Grand Jury Comes In: Eight Felonies: **No Misdemeanors**

The Grand Jury has reported. an came in with eight indictments all of which were felonies.

Also in court, Monday morning, two cases were settled when entered pleas of guilt. They were: Florence Meyer. charged with forgery, plead guilty, and given 5 years suspended sentence.

PARIS January 8, (AP) .- The Western Third of the Belgian Bulge was all but nipped off today with one of the last two supply roads cut in three places and the other brought within easy artillery range with the capture of Flamierge, only two miles to the south.


As the wedges deepened, the hours of doom neared for three crack Panzer Divisions still tied to the German battle line at the "toe" of the bulge.






PORTLAND MUSEUM
