In North Carolina, the analysis shows, there were 2,989 one-roo schools in 1924, and 1,714 miles of improved highway. By 1930 the first-class highway mileage had increased to 4,025, while the number of single-room schools had declined to 1,400. The state presents on of the most emphatic evidences of the principle that the consolidation of rural schools is entirely a matter of efficient transportation.

Indiana, in the Middle West, hus made the same kind of progress. in 1924 that state had 3,452 one-room schools and only 911 miles of Heat-class bignways. In 1530 the number of schools had dropped to 2.850, while good road mileage had increased to 3,137. Precisely the same trend is shown in the other three states covered by the compari-
