General Bruce Speaks To Colored Citizens

Major General A. D. Bruce spoke to the colored citizens of Gatesville Sunday afternoon at 3 p. m., at a mass meeting at the First Baptist Church, colored, with a house full of attentive people.

General Bruce speaking on "Tolerance" told the audience that the meeting here "had the best turnout of any other communities where he had spoken". Previously, similar meetings had been held in

Temple and Belton. General Bruce urged the colored folks to have nice, clean, recreation for the colored soldiers, because many colored boys from Gatesville and Coryell county were in other places in the United States and other countries, and that their wives, mothers and sweethearts would like to know that they are being taken care of like the visitors are here in Gatesville. Sonny Hair Hits At Nazis Again: They Gets One Motor

With the U. S. Bomber Command in England, Oct. 9, (AP).—More than 100 American Fortress and Liberator bombers with an escort of 500 Allied fighter planes made the greatest single daylight aerial attack of the war on Adolf Hitler's industrial and transport system Friday at Lille in Occupied France.

DALLAS MEN BUY SITE FOR CLEANING PLANT IN BELTON

Purchase of a 75-acre site for cleaning and pressing establishment at Belton to handle solely soldiers' clothing from Camp Hood was completed Wednesday by three Dallas men, at a cost of \$25,000.

The property included an old yarn mill building, several warehouses and 52 residences owned by the Johnson Manufacturing Co. of Charlotte, N. C., which will be moved to Belton. The mill has not operated in Charlotte for several years.

Approximately 200 will be employed in the plant.

RECRUITS MAY VOLUNTEER, TANK DESTROYER SERVICE AT HOOD

The War Department today announced men 18-19 who enlist in the present drive for needed Army increase in personnel may volunteer for service with Tank Destroyer units. Those who express this choice will be sent to Camp Hood, Texas for training.

Tank Destroyer forces, newest development of our Army are composed of fast, hard-hitting heavy weapons organized into battalions which are trained to destroy enemy

REPLACEMENT TRAINING CENTER FOR TANK DESTROYERS ACTIVATED: NEW CAMP

"The Tank Destroyer Center at Camp Hood announced Wednesday the activation of the Tank Destroyer Replacement Training Center, under orders of the war department.

The center actually was organized Saturday under the acting command of Col. J. E. Gillfillan and begun instruction Monday, Major General A. D. Bruce, commanding general of the Tank Destroyer Center, announced.

General Bruce said the replacement center would be temporarily located in one of the group training areas of the resent cantonment, and will be lifted and moved into the new northern camp which is soon to be constructed between the resent camp and Gatesville.

Immediate personnel at the new center is a cadre of 99 officers and 528 enlisted men, most of whom already are in camp. The center eventually will consist of more than five regiments. The first training cadre will be the nucleus of the first replacement

center regiment. Activation of this new organization in advance of the construction of the new northern camp is one of the results of concentrated planning board set up by Gen. Bruce.

This planning board is also working up plans for the Basic Unit Training Center which also will be located at the so-called northern camp.

These groups are expected to move into a new cantonment early in 1943 as part of the big expansion program of Camp Hood authorized by the war department to bring its total capacity to around 80,000 men.

Construction there will be of the "theatre of operations" type of construction as contrasted to the more permanent "mobilization" type of the resent cantonment.

Surveys of land which must be acquired are being carried forward with all speed to pave the way for earliest possible acquisition of land and award of construction contracts.—The Temple Daily Telegram.

CITY-WIDE CHURCH CENSUS TO BE MADE BY CITY'S CHURCHES

Setting Bible reading, family worship, and faithfulness to public services of the churches, the central planning committee of the city-wide Church Loyalty Crusade gave official impetus to the movement announced last week, in a breakfast meeting yesterday morning.

Dates for the intensive effort are set as November 15 to December 20. General plans and objectives include an emphasis on the universal need for God as revealed in the Bible, particularly in times such as the resent world crisis. This is to be achieved in various co-operative enterprises, but largely thru particular plans worked out by the several participating churches of the city.

Community enterprises given tentative approval include a sing-song for service men and other interested on Saturday nite of the first week of the "Crusade"; a city-wide religious census, and a community Thanksgiving service.

Further details are to be worked out in a meeting of the General Promotion Committee on Sunday afternoon at 4:30, the meeting to be in the First Baptist Church. This Committee, yet to be appointed, will be composed of representatives from the various churches of Gatesville.

HAD ENOUGH AT END OF FIRST QUARTER; REST DIDN'T MATTER

Gatesville High School's 1942 Hornet machine, rolled over an inexperienced West Trojan eleven, with utmost ease, and allowed West their lone marker in the last part of the game, when everybody but the waterboy, and two managers were sent in.

Who played? Well, they went in so fast we didn't get all the names, but if they're on the 1942 Hornet club in any capacity, they were in the Game Friday night.

West, with an inexperienced, but fighting Trojan outfit, had nothing to show besides that, and their features were Sealy and Arthur, who sparked their entire offense and defense.

Here's how it was done:
Hornets kick, ball to Freund on

30, stopped by 2 Hornets. Sealy didn't. Gorgas got 1, but Hornets, offside and West gets 4 more; West penalized, refused by Hornets. Sealy kicks, ball taken by Lengefeld on 30, returns to 43.

Boynton at LE makes 8. Davis takes off on reverse over RT, cuts back and goes for touch, and it's GHS 6-WHS 0, after the extra was fumbled. A two play touch.

Hornets kick ball to Sealy on 28, hit hard and nearly fumbles. Gorgas (Man Mountain) spins at C for 0; Sealy passes incomplete; Gorgas doesn't go again.
