## Notice to Those Desiring to Plant 1941 Wheat

Farmers who want to plant wheat on farms where there has been no wheat planted for harvest since 1937 must make application to the County AAA office for a wheat allotment not later than September 1, 1940

Farmers who plant wheat and who do not have a wheat acreage allotment will be subjected to a penalty on each and every acre planted in wheat in 1941 under the 1941 Agricultural Conservation Program.

Among the many interesting things Mr. Love told us was the fact that helped bring in the two states into the union, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

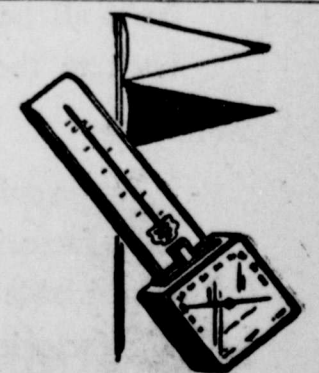

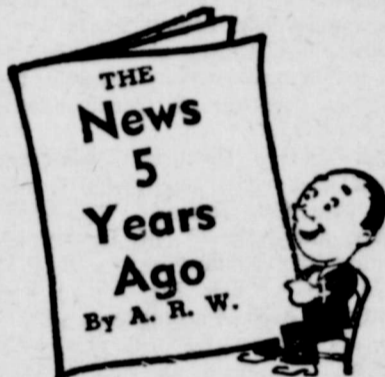

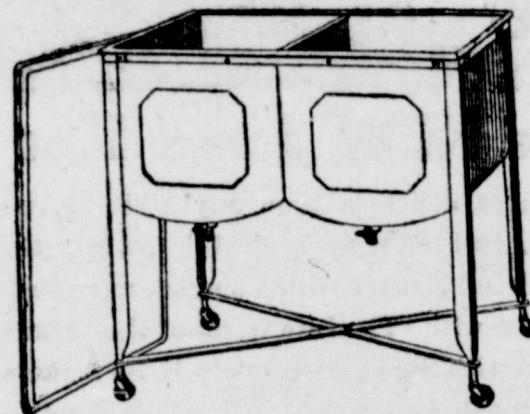

**EUGENE ELAM, WELL KNOWN EDUCATOR AND PROMINENT FARMER-STOCKMAN, DIES**

Although it had been generally known that Eugene Elam, prominently identified throughout his adult life with the Ohio-Liberty community, had been in failing health for some twelve months, news of his death at a hospital in Temple, Texas on Friday morning, August 9, at ten o'clock, spread as a grievous shock, almost unbelievable. Mr. Elam succumbed to an ailment described as a tumor on the brain.

Members of the family, relatives and a number of friends were at the bedside of Mr. Elam when the end came, and the Christian soldier laid aside his "shield and buckler" in a triumphant entrance into that Land where all the tumult of Earth is shut out and only the halleluiahs of Angels are heard in the singing of praises to Jehovah.

A tribute of the mourning public was paid by the great company of people assembled at Live Oak tabernacle on Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, when the funeral services were held with Rev. Milton Slayden, of Evant, pastor of the Methodist congregation where Mr. Elam was truly a "pillar in the church", conducted the memorial ceremonies and Rev. Robert Studer, of Pearl, a life long friend, delivering the oration.

The sleeping body of Eugene Elam was laid to rest in the beautiful Live Oak cemetery, where the graves of those sainted ones gone on before reminded tearful loved ones and friends of the joyous company "Over Yonder" welcoming this "recruit in Heaven."

Eugene Elam was born at Marlin, Texas, March 19, 1881, to W. N. Elam and Mrs. Elizabeth Elam, both of whom preceded their son in death. At the age of two years he came with his parents to the Ohio-Liberty community where he was reared in a home of culture and happiness with superior educational advantages, in which he availed himself to the highest planes of achievement of well rounded knowledge. As long as the state of his health permitted, Eugene Elam was one of the best informed men in the country, being conversant in politics, economics, education and religion in the realms national and international. His public service included teaching in the schools of Central Texas, holding with distinction the offices of School Trustee; of President of the Live Oak Cemetery Association, a member of the Board of Stewards in the Ohio Methodist church. Sunday School superintendent and teacher for number of years of the adult Bible class. He was an attractive public speaker, and was very frequently called upon as a representative of his community to make addresses on occasions of celebration or boosters meetings when large delegations of visitors from the outside world were guests of the settlement.

Eugene Elam was a man of large affairs, and his business perception was keen, and he was a person of commendable thrift, though one who lived well and contributed generously to all public enterprises and to charities to which he gave of himself as well as of material means.

Although he was never married Eugene Elam's home life was rich in loving companionship of brothers and sisters and nieces and nephews, eight of the latter named having known his care as a father, guiding them, providing the material comforts and necessities for the formative years of their lives and without deviation proving kind, considerate and exemplary in his daily walk before them as a Christian kinsman. As a neighbor, Eugene Elam never failed to respond to a call for a service or in hospitality or congenial social life. He was held in highest esteem by the entire people of his communi-

ty, as well as by those folk in the world outside who knew him in any manner of life's activities. His intellect was clear and brilliant, his soul pure and aspiring, his nature genial.

Mourning the earthly separation from Eugene Elam are three sisters and two brothers, who are Mrs. Ida Peck, Stephenville; Mrs. Bessie Brown, Miss Grace Elam, and E. O.
