Is It a Real Sales Tax?

Although the sales tax is said to e gaining popularity throughout the country as relief from an advaloem taxation and a budget balancing revenue producer, its sponsors are singularly unwilling to advocate it in direct form or impose it in that lashion. The two objections that might be voiced are legal and political: The sales tax per se may conflict with the fundamental laws of various States: legislators and Govrnors depending on votes for their Aubrey Walker, Tom Pollard, Miss posts are seldom willing to approve a direct tax imposition which the whole people can charge to their act. The first objection can have little statute from its nature, not its ame. Political evasion is objectionable and doubly so in the case of a sales tax because, by making this indirect instead of direct, the onsumers who pay most of it are denied even the slight relief of deducting it from Federal income rendition, while on the contrary those who do not actually pay it can so deduct it.



Back to the Farm Movement

According to some statistics gathered by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, covering a portion of West Texas and comprising some eighty counties it has been found that this year is witnessing the greatest demands of business-it is entering the new for farms by people who formerly were engaged in business of different kinds in the nearby towns, and in some instances in the larger towns.

This movement has been brought about largely by the fact that during the times when exorbitant prices were being paid for labor, many good farmers disposed of everything they possessed in the way of farming has forced on industry a new meanequipment, and often disposing of good farms which they owned and were ing of efficiency should cause earnclear of debt, that they may get to the cities and earn "easy money," only too soon to learn that "all is not gold that glitters." In an effort to remain in the cities where they naturally prefer to live, many have been out of work for months and often from one to two years. Circumstances and conditions have forced them to return to the farm and now start life

In some of the reports it is noticeable that it is not unusual for some farms to have more than one family on a farm and many counties reporting that there is not an unoccupied farm in the county.

Back-to-the-farm movement has been a big thing of recent, and as one person expressed it: "We have no hopes of accumulating riches by returning to to the farm but we are confident that we will not starve to death, as we can raise our living on the farm.'

The War and High Taxes

In the Boston News Bureau, Sherwin C. Badger explodes the theory that the tremendous increase in per capita federal government outlay is primarily the result of war.

If the war years are omitted entirely, and all war costs-such as interest and sinking fund payments arising from war borrowings, etc .- are deducted, the cost of government in 1932 was \$22 per capita-three times pre-war cost. If Reconstruction Finance Corporation funds and Federal Land Bank subscriptions are included, the cost was

\$29.12-nearly four times pre-war expenditures. What happened was that the cost of government was immensely increased during the boom years, when gigantic revenues accrued from income and similar capital taxes Governmental activities of all kinds were broadened; new departments and bureaus came into existence by the hundred; thousands of new employes were given places on the government payroll. Now income taxes have lost their potency in producing revenue, and government is attempting the impossible-to operate on a boom standard at a time when the national income of its people is the smallest

When times change for the worse, business and individuals make necessary changes to compensate—they adjust outgo to income. Government must do precisely the same thing if the deficit is to be conquered, the budget balanced, the national credit maintained and the taxpayers saved
