## Coryell County Car Quota Is 17 Cars: State Quota Given

Washington, Feb. 24 (AP)—The OPA Tuesday announced Texas' quota, along with other states, to be 5,522 with 515 in reserve.

Quotas were arrived at for counties on the basis of 1941 purchases, but war and defense operations effected the quotas.

Cars released amount to 43 percent of the 340,000 new vehicles to be sold to essential users in the next 12 months, and 30 percent of the total supply of about 430,000 new cars left in the hands of manufacturers, distributors and dealers, when the motor industry shut down.

Coryell county's quota was set at 17.

## Army Camp Site Folks Have Meet At Antelope

According to G. G. Northcutt, forty-nine men, representing most of the communities in the proposed army camp site met at the Antelope school, Tuesday night last.

Discussion, besides a general get-together, was the low prices offered for the land and homes. N. F. McDonald, Antelope, was elected chairman of the meeting.

It was emphasized the people did not oppose the government purchase of the land, but that they did expect to be paid a reasonable price that they might purchase similar homes in other places. Too, it was suggested at the meeting, that because of bad roads in this locality, and possibly because the appraisers were accustomed to more level land that those men underestimated the value of the land. Because of the fact that so many people must buy homes elsewhere and because of the war the prices of land in nearby counties has risen to abnormal levels.

A proposal was made and un-animously accepted that telegrams be sent to Senators Tom Connally, W. Lee O'Daniel and Congressman Bob Poage, followed by a petition explaining the situation to these government representatives of the people.

It was further suggested that each man signing the petition write a letter to each of the above-mentioned Congressmen. Also, the following men were appointed in each community to get the petition to be signed at various schools: Thursday night, February 26. Men named were W. A. Diserens, Maple; S. T. Clem, Clear Creek; Geo. Potter, Palo Alto; Charlie Hill, Harmony; Lawrence Graham, Brown's Creek; and C. C. Thomas, Antelope. People effected in the Pidcocke and Copperas Cove communities were to sign the petition at the Antelope school.

**NAVY GETS JAP SHIPS**  
Washington, Feb. 25 (AP)—The navy disclosed today it had probably sunk three enemy submarines in the Atlantic and then, turning to the vast Pacific theatre of war, declared that it had struck serious blows at Japan's oceanic might by sending 53 Jap ships to the bottom since Dec. 10.

**FARM STOCKS BAN ON**  
Washington, Feb. 25 (AP)—President Roosevelt lost another argument with the powerful senate farm bloc today when the senate voted, 50 to 23, to prohibit sales of government stocks of farm products below a full parity price.

**RANGOON BURNS**  
(By United Press)  
The British were reported Wednesday night to have put the torch to Rangoon, converting it into an inferno of flames and smoke, and from Mandalay it was reported that the Japs have opened a drive on that city without waiting to crack the Sittang river line before Rangoon, where they have lost 29 to 36 airplanes in one day's fighting.

**U. S. PLANES SINK SHIPS**  
Washington, Feb. 25 (UP)—Sharp-shooting U. S. army flyers notched new victories in the battle of the Dutch East Indies today, sinking two big Jap transports and blasting at least three Jap planes out of the skies without a single loss to themselves.

**KNOX DENIES L.A. AIR RAIDS**  
Los Angeles, Feb. 25 (AP)—Thousands of sleepy citizens who had thrills and chills early Wednesday watching what they thought was an enemy air raid, were wondering at night what it was all about.

Navy Secretary Frank Knox said at Washington that, from information reaching him, the incident was a false alarm, and this echoed the already expressed opinions of many Southern Californians.

**DANGER IN JAVA**  
Bandoeng, Feb. 25 (AP)—The Dutch East Indies command announced Wednesday that allied planes had sunk three large Japanese transports from a concentration off Macassar which may have been massing for the expected direct offense against Java.

The Ja occupation of Bali and Timor, a spokesman said, has completed the encirclement of Java by cutting off its communications with Australia.

**168 SURVIVORS**  
St. John's, Newfoundland, Feb. 25 (AP)—There were 168 survivors of the sinking of a U.S. destroyer and naval supply ship in a storm off the lonely Burin peninsula of Newfoundland, reports reaching here said tonight.

**RUSSIANS TRAP ARMY**  
Moscow, Feb. 25 (AP)—Red Army's crushing victory of encirclement at Staraya Russa appeared Wednesday night to be but the first stage of a winter-end offensive aimed at trapping all the German armies in the northwest corner of Russia.

**40-HOUR WEEK MAY GO**  
Washington, Feb. 25 (UP)—Following closely a conference with President Roosevelt, house leaders today opened a vigorous counter-offensive against a spreading move to suspend the 40-hour work week for the duration.
