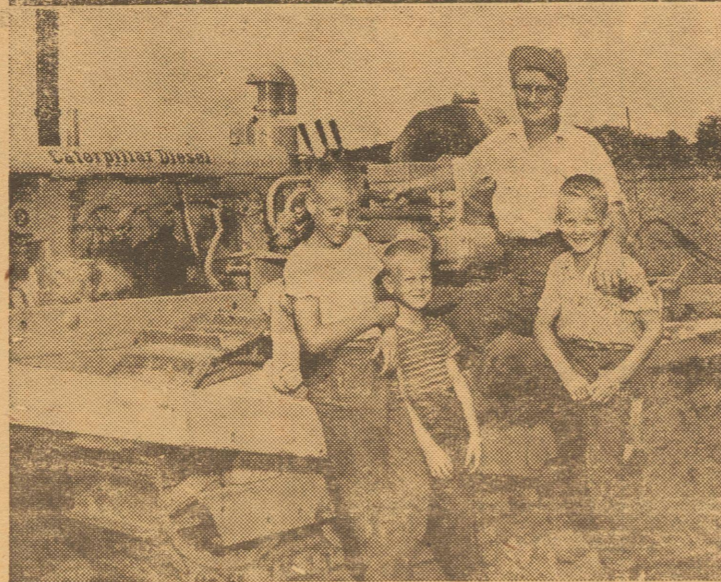

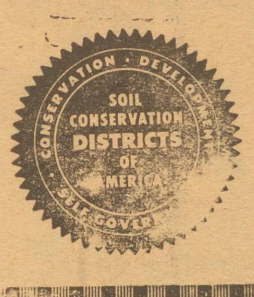

## News from Your Parmer County SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Some farmers may be overlooking a good method of sustaining production on their farms.

This can be done by using the grain stubble as a soil conditioner, that is chopping it into the top

few inches of the soil. Stubble handled in this manner serves two purposes, it decreases wind erosion and it increases the ability of the soil to absorb moisture (rainfall), during the fall and winter months.

In order for the stubble to be sufficiently decomposed, and to keep the soil in good condition, a high nitrogen fertilizer should be applied to the mulched-in stubble. After making representative clippings of some of the fields in the Parmer County Soil Conservation district, Walter Howard, S. C. S. technician, has concluded that there is about two pounds of stubble left in the field for each pound of grain harvested. In other words, if you cut 3,000 pounds of grain you should have around 6,000 pounds of stubble in the field per acre.

By figuring that it takes about 20 pounds of high nitrogen fertilizer to decompose a ton of stubble, a farmer can arrive at the amount of fertilizer he needs to apply. Also he should have a soil analysis run to determine the amount of available nitrogen already present in the soil.
