One of the most valuable documents in the world is said Thanksgiving frirst Presidential 1789. It was lost for over a hundred years and finally found it was bought by the where of Congress for \(\$ 300\). It now ro poses in the Library archives A part of that Proclamation is as follows:
"WHERE

Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to bey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to imslore his protection, aid and vors . . . . Now, therefore, I o recommend and assign Thursay, the 26th day of November ext, to be devoted by the peoe of these States \(t J\) the service that great and glorious Be ing, who is the Beneficent uthor of all the good that was, hat is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering nto him our sincere and hume thanks for his kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which he has been pleased to confer upon us."

Longest Aqueduct The Los Angeles aqueduct, 235 miles in length, is the longest in the world. The seven-year construction job was finished in 1914. It diverts the entire flow of the Owens river. It Is a grav-
ity proposition with its intake at 3,800 feet above sea level and the city of Los Angeles is 275 the cit
feet.

Tentative plans are being Worked out between San Mar-
cos and Dallas citizens for formation of the San Marcos cot ton mill into woolen mill. Plans 8 include organization of a new \(\$ 500,000\) company to take ove The cotton mill which has been
idle since 1928.

Of the \(269,325,60\) pounds of Carbon black produced in the United States in 1933, Texas ontributed \(214,855,000\) pounds ot ser cent of the nation's total. The Panhandile gas area counted for \(190,356,000\) lbs. Value of the Texas product at
he plant was \(\$ 6,000,000\), and it ontributed heavily to the Texas export figures with \(121,123,000\) pounds going through Texas ports to overseas customers. Rubber companies took 90 per cent of the product and ink and paint took most of the remainder.
The Christen Citrus Products Co., started last year to dispose of citrus culls, made a good record for its initial year, according to Monty's Monthly, which shows that the plant handled \(3,000,000\) pounds of cull fruit and shipped its products all parts of th United States
Canada and six foreign countries. It made 150,000 pounds of marmade base 100,000 nal lons of grapefruit juice and 500 pounds of grapefruit oil. It expects to handle nearly \(10,000,-\) sason. Kraft-Phenix Cheese Company is completing a \(\$ 60,000\) addition to its Denison plant and will give employment to fifty more workers. The Denison cheese factories in the United States. One new storage unit at the Denison plant increases storage capacity to \(400,000 \mathrm{lbs}\). A branch plant is being established at Bonham. The KraftPhenix Company is one of the pioneer members of Progressive Texans, Inc.

Texas cement plants showed an increase of 74.5 per cent in production in August over the same month in 1933, according to reports to the University Bureau of Business Research. Shipments showed a gain of 47.5 per cent and stocks on hand a decline of 16 per cent from the same month a year ago.
Average weekly production of lumber in Southern mills for August was 4 per cent down from July and 27 per cent below August, 1933, according to report to the Southern Pine Association.

Texas textile mills suffered no incovenience from the strike, but some of them have closed down pending improvement of existing conditions. The Waxadefinite shutdown around October 1 with reopening depending on future conditions.
