Vote On Officers C. Of C. To Be By Mail, Person

According to a new wrinkle adopted Monday night at the meeting of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, voting this year will be by ballot on the officers and directors of the organization.

Barnes Lumber Co's. Safe Is Blown For \$1,200 Or More

Where were you between 12 midnight Wednesday and 6 o'clock Thursday morning?

It's pretty important, because during that period of time, somebody or bodies blew the safe of W. F. & J. F. Barnes Lumber Co., at Gatesville, and evidently, walked away with the swag. The swag was about \$125.00 in cash or more, and enough to make \$1,200.00 \$1,500 in all.

The job was done with nitroglycerine, and the force of the explosion was strong enough to blow the door off against the counter around the office. Bolts of wall papering canvas were pulled in front of the safe door to deaden the sound. Evidently, it did a good job, because no one is reported to have heard the explosion.

Entrance to the lumber yard was gained by jimmying a window on the south side of the building, near the door. The robbers also went in the "cement room" and borrowed a pick and sledge hammer which they left "on location".

Yesterday at noon, everything was left just like it was "blown" and a finger print expert was called to see if he could assist the sheriff's department in finding clues. Apparently, the motive was robbery, as the money was taken, but postage, and gasoline book stamps were left. Jeff Bates, manager of the yard, had a gun in the building, but this was not disturbed. George Schaub who was to make a trip to San Sabo early Thursday, discovered the blown safe and immediately called Mr. Bates. That was about 5 o'clock Thursday morning.

Mr. Bates and Rufus McKinney had worked until about 11:30 on the books, Rufus said, looking for \$8.00, and didn't find it.

NAZIS RAID LONDON

London, Mar. 3. (AP).—Genman bombers struck weakly at London Wednesday night in an expected reprisal raid made by single planes which kept the British capital under alert for about 90 minutes.

LEWIS BLASTS WLB

Scranton, Pa., Mar. 3 (AP).—John L. Lewis, president of the UMW, called the War Labor Board a packed court Wednesday and left the intimation he might refuse to plead the miners' wage demands before it.

REDS CAPTURE RZHEV

London, Mar. 3. (AP).—The strategic Nazi central front strong hold of Rzhev fell to the Russian army Wednesday after a violent struggle in which 2,000 Germans were slain and enormous enemy booty was captured, Moscow announced in a special communique which also told of a Red army sweep to a point only 45 miles from the Bryansk-Kiev Railway.

DRAFT URGED AS "CURE"

Washington, Mar. 3 (AP).—Work or fight legislation, holding the threat of induction over the heads of able bodied draft age men who shirk their jobs in war factories, was endorsed Wednesday by Sec. of the Navy Frank Knox and Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson. And, it's O. K. by me!

ALLIES GO UP IN TUNISIA

N. Africa, Mar. 3 (AP).—American and British forces, retracing the trail of their defeat of 18 days ago, pushed farther toward Sidi-Bouid from Sbeitla in Central Tunisia and the British 1st Army began putting pressure on the Germans in the north after a sharp defeat of enemy thrusts, Allied headquarters announced Wednesday.

MANY TO DIE IN SEA FIGHTS, SAYS KNO

Washington, Mar. 3. (AP).—Secretary Frank Knox, projecting a Navy 2,250,000 strong by July, 1944 and big enough to control the world's seaways, solemnly

warned the nation Wednesday to expect that one out of every 10 Navy man may be killed or wounded. Look out for a disaster announcement. This may be the build-up.

15,000 JAP TROOPS DIE

Australia, Thurs. Mar. 4 (AP).—10 warships and 12 transports in a New Guinea bound Jap convoy have been sunk or rendered in a sinking condition by allied planes, the high command announced today. 55 Jap planes were also knocked down.

FDR FOR A "FOURTH"

Washington, Mar. 3. (AP).— "Two or three" members of the democratic national committee suggested to "President Roosevelt" today that he run for a fourth term nomination if the war is still on next year, Democratic National Chairman Frank C. Walker disclosed, but the suggestion of "get no response from the president". He'll let 'em know!

Cecil was in Dallas, and suppose now, he's enroute San Diego. Anyway, we know he's happy, as we listened to him talk about the Marines for 3 or 4 months. He **LIKES** it.

And, here's a note from a lady, Mrs. Whisenhunt, to her sons in the service. Pvt. Howard Whisenhunt in N. Africa, and Pvt. Lawrence Whisenhunt in India. Lawrence, writes his mother the Coryell County News is coming thru fine and it is wonderful, and to keep it coming, as I enjoy it very much. Also, the notes go to Pvt. Hubert Choat, also in the service.

Here's a letter from Pvt. Choat. February 26, 1943
Aloe Army Air Field
Victoria, Texas.

Dear Mrs. Effie & Family:
I will at last try to answer your letter. I was glad to hear from you but more glad to hear you were going to church. You folks are doing mighty well in the face of things. So many people get discouraged during times of trouble and fall away. Some think that if God rules the earth he would not let wars come, but He is just in His judgement and has warned us repeatedly that these judgments would come so we of the faith understand, partly at least, why we have wars and rumors of wars and if our faith is strong enough, and I fear for myself, to endure unto the end, we shall be saved out of the last and greatest of all tribulations. We must not become bitter toward our own government or others for they were all ordained of God for a purpose as is revealed considerably thruout thebook of Romans, as well as the Old Testament prophets. The wicked God defying governments are to be pitied by Christians for we know their punishment and fall will be great.
We will do well to pray that

our own government will never turn against God's people as some of the others have or else it will be doomed to destruction. Of course, we would like the self-righteous phrases if we thought we were too good to escape some punishment, nationally speaking. You can't realize how much wickedness there is until you spend some time in the Army or some of the towns. It is sickening to hear what I hear in the Army everyday.

I sure enjoy my work here. My Sergeant is a pretty nice guy and the other ward boys are pretty agreeable to work with. I hope your boys have been as lucky as I have in having good superiors. It makes a lot of difference in being content in the Army. Polly has a brother in North Africa. I think she worries a lot about him but she don't say much. She heard from him about 2 days ago. I sure hope you have heard from Lawrence and Harold by now. I sometimes wonder, Mrs. Effie, if cur freedom is worth what those boys go thru. Some of them won't come back so what good will it do them? But the Lord's will be done. In a way, I believe they are all His servants, but it is all hard to understand with my knowledge, which is small.

Well, I hope you all get rain soon enough. I'm glad Troy has papa's place. I know it will be well taken care of if any one can do so. I can't keep from hoping he won't pass the exam if he is called up again. I guess that is wrong, but you know I used to rock him to sleep.

I'll close for this time. Goodbye to you all.

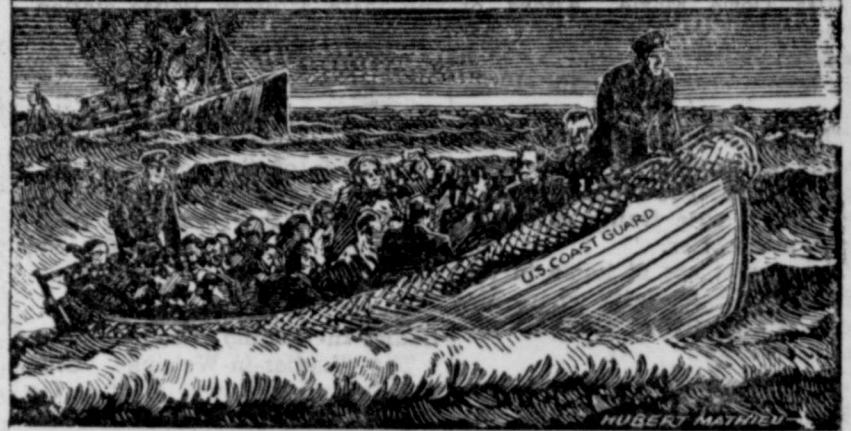
OBITUARY

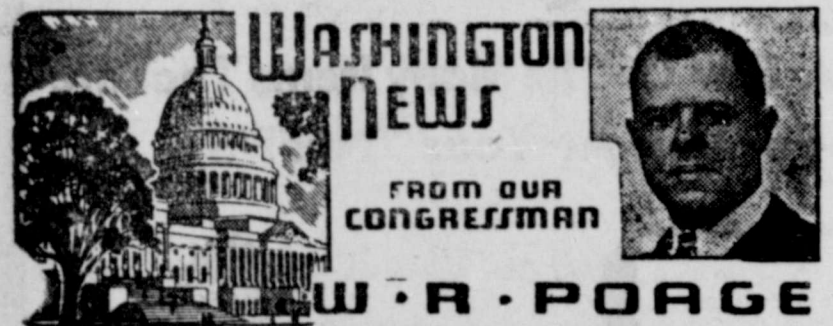

up as he has the bill to include farm labor costs in parity. The Ways and Means Committee is still working on a tax bill. Most everyone agrees that some form of pay-as-you-go plan should be adopted, and that there must be a withholding tax on salaries, but there the agreement ends. The committee has reported a bill to increase the national debt limit. To this bill they have added a provision that does away with the President's order confiscating all salaries above \$25,000. net. No matter what one thinks of the desirability of limiting salaries, no one can contend that the President has this power without an act of Congress. The Committee proposes to replace the President's order with a law levying a 100% tax on that portion of all salaries in excess of \$25,000 except to the extent that a higher salary was paid before Pearl Harbor. In other words, no one is to be allowed to get any excessive salary as a result of the war. Regardless of the outcome of all of the tax proposals now pending, all of us are going to have to file our income tax returns by the 15th of March and make return, but I am going to have to do some "digging" to pay it.

Dear Friends:

The American people should all recognize the danger of the U-boat menace. Unless we can get supplies to our boys overseas, we can not expect them to win no matter how bravely they fight. If we are able to keep our lines of communication open, we have every right to expect a decisive victory. This week the House has, in recognition of the importance of shipping, passed a deficiency appropriation bill providing \$1,256,607.00 for the construction of more ships.

I realize that money alone will not get the goods across the ocean. We must build the ships and the goods to load them. This we are doing in a magnificent manner, but I am ashamed to admit that there is a constant threat of sabotage on the part of those who are working in our ship yards and industries. Of course, most laboring men want to contribute to the war effort and have been working

hard to turn out the needed goods, but unfortunately there are a number of outright traitors in the ranks of organized labor. Practically all of the labor unions have pledged themselves not to strike during the war, and most of them have kept that pledge, but there are enough irresponsible "labor leaders" to keep the threat of strikes forever hanging over our heads. Just now we are threatened with a general strike in the coal mines where the work week (despite the recent Presidential order) is still only 35 hours per week. The miners say they need more income in order to meet increased living costs. All they need to do is to work a longer number of hours each week. At the same rate per hour a miner working 48 hours would make more than one-third more than he is now making working 35 hrs. per week. The Nation needs the coal. The miner says he needs the income. Why should not the miner go to work and earn the money he

wants? I don't know of any other class who can so easily add one-third to their income. Today we are told that the airplane workers of the West Coast are about to strike for higher hourly wages although they already have one of the highest wage scales in the country.

As dangerous and treasonable as these efforts to disrupt our production are, they are not as yet doing as much to slow up production as absenteeism. It seems that many industrial workers are making so much that they don't care to work every day. I have talked with some of the great ship builders. They say that this absenteeism is cutting down production from 10 to 30%. Our boys in Africa and in the South Pacific are dying because men and women in American ship yards and factories simply won't work. We now have legislation pending that would require the employer to report all absentees to the local draft board. I shall support this legislation. I believe that all deferments from military service on occupational grounds can be justified only where the person deferred actually contributes to the war effort. In other words, it is the work that the individuals does, and not what he should do that counts.

The Senate has given concrete evidence of some interest in the problem of farm production by passing by an overwhelming majority a bill to prohibit the deduction of soil conservation payments from the parity calculations used in fixing price ceilings. I am sure that our Agriculture Committee will favorably report the Senate Bill without delay, but the Chairman of the Rules Committee will probably try to bottle the measure
