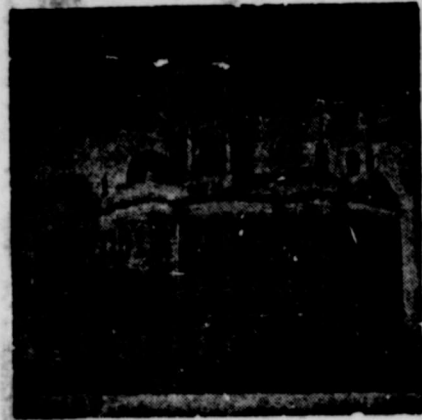
### German Counterattacks Stopped in Italy

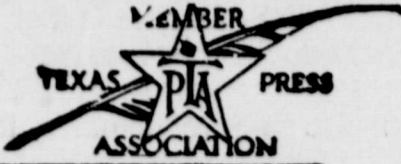

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### HUMBLE EMPLOYEES HONORED FOR PART IN WAR WORK

The 14,000 employees of Humble Oil & Refining Company will be signally honored on December 14th at a ceremony commemorating the manufacture of a billion gallons of finished 100 Octane Aviation Gasoline at the Company's Baytown refinery. The ceremony, which is open to the public, will be held in the grounds of the refinery, adjacent to the main office building and will be attended by high ranking military officials, representatives of governmental agencies and civic and industrial leaders.

Representing Under Secretary for War, Robert P. Patterson, will be Major General Hubert R. Harmon, former commanding general of the 13th Air Force in the South Pacific and now commanding general of the newly-created AAF Personnel Distribution Command.

Humble President H. C. Weiss will make a token presentation of the billionth gallon of finished 100 Octane Aviation Gasoline to General Harmon who will accept it on behalf of our nation's armed forces.

Rear Admiral William Ward Smith will represent Secretary of the Navy, James J. Forrestal at the ceremony and voice the appreciation of the Navy for the achievements of Humble people in the production of vital war materials.

Mr. Weiss will also make a token presentation to employees of the medal which was struck especially for the occasion. The medal was designed by Rene Paul Chambellan prominent American Sculptor and is cast in bronze, depicting various refining operations with a refinery worker in the foreground. The back side of the medal shows a squadron of flying fortresses dropping bombs, while below is printed a congratulatory statement to Humble employees from General H. H. Arnold, signed in his facsimile signature. The medal will be presented in a specially designed booklet which contains a message from the management of Humble, commending the employees for their war production achievements.

Approximately seventy-five employees chosen by lot from the widespread operations of the Company will be in attendance as special guests of the Company. Several thousand employees and members of their families who live in the vicinity of Baytown will likewise visit the refinery during the period of December 14 to 17th inclusive, at which time booths and exhibits depicting the Company's operations and displaying Army and Navy equipment will be open for inspection. Many Humble people, as well as the general public, will be visiting the plant for the first time. Motion pictures, accompanying the exhibits will also be shown to orient visitors to the refinery before they are taken on an inspection tour of the giant petroleum assembly lines. The celebration and all displays will be open to the general public and anyone desiring to visit the refinery may do so, according to Company officials

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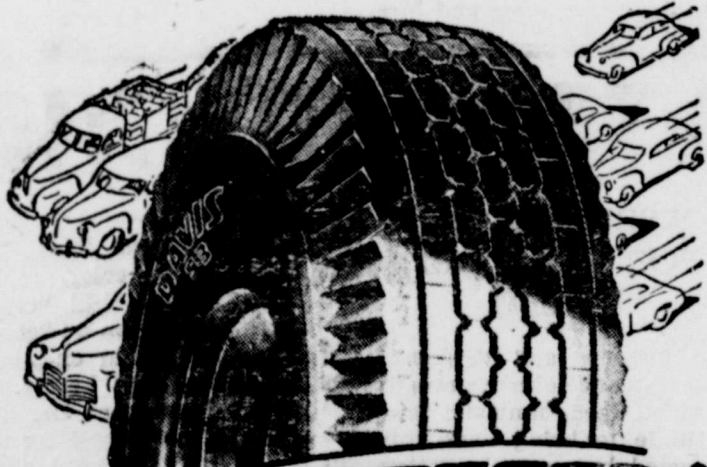

# NEWS of MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM

**15th AAF IN ITALY**—T/Sgt. Riley G. Davidson of Gatesville, son of Mrs. Ora Bel Davidson, is serving as an administrative section chief with a Bombardment Group, which was recently awarded a second War Department citation for outstanding performances in the MTO. He is now authorized to wear an Oak leaf cluster on his Distinguished Unit Badge. This second citation was for the daring and successful attack on the stConcordia Vega Oil Refinery at Ploesti, Rumania, and the first was for an attack on the rail yards at Bucharest, during which 40 enemy aircraft were destroyed. This twice sited group has made more than 175 attacks against wide spread targets in the crumbling Nazi Empire.

**15th AAF IN ITALY**—Fred M. Post, 19, was recently promoted to the grade of S/Sgt., it was announced by headquarters.

A waist gunner Sgt. Post is stationed in Italy with a veteran B-24 Liberator squadron that has served nearly a year in the Italian campaign, flying long ranged bombing missions against key industrial and supply strongholds thru out central Europe and the Balkans. Sgt. Post graduated from GHS in '42. He attended aerial gunnery school at Yuma, Ariz., prior to his assignment to the 15th

Air Force overseas.

S/Sgt. John W. Rhoads, of the AAF is returning from 34 months in the Southwest Pacific, and will arrive on the 10th at Ft. Sam Houston. His home is The Grove, and he is a son of Mrs. Myrtle Rhoads.

Sgt. Wilson Brazziel, formerly at Garden City AAF has been transferred to San Marcos AAF. Wilson was formerly employed by the News as a linotype operator-printer. Mrs. Brazziel is also here for a visit with her mother, Mrs. J. H. Malone.

**15th AAF IN ITALY**—T/Sgt. Thomas V. Dawson, 22, of Gatesville has arrived in Italy and is a radio-operator-gunner, a member of a B-24 Liberator Bomber Group, which has flown more than 145 combat missions against targets in Southern Europe and the Balkans. He entered service Jan. 8, 1941.

**AT A 12th AAF BASE**—By placing nine bombs in the target circle out of every ten dropped, the B-25 Mitchell bomb group to which T/Sgt. Chester L. Giddens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Giddens, of Gatesville is assigned, set an Air Force record for bombing accuracy during the month of September. Bombing average for the month was 90.4 per cent as shown by bomb-strike photos. These came in 49 separate attacks against such pin-point objectives as rail and road bridges, enemy gun positions, fuel pumps, and troop concentrations while flying aerial support for the allied drive in Northern Italy. His unit has been cited by the President for distinguished service in battle.

Friday night of last week, Pearl High School, palying to a non-supporting crowd, having almost a total absence of Gatesville people, drooped their Bi-District game to Paint Creek's six-man team by a close count of 25-19.

Pearl's fighting Trojans were never out fought or played, and played headsup ball all during the game, but were overpowered by a considerably heavier club. The boys from Paint Creek had already chalked up 8 wins and this made their season 100%. This was the first Six-Man-Bi-District Game to be played in Coryell county, and the fan support was a total oss.

Opening the game with a bang, the boys from Paint Creek hung up two pay jaunts with R. Medford running 40 for the first counter and W. Medford, jogging a short distance for the next. McGuire, for Pear answered shortly afterward with another counter climaxing with a 15-yard run. W. Cox for Pearl made the second tally shortly afterward.

At the half, the count was Paint Creek 19, Pearl 12. Paint Creek kicked to Pearl, and some-

time later, Geral Oney, substitute, recovered a fumble and carried it over for a touchdown, and they kicked the goal, tying the count 19-19.

With 2 minutes to play, a Paint Creek back passed to Sims for the final count of the game, and they didn't add the extra, and the final count was 25-19. Pearl tried desperately for another marker during the closing minutes of the play, and they didn't pay off.

Tackling during the entire game on both sides, and blocking, also, was remarkable, and the drive and power these teams showed could well be copied by other teams we've seen in action recently.

Many pilots fly today with skull caps made from a sweetener's stocking. One important detail to be remembered, however is that the stocking must be taken from the girl's left leg. Pilots say there is no luck in the right leg.

Lt. Connally Briles, 3435 E. Rose dale, F. Worth, Texas wears the same flying suit on every mission.

"On two occasions," the lieutenant recalled "I decided to break in a new suit. but both times we ran into unusually heavy flak.

Two close calls were enough. I gave the new suit away."

Lt. Briles wears the DFC, Air Medal with six clusters and two battle stars. He has 208 combat hours and took part in the raid Bologna, Italy.

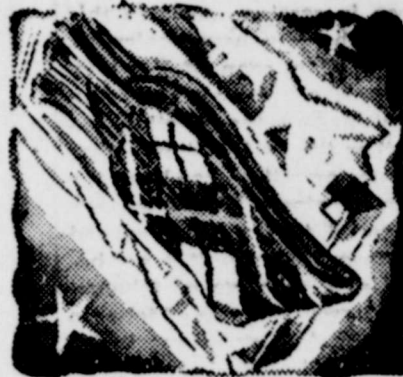

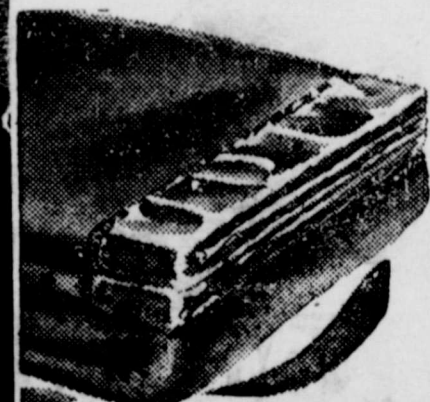

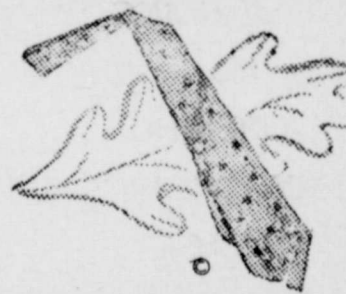

December 1, 1944

Dear Friends:

After getting off to a rather slow start, this session has gone into "high gear" and has for the past week been very active. Early in the week we passed the new Highway Bill. Later we passed the Extension of the War Powers Bill. Today we passed the new "Small Business bill. Each of these measures is of real importance to the nation and to our section. None of them was written just as I would have liked, but I considered each to be of such importance and of such value even in its imperfection that I voted for each of the three bills.

The Highway Bill establishes the basis of a great system of highways and local roads after the war. It recognizes that we should not embark on a program of construction until the war is over. At the same time it is recognized that when the war is over that we will need to have a well developed plan of highway development. Most of the State Legislatures meet in January. If we are to continue a program of joint State and Federal highway development, it is necessary that the States be able to know just what they are to do while the Legislatures are meeting. In most States (including Texas) the Legislature meets regularly only once in two years. It, therefore is most important that we should pass a bill at this session advising the States just what the Federal Government would do. The bill we passed authorizes the expenditure of \$1,500,000,000 during the three years following the war. \$150,000,000 per year can be spent on local (farm-to-market) roads, \$125,000,000 per year can be spent in cities and towns (this is a new practice). In addition, the regular "Federal Aid" funds are made available for use on highways through incorporated cities. Personally, I see no objection to this procedure although in the past we have hesitated to grant State or Federal aid within city limits. It seems to me that this should have been sufficient concession to the great cities, but the bill also changes the basis of apportionment of the Federal aid funds. These funds must still be matched by the States, but they are now to be divided among the States on the basis: one-half on population, one-fourth on area and one-fourth on post road mileage.

This increases the importance of population and decreases the importance of area and post-road mileage and this is less favorable to Texas than the old formula which was: one-third on population, one-fourth on area, and one-fourth on post road mileage.

The continuation of the President's war powers over price control and allocation of scarce commodities is, of course, necessary. I don't think that any of us would want to remove all control that is now being exercised over prices. If we did, we would undoubtedly have run away inflation that would absolutely ruin everyone at home as well as paralyze our war effort. The power to control prices and ration goods was therefore continued. However, the House did provide for more adequate and effective appeals in cases where individuals felt they had not received fair treatment.

The Smaller War Plants Corporation has undoubtedly helped local business in many sections of the country, although for some reason, very few in Central Texas have received any help from it. I hope that in the future more of our business men will use its facilities.

The Agricultural Committee has also been in session each day this week. We have a new chairman, Hon. John Flanagan of Virginia. Mr. Palmer, our former chairman died just before the election. Among other things that have come before our committee has been the cigarette shortage. While we are not prepared to say what caused the shortage, we know it is not because of any shortage of tobacco. There is a great surplus of tobacco just as there is a great surplus of cotton, but just as there is a shortage of cotton goods, so there is a shortage of manufactured cigarettes. I suppose it is due in part to the larger demand and the short age of workers in the cotton mills, and tobacco factories. Next week, the Special Post War Agricultural Planning Committee, of which I am a member, begins a series of hearings on the cotton problem. We all know how serious this problem is. We want to hear any proposals that others have to remedy it.

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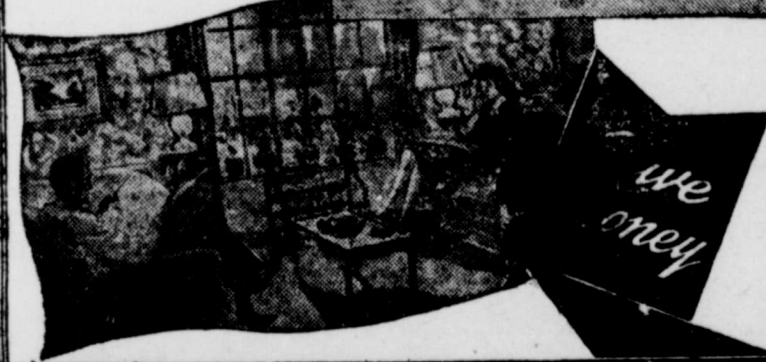
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
