TODAY'S EVENTS By Associated Press

Americans Farther In Remagen Bridge-Head

PARIS, March 12. (AP).—Overnight attacks carried the American First Army several hundred yards farther in the Remagen Bridgehead.

Berlin declared that the foothold had been widened to 12½ miles, with some 25,000 men already sent over the Ludendorff span.

The American Third Army laid siege to Coblenz, and eliminated all Germans west of the Rhine and Moselle and except two small pockets.

Bombers Hit U-Boat Bases and Steffin

LONDON, March 12. (AP).—Allied bombers from Britain attacked Steffin today in support of the Russian Army. Also other bombers bombed Baltic U-Boat bases at Swinemuende.

Reds Regrouping Armies for Big Push

LONDON, March 12. (AP).—The Russians are reported to be carrying out large scale regrouping of their armies today preparatory to another massive shove on the Berlin front.

Moscow dispatches said the Russians might by-pass Berlin in a drive to cut Germany in two.

Tank-Led Americans Push Back Japs On Isle

MANILA, March 12. (AP).—Tank-led American invasion forces swept aside the meager Jap resistance in a Southwestern corner of the Philippine archipelago today.

The Veteran 41st Division landed on Mindanao, Saturday, and captured an airstrip, and in half hour overran four villages.

SAMMIE REASOR WINS ON ABERDEENE IN FORT WORTH

Sammie Reasor, Coryell County 4-H boy won \$45 on his Aberdeen Angus calves which he showed at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, during the past week. His placed 4th and 5th in the senior calves.

Coryell county also won 2nd in the car load lot of 15 calves. These included 15 calves owned by these boys: Daymon Graham, Choice & Clarence Smith, Sammie Reasor, Bobbie Wright, Bertram Davis, Carl Grubbs, Seth Turner, O. L. and Charles Haferkamp.

Charles Haferkamp placed 3 calves 4th in the group of 3's winning \$20, and Seth Turner had 6th and 7th place Shorthorns, winning \$22.

Altogether Coryell county won \$224, part of which was won by the State Training School, which exhibited the 1st place Junior Shorthorn and the 2nd place Senior Shorthorn.

Eighteen of the original 20 entries in the show are left for the sale Friday, and the prospects are good.

Incidentally, two Coryell county boys are in the rodeo at the show, Jack Saunders and Royce Sewalt.

FEDERAL COTTON INSURANCE AVAILABLE TO GROWER, OWNER

Federal crop insurance on cotton for 1945 is available to every cotton farmer, either renter or landlord. This insurance is offered on either 75 per cent or 50 per cent coverage and cover losses due to excessive rains, droughts, insects and other normal hazards, but does not cover failure to cultivate, harvest, or other negligence by the farmer. One application covers the applicants interest in all cotton in Coryell County. The tenant's and landlord's shares are insured separately, and each applies for his own insurance. Lint and seed or lint alone may be insured.

The final date for taking insurance is March 25, 1945. Interested farmers may secure their insurance yields and premium rates from the AAA office, where applications will be signed.

Jonesboro, however lost out later in the tournament.

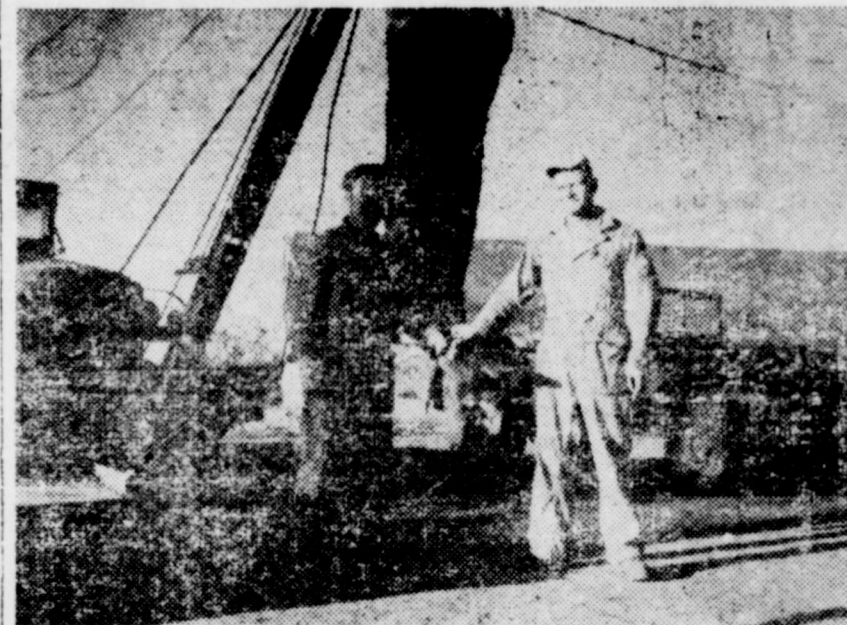
News-Views Of Boys Over There

FARM PAYMENTS FOR 1945 ARE ANNOUNCED BY AAA OFFICE

In 1945 all soil-building practice payments will be limited to the individual farm allowance of 60c per acre on cropland and 6c per acre on pastureland. Even though all practices are limited no payment can be made on constructing terraces, ditches, and earthen dams, drilling wells, or eradicating cedar, prickly pear, underbrush and mesquite unless the farmer secures prior approval from County AAA Committee to carry out these practices.

The rates of pay on all 1945 soil-building practices may be obtained from the community committeemen or the AAA office.

HOME CANNING SUGAR PROGRAM FOR 1945

The national allocation of home canning sugar is 700,000 tons as compared to 1,150,000 tons issued last year. These figures indicate that out total allocation this year by the Boards, excluding consideration of the five pound stamp used last year from War Ration Book IV, can only be 85% of last year's issuance by the Boards, Mr. Nesbitt Chairman of the Coryell County Board said.

Mr. Nesbitt said that he wished to advise the people of Coryell County of the procedure to be used in the issuance of Home Canning Sugar, according to instructions from the District Office.

(1) that the initial issuance must last the entire year.

(2) Coupons may not be expected to reach the consumer until at least thirty days from the date on which he files his application.

HOME CANNING SUGAR PROGRAM FOR 1945

(3) Coupons will not be given to applicants at the Board Site but will be mailed to the applicant by the Board.

(4) Suppliers cannot possibly provide everyone with canning sugar at one time; therefore, the public should spread out over as long a period as possible the purchase and use of its home canning sugar.

(5) The period of issuance of the Coryell County Board will be from April 1, 1945, to October 31, 1945, and the stamps will be valid for use thru November 30, 1945.

(6) SPARE Stamp No. 13 from War Ration Book IV will be attached for each person listed on the application for Home Can-

ning Sugar. I am appealing to the people of Coryell County to use the mails as much as possible, and to give our Board and Clerks a full thirty days to issue the canning sugar coupons in order that everyone applying can receive due consideration.

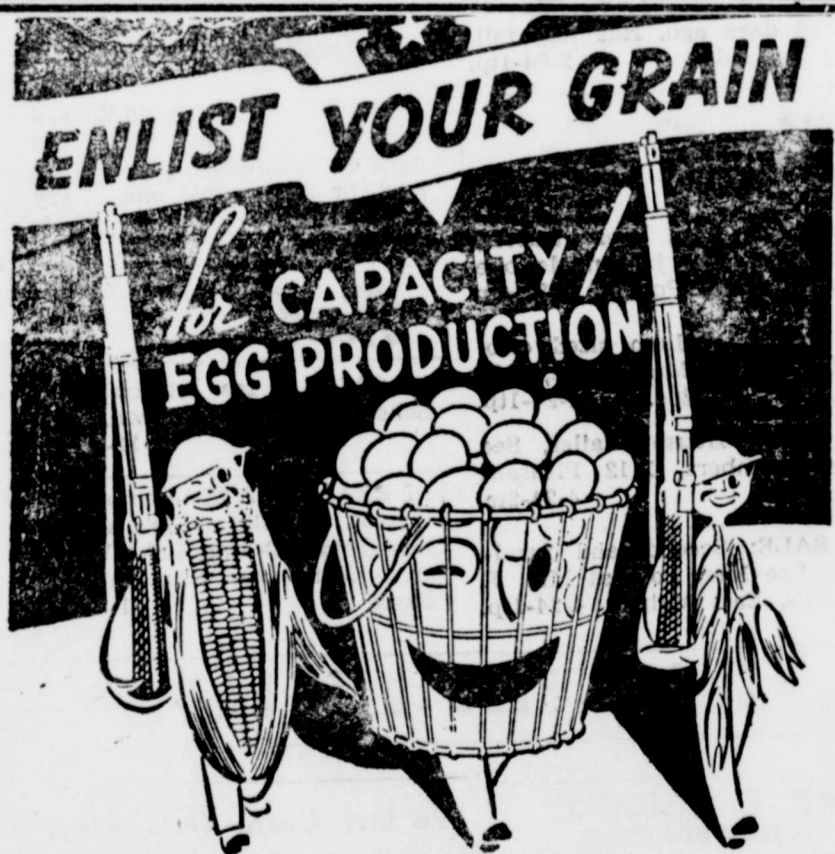

DVORAK MEMORIAL

Antonin Dvorak, Bohemian composer, wrote melodies which were recorded as "String Quartette in F. Major," Opus 96, in tiny Spillville, Iowa, in 1893. The composition consumed only 12 days. Later Dvorak wrote "Theme With Variations," part of which, rearranged by Violinist Fritz Kreisler, became known as "Indian Lament." So that the spirit of freedom which inspires men and women to create masterpieces of art in all forms shall endure forever, U. S. men are suffering and dying. 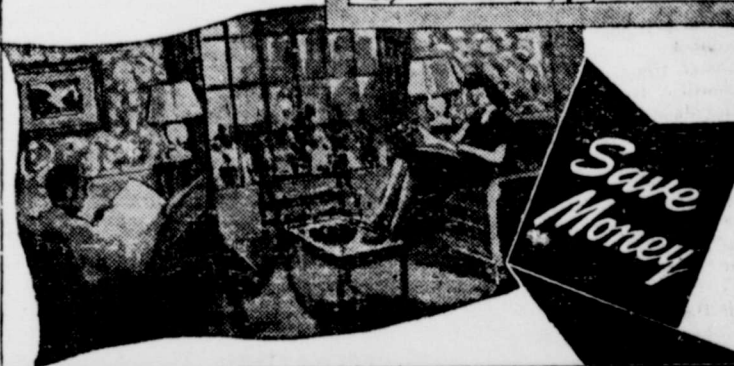

The Approach

Planned Economy was advocated in Germany by a small group of theorists as long ago as 1880. The large mass of politically minded Germans considered them harmless cranks and toyed with their ideas abstractedly for all of ten years before they saw danger in them. People who were loyal to the old Germany and its ways learned suddenly that Planned Economy was gaining popularity.

Serious consideration of Planned Economy started among conservative thinkers in Germany about half a century ago. Deliberate, Teutonic minds almost universally opposed the thought of manhandling economic laws which they recognized as natural laws, worthy of respect in any orderly society. Just the same, they saw in Planned Economy a powerful tool for rough work.

Something Different.

Fifteen or 20 years passed without much outward change. Planned Economy was still in the background. Everybody seemed conscious of it. More and more people admitted believing that parliaments had a right to enact written laws against the workings of competition as they understood it. In fact, every time a German became dissatisfied with conditions he thought about Planned Economy.

Finally 1914 came, bringing World War I. Germany quickly went all-out for Planned Economy. It was a shrewd political move. People reasoned feebly that open competition must cost something, and accepted the new order in the name of efficiency; to win the war. All industry went hurriedly under government control, and the dreams of yesterday's unpopular minority became the rule.

Monopolies Thrived.

Government managers eliminated new and growing industrial plants. Huge monopolies grew larger still. It was the easy way for government because a few big concerns are less trouble to manage than a large number of small ones. Competitors entered into cartels to hike prices and hide incompetence. They divided markets like pies and traded customers as if they were sheep.

Defeated in World War I, burdened with reparations, lame of manpower, Germany took a still bigger dose of government control. By 1935 Hitler was dictating to a race of conservatives who could still remember laughing at the economic planners and saying, "It can't happen here." Planned Economy had given way to National Socialism; in other words, plain dictatorship.

Like a Drug Habit.

We have Planned Economy in America now, a powerful weapon for rough work such as we are doing. But Planned Economy is still a habit-forming medicine. If America is to be prosperous again, this drug must be used sparingly. Rationing is effective if it's necessary, poisonous if it's not. Rationing, in its only safe form, is held to an irreducible minimum—not taken for effect. America's defenders and her allies must be fed. Also must be the people at home understand that their government is still a power that's friendly to them. Returning now to the easy rationing rules of last September and October would yield more support voluntarily than Hitler himself could get with his three-speed machine: (1) Planned Economy, (2) Regimentation, (3) Dictatorship.
