



GERMAN ECONOMIC STRESS

Realizing that the sea blockade cannot be 100 per cent effective as long as Hitler has access to supplies in Southeastern Europe, the Allies have taken measures designed to deprive Germany of materials in this region.

The Allied strategy is to purchase all surplus supplies of neutral states selling to Germany paying gold in exchange. Herr Hitler has difficulty in counteracting this form of blockade, as his main difficulty in the economic field is that he has virtually no cash. He must depend upon barter.

This policy has worked to the Allies advantage except with the one commodity which Hitler needs most of all, the product which is imperative for the continued functioning of his industrial and war machines-oil. Oil, in the opinion of Allied military strategists, may in the long run prove to be one of the deciding factors in the defeat of Germany.

Germany, it is estimated, requires a minimum of 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 tons of oil a year. She produces a maximum of only about 3,000,000 tons, synthetically and from Galicia.

Under a new agreement concluded in December with Rumania, the Germans are to receive 2,shipments to make up for accured non-deliveries.

Russia's promise of 1,000,000 tons of oil for Germany within a year has not been fulfilled, less Petroleum Company for many than half that quota having been years. The couple moved to Pamdelivered.

And the Nazis cannot now be assured of continued deliveries of Rumanian oil because of physical and diplomatic obstacles.

The Danube delta has been frozen for weeks, preventing the shipment of oil to Germany by barges and river tankers. The German canal system is disrupted by the coldest weather in over ten years. German railways, deteriorated by years of neglect under the Nazi regime, are totally inadequate to to bring in large quantities of imported oil. As a consequence, the Germans are receiving only a small trickle of the oil contracted

Furthermore, the Allies are exerting strong diplomatic pressure on Rumania to curtail shipments of oil to the Reich. Since approximately 80 per cent of Rumanian oil production is owned or controlled by British, French and other foreign interests, the Allies are unwilling for the Germans to use Rumania as a supply house

for her oil requirements. Recently King Carol's Government instituted authority over the oil companies in such a way as to force them to supply fuel for the Reich's military machine. The oil companies have already been forced to accept a reduced price, since a German-Rumanian economic agreement has established the exchange rate for German pur- of the cotton produced in Texas is chases of petroleum products, wood products and cereals.

In retaliation, Britian France have warned the Rumanian government that they may be forced to discontinue economic relationships with her unless there is a satisfactory solution of the oi conflict. The Allies are understood to have informed the Rumaniar cabinet that if Rumania persists in the plan to force French and British oil companies in that country to furnish oil to Germany, all trade relations may be broken off.

What will Hitler do to bolster his internal in order to procure adequate war supplies for his armies? The next few months will most likely provide the answer to this question, perhaps in a desperate "blitzkerieg" designed to break the allied resistance.

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



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
