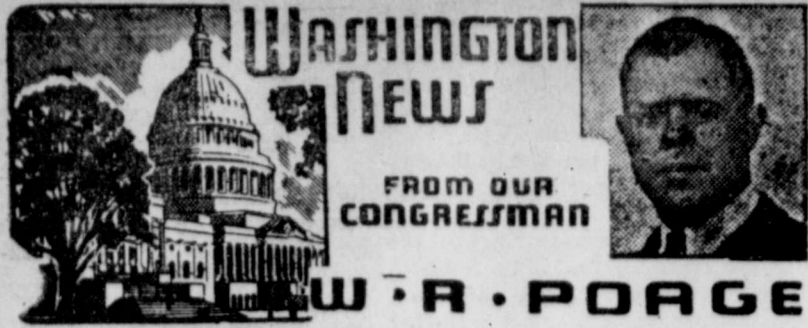

FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN

W. R. POAGE

March 26, 1943

Dear Friends:

The prospects for much needed increased farm production were in my opinion given a serious setback this afternoon when the Senate voted to send the bill to include farm labor costs in the calculation of parity back to the Committee. This bill had been passed by the House, and up until a day or two ago it looked as if it would surely pass the Senate.

As I see it, the Administration and many Senators are afraid that if we do justice for the farmer, they will be forced to accede to the blackmail of John L. Lewis, who is using the war as a means of enforcing his demands for a wage scale altogether out of line with other wages. Mr. Lewis's miners had a substantial increase in wages just before war broke out. They have been working an average of only 32.9 hours per week for the year 1942. I don't believe anybody can earn a living working only 32 hours per week, but if they cared to work 48 hours at present wages, they would be able to increase their income by nearly 45%. Mr. Lewis seems to feel that the members of the United Coal Mines Union should not put in a full week's work and that instead they should be given a substantial hourly increase in wages without any commensurate increase in production. The farmer wants a chance to produce. Mr. Lewis wants to keep production of much needed coal at a minimum. I think that we should have a show-down with Mr. Lewis and the sooner, the better. If we don't this man is going to catch our Nation in the middle of a great military crisis someday and wreck our government.

Apparently, however, the Senate wants to settle the coal mine issue before it takes up the farm problem. I am afraid that this will mean waiting until it will be too late to produce the crops we need to produce this year. Of course, the Price Administrator, former Senator Brown, emphasizes his charge that this farm legislation would encourage inflation, but I

think that it is fair to say that the Senate was much more concerned with the effect on the labor controversy than it was with the threat of inflation.

As a matter of fact, the most effective control of inflation is to be found in the use of the taxing power. The tax bill is now being considered on the Floor of the House. We have had two days of violent but rather inconclusive debate which will continue most of next week. The great question is, "How shall we get on to a current pay-as-you-go basis?" There are only two methods. One is by forgiving taxes. The other is by doubling up—paying two years' taxes at the same time. Probably some compromise will finally be adopted that involves some of each of these methods. I think that the Members of Congress and the people are too generally overlooking the vital fact that regardless of what methods of payment is decided upon, we are going to have to collect all the taxes our people can pay—whether they are called 1942 taxes, 1943 or even 1944 taxes.

In the first place, the government must have the money. In the next place, this is the only way we can prevent inflation. Today we not only have more civilian buying power than ever before, but at the same time we have less civilian goods to buy. Both of these factors lead to inflation. We can not increase the production of civilian goods without decreasing our output of war goods. We cannot reduce the existing gross income of our people without causing much suffering and without discouraging much needed production. We can, however, after money has been earned by farmers, laborers, banks, manufacturrs, and contractors take it in the form of taxes and thereby supply the needs of government and at the same time reduce inflationary pressure of this money on our economy. I feel that very few of us have realized just how much more effective it is to allow laborers, farmers, and industrialists to make a profit and then take all excess away in the

form of taxes than to prohibit the earning of the profit in the first place. If we don't allow profits, we can't get taxes, but we must also realize that if we don't take the excess earnings in taxes, we are certain to have inflation. We may, therefore, feel sure of only one thing in regard to the new tax program. It will take a much larger part of the individual income than any tax bill in the past.

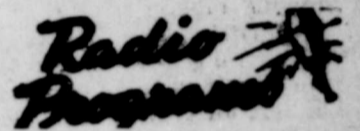

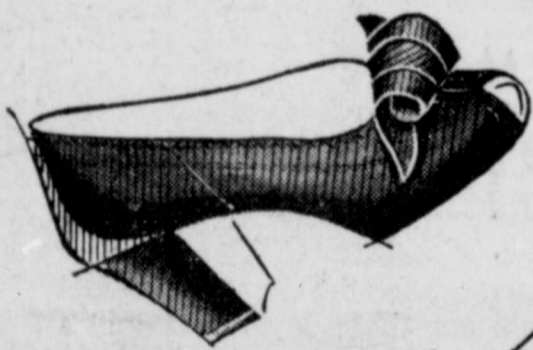

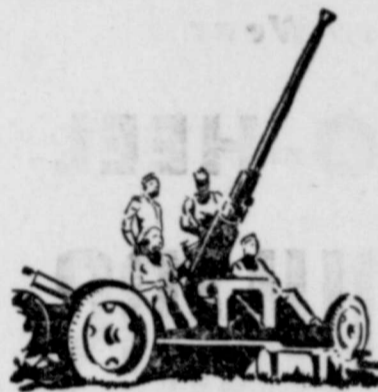
