Mrs. J. E. Brazzil of Flat says
"Not a thing froze in my ventilat-
ed pantry". A ventilated pantry is
one so constructed that the cool
air which is stored up under the
house is drawn slowly through the
pantry during the day and keeps
the foods in the pantry at approxi-
mately the same temperature as
can be maintained in a cellar or
underground storage place.
The opposite gable ends of the
house should be ventilated. This
ventilation should be as near the
top peak of the gable of the house
as possible so as to drive out the
hot air and not permit a layer at
the top. If the house roof has no
gables, as with a "hip roof", it
would be well to install a vent in
