## Tuesday Is Date Set For Bids to Be Accepted On New Baptist Church

Tuesday, April 16, at 10:00 a. m. bids will be accepted at Gatesville on the building planned by Birch D. Easterwood, architect selected by the members and committees of the First Baptist Church in their campaign for a new church building for this city, according to Rev. C. A. Morton.

Rev. Morton asserts that the committee reserves the right to receive or reject any and all bids, and that the successful bidder must make a surety bond of 50 per cent of the contract price. Any responsible contractor is privileged to bid on either a part or on the whole job. Sub-contracts will be accepted.

Since it is to be a local structure, the architect's specifications state that local material and labor are to be used or given preference in the construction of the building, prices and quality being equal.

Bids are to be sent sealed to Birch D. Easterwood, care of Liberty National Bank Building at Waco. Contractors must visit Gatesville and estimate how much usable material from the old church can be used before making their bids, also, with the bid 5 per cent of the contract bids must be enclosed with the bid in cashable warrants.

Wednesday Rev. Morton made a trip to Austin in the interest of the new church building, but only stated that everything was in order and that the trip was successful.

## Judge Brown Gives His Attitude on Highway Improvement in Coryell

County Judge Brown Gives His Attitude on Highway Improvement in the County

There has been a number of reports recently, both in McLennan and Coryell counties, to the effect that some citizens of Gatesville, including the County Judge, were deliberately preventing any further work on Highway No. 7.

Because of the interest and extent of these reports, especially from Waco, I feel like our people are entitled to know the facts concerning same.

The source and reason of these reports are obvious. Here they are:

While the construction work on Highway No. 7 was in progress the proposition was made to me that if I would agree to ask that Highway No. 36 from Gatesville to Temple be cancelled I could get sufficient support and the necessary influence to complete Highway No. 7 east. When I refused to consider such a proposition the report was circulated that the County Judge "COULD" get additional work on No. 7, if he would do it, and that he was retarding the construction of that road, and other statements to that effect.

Later I have had other propositions of a similar nature made to me, all of which I have declined and which in my opinion account for the reports of the supposed opposition to the improvement of No. 7. I do not know of any citizen of Coryell County who has tried to prevent any work on Highway No. 7 since the right-of-way was secured.

I am in favor of all proposed highways and could list those affecting Gatesville in order of (Continued On Last Page.)

### COUNTY AUTHORITIES WORKING FOR GOOD ROADS

Elsewhere in this issue, you will note local Highway enthusiasts are meeting and talking about proposed new highways which are (we hope) to be eventually built in Coryell County. It goes without saying, that the highway question in Coryell county is ever with us.

Way back, along in the 19-teens, we remember a good roads meeting with an all day picnic, bands, boosters from nearby counties and elsewhere. This was held on the former Raby property on Main Street. That's our first inking that there ever was a "Good Road's Movement." As usual, all recommendations, etc., were promptly voted down, on account of the question of so-called ridiculously high taxes, which was probably well and good at that time.

Until today we have not good roads—at least not paved ones. Pavement in this county consists of a few cement "dips," built for Model T days, and a few cement culverts.

Occasionally, we hear of bids being made and committee meetings and other publicity of a kind on good roads, but the shameful fact remains, Coryell County is the only county in the state we know of that hasn't an inch of pavement.

Understand, we are not hitting anyone for not pushing this matter, because it certainly has been pushed. Those who work on this matter have been too few, and without the backing of the citizens in general nothing can be done to alleviate this situation.

There are several rays of sunshine in this situation now, since contracts have been let for Highway 7 out of Waco for 5 and a fraction miles. Now, the announcement comes, that also bids have been made for about the same amount of highway construction from Temple northwest on what probably will be No. 36. Maybe when these relatively small sections are completed citizens of the various adjoining counties can get together and get something done on them without making them the "white elephant" we have had constructed for about the same distance out of Gatesville, merely a place for "parking," trying out speedy new models of automobiles, etc.

We're heartily for anything that will smooth out the bumps in Coryell county roads. Car repairs, re-rubbing and re-everything costs as well as taxes, and with better roads, the upkeep on automobiles is certainly to go down, measureably to the pleasure and comfort of automotive locomotion and ad infinitum.

Let's get behind those promoting this movement and see if we can't smooth out some of their "rough roads" as well as getting our County's highways smoothed out a bit. Then we can go merrily on our way singing "Rolling Along To-gether" instead of the old refrain so peculiar to Coryell County citizens of "Bumping Along To-gether."

### World Comment

After more than two months of debate, exposition, and protest on the part of Republicans and dissident Democrats, the House and Senate finally concurred last week to the President's wishes and passed the \$4,880,000,000 work-relief bill. The purpose of this biggest peace time appropriation is to end the dole system instituted by President Roosevelt upon his advent to office in March of 1933 and put 3,500,000 jobless men to work on public work projects. The \$880,000,000 will be used for direct relief purposes until the President can start operation of his new plan, and the remainder for work-relief.

A special board will be appointed by the President to supervise the work-relief program and the distribution of this huge sum of money delivered in a lump sum to be used at his discretion eight major types of projects.

The large Democratic majorities in the House and Senate rolled over all opposition to the

bill. The House vote was 317 "for" and 70 against. Senators Sheppard and Connally voted with 55 other Democrats, 10 Republicans, and one Progressive for the bill while 4 Democrats (Bulkley, Byrd, Gore and Tydings) and 9 Republicans voted against the adoption of the bill.

In the Danzig elections, choosing for the free-city's Parliament, the German Nazis received 59.1 per cent of the total votes cast. The German propaganda minister conducted a whirlwind campaign last week to obtain a two-thirds majority in the Parliament and re-annex the city to Germany. You recall that Danzig was detached from Germany at the close of the war and made a free-city to be ruled jointly by the League of Nations and Poland. The population of 333,000 is mostly German. At the close of the campaign, personally conducted by Gen. Hermann Goering, Hitler's major dommo, it was intimated that a plebiscite would be demanded similar to the Saar plebiscite held in January. If the League consents to a plebiscite, Danzig can be expected to vote pro-German and return to the Fatherland.

American journalism lost one of its most distinguished members in the passing of Adolph S. Ochs, Publisher of the New York Times. Mr. Ochs began

his career as a printer's devil on the old Chattanooga Times, which he owned also. The Times, then on the way to ruin, (Continued on Page 3)

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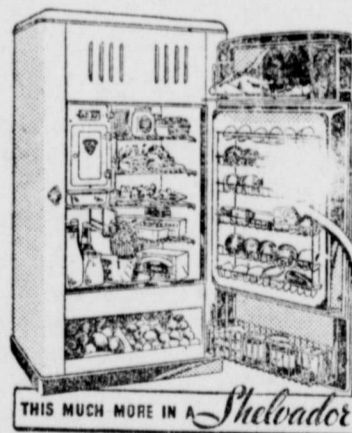

was acquired in 1896 and built into what is now considered the world's greatest newspaper. Mr. Ochs was also instrumental in building the Associated Press, the greatest news-gathering agency in the world, to its present standard. The Times and America have suffered a great loss.

Eighteen years ago the American people entered the World War "to make the world safe for Democracy." It was the "war of wars" and as such the

very life blood of the nation was expended to defeat the Boche. But now, in observing Army Day, they see that the cause which President Wilson espoused has been cast to the winds. The European powers, Japan, and even the United States are arming because of the war clouds hanging over the world. Congress—expecting war—is preparing a bill to take the profits out of war. Wilson thought the end of absolutism in Europe would mean the end of war. But imperial absolutism was supplanted with dictatorship by the proletariat.

Eleven billion American dollars flowed across the Atlantic between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, to make the world safe for Democracy—and have not returned.

President Wilson intended to supplant the absolutism of the Kaiser in Germany with a Democratic form of government—a government of and by the people. But today the constitutional limitations that in a sense made the Kaiser responsible to the will of the people have been cast away and in their place there is Hitler—responsible to no one. Since 1918 Russia, Italy, Austria, Hungary, Spain, Yugoslavia, Poland, Turkey and Bulgaria in Europe alone have

lapses into the throes of dictatorship. And now, eighteen years later, we see that the money and life of America were spent for naught. The United States have learned their lesson. The provocations would have to be great—so great that they would actually endanger the integrity and independence of the nation—to lead the government to become embroiled in another world conflict. Perhaps this attitude of the American people may be a contributing factor in maintaining world peace. The nations of Europe are in a state of semi-bankruptcy; they realize that America will not finance another world war. It takes money to fight and that's the one thing the Europeans do not have.

## Local Gun Club Gets Special Rating From National Rifle Ass'n.

Dawson Cooper, prominent member of the Gatesville Gun Club advises the club has received special rifle rating medal targets from the National Rifle Association. He says by using these targets members may receive bronze, silver or gold medals depending upon the scores. Shooting may be done prone, kneeling or standing or in all three positions. Scope or iron sights may be used in the prone position.

Since there is no limit to the number of medals a member may obtain the rating medals may be won at any time. Firing must be done in the presence of an official judge and two witnesses, who each must sign each target certifying that N. R. A. regulations are complied with.

Ten targets of the required

rating must be sent in, and it is not necessary to fire all of them on the same day. Further information can be secured from the Secretary of the Club.

their importance as follows:

No. 36, Gatesville to Temple.  
No. 7, east.  
No. 7, west.

I also strongly favor the recently proposed Air-Line Highway from Bosque county through Gatesville south.

I will also give my unqualified support to a relocation or improvement of Highway No. 53 from Belton to Lampasas which passes through Copperas Cove.

I would oppose buying right-of-way on No. 7 west at this time, for the following reasons:

First. The Highway Commission has right-of-way on No. 7 east sufficient for \$200,000.00 construction that they are not using.

Second. No. 7 west would not be improved without an improved connection from the Evant or Gatesville end.

Third. As far as I know no definite location and no plans have been made on No. 7 west.

Fourth. I can see no wisdom in borrowing money, involving the County in debt and paying interest to buy a right-of-way that would not be used anytime soon.

When the Highway Commission gets ready to improve No. 7 west I would give the purchase of the right-of-way my support at that time.

bottom of our highway troubles. We feel that the people of this county are squarely behind Judge Brown when they understand the "trade" he refused to consent to in order to secure the immediate completion of No. 7 east.—Editors.

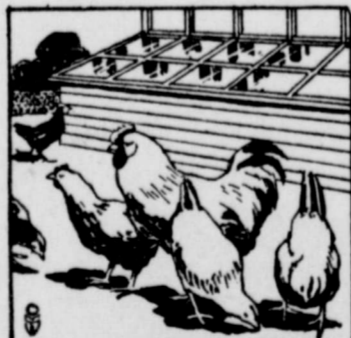
