Youth Loses His Foot Following Accidental Discharge of Shotgun

SIDNEY LEONARD IS VICTIM

Fear of possible blood poisoning caused surgeons at the Baptist Sanitarium at Waco to amputate the foot of Sidney Leonard following the accidental discharge of an automatic .12 gauge shotgun, which occurred last Friday afternoon at the home of the young man's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Leonard at White Hall. The boy's foot was taken off about four inches above his ankle.

Howard Leonard, another son, living in South Texas was at home on a visit and had with him a young man friend. A hunting party had been planned for the afternoon and just before the party left the house, Sidney, the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard, picked up the gun and apparently was toying with it when it discharged, mangling his foot.

The young man was rushed to a Waco sanitarium where he was given immediate medical attention.

Late reports are to the effect that young Leonard is resting well and appears to be out of danger.

McGREGOR WINS HANDILY

Playing before a large crowd of holiday takers last Thursday afternoon, considering the very disagreeable weather, the Gatesville Hornets suffered possibly the heaviest defeat ever inflicted by their age-old rivals when they were over run by the strong McGregor Bulldogs in the annual grid encounter by the top heavy score of 66-0.

Playing in the rain through a portion of the game and during the first real blast of winter winds, the Hornets were unable to withstand the much heavier visiting team, which passed and ran at will while the locals failed to penetrate the solid Bulldog line and outrun the fleet McGregor backs.

Voyles, McGregor feild general, was the shining light in the McLennan county team's attack, receiving hearty cooperation from his team mates both in the backfield and in the line.

Sims and Holcomb, playing their last game for the Hornets, were stellar contributors to the Gatesville defense. Bauman, in the backfield was easily the best all-around performer for the Hornets on offense and defense. Sonny Hair, diminutive signal-caller, "bunched it" with the bruising Bulldogs consistently.

The Hornets have hung up their uniforms for another football year.

Gatesville Laundry Is Bought from Ricketts By Cocoa-Cola Manager

FORMER OWNER, NEW ONE

The Gatesville Laundry, formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Ricketts of this city, was purchased last Friday by John T. Morgan of Gatesville, proprietor of the Gatesville Coca-Cola Company. Mr. Morgan took over operation of the laundry Monday. This information was obtained through participants in the sale.

Mr. and Mrs. Ricketts purchased the laundry from Mr. Morgan nearly two years ago. Mrs. Ricketts has been active manager of the institution during that time, Mr. Ricketts being in the employ of the Thomson Grocery Company.

According to Mr. Morgan, the present equipment will be renovated and as various pieces of new equipment are needed they will be added to the present set-up. The new owner also stated that he will make-over the schedules of prices, announcement of which will be made at a later date.

Consideration in the sale was not made known.

25,000 HEAD OF CATTLE FOR TEXAS CANNERIES

Austin, Nov. 30.—Federal Surplus Relief Corporation officials have allotted 25,000 head of cattle from an emergency purchase now in progress in Texas to the 21 government canning plants in the state, State Relief Administrator Adam R. Johnson was informed by Keith Southard, executive office of the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation. One of the canning plants is located at Gatesville.

"This grant will enable plants closed last week at El Paso, Abilene, Big Spring, Wichita Falls and Waco to resume a full production schedule for the next two weeks," Johnson said. "By then, we hope to have instructions for processing still more cattle in our plants."

"Relief officials said only 25,000 head remained for processing when the new grant was made and these had been concentrated for plants other than those which had been closed.

The 21 government beef operated under supervision of the Texas Relief Commission at capacity handle 2500 head of cattle per day and turn out a maximum of approximately 400,000 cans of beef. It is estimated 300,00 head of cattle have been processed at these plants since they have been in operation.

Furthermore, the canneries are the biggest work project for relief clients in the state, giving employment to 20,000 in the canneries and 5,000 more in slaughter houses. It was estimated 100,000 persons would have been affected had the canning program been discontinued. C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department

I will think—talk—write . . . Texas Centennial in 1936! This is to be my celebration. In its achievement I may give free play to my patriotic love for Texas' heroic past; my confidence in its glories that are to be.

It is most certainly a pity and sometimes a disgrace when student organizations in the universities of the country are forced to withstand the burdens of undue censorship. To be sure there are times when certain self-styled undergraduate organizations in the higher educational institutions require faculty and graduate leadership, but not in the case of a student published college newspaper trying to utilize its freedom of the press without overdoing its privilege. The "Reveille," student newspaper at Louisiana State University has suffered under the dictatorship of Senator Huey P. Long, who has taken the university under his own wing in other respects as well. The student members of the staff have resigned and furthermore have the permission of the president of the university to organize an independent newspaper. We can't help but admire the spunk and independence of the students as well as the L. S. U. president.

Those of us who were afraid that we would not feel the chills of old man Winter by Thanksgiving should have felt some satisfaction when the mercury fell to a very noticeable extent. Regardless of the fact that the harsh weather outside was somewhat uncomfortable, it added something to the Thanksgiving spirit that made it seem like Thanksgiving than it would have been otherwise. The customary turkey dinner spiced with cranberry sauce et cetera was probably more appreciated Thursday to a large degree on account of the weather. There is a likelihood that the Thanksgiving repast was appreciated to a most uncomfortable degree by many, from the ill effects in evidence the following day.

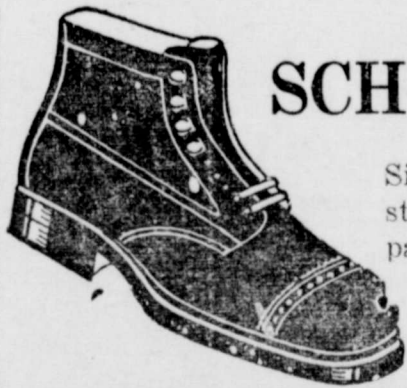
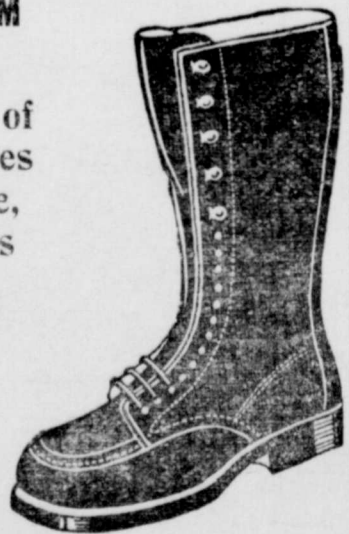

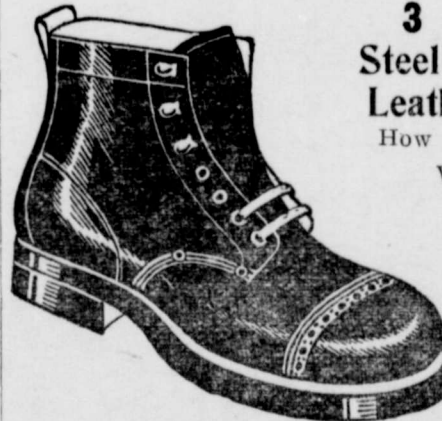
