## Invasion Story Told By Dutch Harbor Veteran

Typical of the men making up the non-com cadre of the LX Corp PRTC is Staff Sgt. David C. McBroom of Coryell City, Texas, a veteran of 6 years of army service which includes 23 months as an infantry communications sergeant in the far north.

Leaving a west coast port in July, 1941, Staff Sgt. McBroom's unit arrived in Kodiak late that month. Long and arduous months were spent building roads and improving their camps.

After the attack on Pearl Harbor every one wanted to get into the fight, but it was no dice until later. At that time we doubled our outposts and played a game of watchful waiting.

Our commanding officer was Major Philip R. Dwyer, and under his direction we built and camouflaged trails to all of the bays around the sector of the island we were to defend.

In June of 1942 the Japs hit Dutch Harbor, and we thought we would get to see some action but the superb flying of our Army and Navy pilots turned them back and they never reached us.

Then, in November of 1942, we received orders that we were to go further west. We left the last of the month and had Thanksgiving dinner on the boat.

We arrived in Dutch Harbor in December, 1942, and left in a few days proceeding to Adak. On Adak S/Sgt. McBroom's unit received intensive training in amphibian operations and took many conditioning hikes in preparation for their next objective.

We went abroad a Marine Troop Carrier in the morning. That nite the CO announced that our destination was Amchitka, and that it was not known whether or not it was occupied by the Japs, but that we could expect an attack at any time.

At 10:00 on the 12th of January this year, the assault wave of our battalion climbed over the rails into the assault boats and we started invasion. By 15:00 it was completed without a shot having been fired. The whole movement had been carried out under cover of fog, with the utmost secrecy, and it was not until the evening of the 23 that we saw our first Jap plane, tho it was not the last.

## BRINDISI TAKEN BY ALLIES

Africa, Sept. 12 (AP).—British troops have completely overrun the Italian toe at the strategic port of Brindisi, and American forces in the Naples area are fanning out into wider operations against heavy opposition, and at Malta, eight Italian destroyers and 14 submarines arrived making the total surrendered, 32, since Italy unconditionally surrendered late last week.

London, Sept. 12 (UP).—Germany claimed Sunday that parachute troops and Elite Guards had freed Benito Mussolini from imprisonment and thus prevented Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio's government from delivering the former Duce to the British and Americans.

## PEARSON SAY WIRE TAPPING

Washington, Sept. 12 (UP).—Drew Pearson, columnist and radio commentator, said tonight that his telephone wires have been tapped by President Roosevelt's "gestapo agents" and that he has been shadowed by naval intelligence agents. He's the "chronic liar", according to FDR.

## HULL PROPOSES BIG ARMY POST-WAR

Washington, Sept. 12 (AP).—A postwar world in which nations will get along like good and self-respecting friends, ready to crack down with joint force any attempt of the criminal element to start up "the monstrous specter" of war, was set forth tonight by Secretary of State Hull as the No. 1

breath and hatless, her hair blowing in the midnight breeze as she tensely awaited the arrival of the Philadelphia plane.

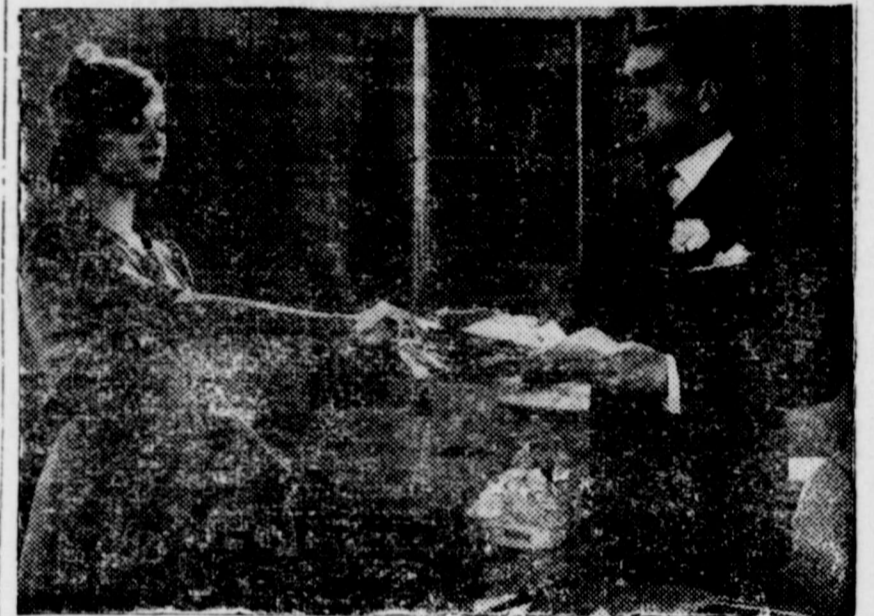
