Third Of "Bulge" Nipped Off

PARIS January 8, (AP).—The Western Third of the Belgian Bulge was all but nipped off today with one of the last two supply roads cut in three places and the other brought within easy artillery range with the capture of Flamierge, only two miles to the south.

As the wedges deepened, the hours of doom neared for three crack Panzer Divisions still tied to the German battle line at the "toe" of the bulge.

450 American Transports To Luzon?

UNDATED, (AP).—Tokyo reported that over 450 American transports were steaming north toward Luzon and a long line of American Warships, carrier planes, were attacking Japanese forts lining the Lingayen Gulf 120 miles north of Manila in the face of fierce resistance. The report is not confirmed by Americans.

MOMENTO SENT FROM GERMAN BATTLEFIELD BY WIFE OF SOLDIER

Mrs. Osha M. Wehring of McPherson Kansas sends us a clipping from "The McPherson Daily Republican" which we quote.

Two watches French and German coins a German insignia pin and a dinner unit consisting of knife fork and spoon which fit neatly into the handle of a can opener—all of them taken from dead Nazi soldiers near Aachen in Germany by Staff Sgt. Arlie Wilson Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs Arlie Wilson 315 North Cherry are on display in a window of The Republican.

Sgt. Wilson a member of a tank destroyer unit went into Germany on September 12 in the first assault wave. He wrote his father that he was sending one of the watches to him and added that he can look at it and say "there is one Jerry that can't fire any more shots at our boys".

One watch, in a gold case, is of German make, while the other in a silver case was made in France perhaps part of the loot taken by the Germans from the French people.

Sgt. Wilson is with Company "C" of the 893rd Tank Destroyer Battalion and his wife is the former Miss Betty M. Powell of Gatesville.

We appreciate very much the able charge given us at the time we were impaneled, it greatly aided us in the performance of our duty. We were assisted by the District and County Attorney during our investigation which we appreciate.

The door bailiff and the riding bailiffs were very faithful and diligent as to their duties, greatly assisting us or which we also appreciate.

We have been in session 5 days and having completed our work we feel that there is no necessity or the continuation of the Grand Jury at this time, and having completed our work we respectfully request your honor that we be discharged but in doing so we feel like that we should thank the citizenship of the County for their cooperation in making it possible for us to make the speedy and complete investigation at this early date, so having finished our work we respectfully request this report be received and we be discharged.

Hugh McLellan built the Sweat Mansion at Portland, Maine, in 1800. General Joshua Wingate, son-in-law of President Jefferson's Secretary of War, General Henry Dearborn, lived there. When Mrs. L. D. M. Sweat died, it became the property of the Portland Society of Art. In its Municipal Art Gallery hang Gilbert Stuart's portrait of General Wingate, Douglas Volk's portrait of President Lincoln and other notable works. Defenses set up by U. S. service men and supplies purchased with War Bond funds have kept these treasures unscarred through three years of war. More War Bond funds will insure their protection.

The Grand Jury's report is as follows:

"Come now your Grand Jury who was duly impaneled on January 1, 1945 for the January term of the District Court. After having been duly charged and instructed by hour honor (District Judge R. B Cross) we proceeded to oryanize our body in accordance with your charge and entered upon our duties.

During our deliberation we have examined 38 witnesses and returned 8 indictments all of which are felonies.

We have returned no misdemeanor bills for the reason that the character of crime has been handled by the sheriffs department, County Attorney and the County Judge an dwe found no necessity to return any misdemeanor or bill.

We have investigated all the matters of any importance that came to our knowledge during our work or that was reported to us during our deliberation. We find that crime in this county in on a decrease and that the major portion of the crime that is committed has been committed by people who are not permanent citizens of Cory ell County but has been committed by people who have come here recently.

We appreciate very much the able charge given us at the time we were impaneled, it greatly aided us in the performance of our duty. We were assisted by the District and County Attorney during our investigation which we appreciate.

Cpl. Harold L. Whisenhunt is a draftsman with the 135th Regiment which recently marked its 338th day in combat. It's a unit of Military Police is returning from the 34th "Red Bull" Division and 27 months overseas in the SWPA has been in foreign service con-

tinuously for more than 2 1/2 years.

The regiment has lost 1,000 killed and several thousand wounded and a division of replacements has passed thru the ranks of the 135th.

They have taken part in battles in Algiers, Hill 609, the Voltorno and Rapido Rivers, Cassino, the Anzio beachhead, Rome, Pisa, and the Gothic Line. They bridged the Cecilla River and captured Rosignano.

And from the 338th Regiment is S/Sgt. Aubrey E. Lawrence, who is a squad leader, and they are credited with killing and wounding many hundreds of Germans and taking 700 prisoners in four weeks of cold, bitter fighting in the Gothic Line.

They are "old timers" of the famous 85th "Custer Division", and took part in the Solacciano Ridge and the Gustav Line. Formia, the Gaeta Peninsula and Rome, and are now on the approaches of the Po Valley.

They captured the "straight up" rock, mount Altuzzo, 3000 feet and key to vital Il Giogo Pass, Mount Aanol, above Firezuola. The outfit holds 35 Silver Stars and more than 200 Bronze Stars. They hit Cassablanca, Jan. 7, and after training in North Africa, went to Italy. At Lariano, they attacked the Velletri-Valmontone Line, the last defense line before Rome, and advanced northward to capture Suezze and ater relieved elements of the 3rd "Marne" Division at Cori.

WITH THE U. S. ARMY FORCES on New Caledonia: Pvt. Milford D. Graham, son of Mrs. Johnnie P. Graham of Gatesville has been promoted to Private First Class. He is assigned to a General Hospital and is now working as a Surgical Technician, and is beginning his second year overseas.

Here's excerpts from a letter from Sgt. W. H. Ament, known to all of us as "Hazen", and he's an Ex-Newspaperman, and he writes his mother Mrs. W. C. Ament: "I am well, but am working very hard and long. We are doing a hard job here, and the mud and rain hinder us very much. It is also very difficult, being constantly on the alert for bombs. I have seen some terrible battles in the air, but our fighters have won them. On one occasion, a Jan Zero plane fell to earth and crashed only a few feet from me and my tractor. For the first few days here, it was pretty terrible to see, but I am over the awesomeness to a large extent and believe I can overcome anything now. War is really hell on earth, especially up here where the actual fighting is going on. I don't and won't have time to write much when I do write. Don't worry about me. It won't do any good; just pray.

Hazen That, Ladies and Gentlemen, is a rough idea of about how rough this non-glamorous war REALLY is, and that's it's main trouble—too much Glamour. Heck, this ain't a Hollywood show. It's the real McCoy—nothing else but W A R and absolutely nothing good about it! Hazen Knows!

We might or might not have reported this. S/Sgt. Jack I. Nabors of Pearl, has been home for a rest after 67 missions as an Engineer-Gunner on a B-26 Marauder, and came home with an Air Medal with 12 Oak Leaf Clusters, the Purple Heart, the ETO Ribbon with 2 Bronze Stars. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Nabors of Pearl.

Sgt. Ardie S. Knoll member of the Gatesville VFS Post, Francis Rutherford, was inducted January 1941, and was with the 142nd Regiment of the 36th, training at Camp Bowles, Camp Blanding and Camp Edwards, Mass. He went overseas in March, '43, and was in North Africa until September '43, when the Invasion of Italy started. He was one of the first to land on the beachhead of Salerno, and fought with the 5th until wounded December 2, 1943, near Cassino.

He spent four months in a hospital in North Africa and was sent to Brooks General Hospital, Ft. Sam Houston. He was awarded the Purple Heart there.

Before entering the Army, he attended Brownwood High School, and Daniel Baker College, and was an engineering student at Texas Tech when he got in the army. He is now on convalescent leave with his mother Mrs. J. L. Knoll, North Village, North Camp Hood.

We have a part of a story about the 804th Tank Destroyer Battalion which has been in Italy with the 5th Army, and in it is Vernon M. Cantrell of Gatesville who is a member of the Fifth Army Association, and holds the card, signed by Mark W. Clark, Lt. General, U S A, Commanding.

The story, in part: "Early in November, the 804th T D Battalion of the 5th Army fired its 100,000th round of ammunition in the Italian campaign. It is commanded by Lt. Col. Fred G. Rowell of Roswell, N. Mex., and the unit has developed a versatility in combat that goes far beyond the original concept of tank destroyer employment.

"Rugged Italian terrain and limited road nets forced an expansion of the old anti-tank doctrine, "seek, strike, and destroy." The battalion has frequently dug its tank destroyers into protective positions to perform field artillery missions such as firing in support of infantry, knocking out strong points, breaking up counterattacks, and in general using its high-velocity, flat-trajectory, long range weapons to play havoc with the enemy.

They entered combat in Italy at Garigliano, March 1. With only six weeks out of the line since that time, have fought at Mt. Nero, Quercianello, Castiglione and Leshorn, and are now in the snow covered Apennines.

A prisoner of war, commending upon the effect of the 804's guns remarked: "We can stand anything but that SP (self-propelled) fire".
