PARIS, March 19 (AP).—The American Third and Seventh Army Drives threatened 80,000 Germans with double entrapment today as the Germans attempted confused retreat from the rich Saarland. The Americans expanded their Rhine bridgehead where the collapsed Ludendorf span had been termed repairable.

Russian Offensive In Hungary Advances

LONDON March 19 (AP)—The new Russian offensive in Austria-Hungary advance to the north of Mor, 39 miles west of Budapest, Berlin announced today. Marshall Zhukov's division tightened the pressure to seize Stettin and the Oder's mouth to set up the spring drive on Berlin.

Witten And Hanan Hammered by RAF

LONDON, March 19. (AP).—RAF Heavy bombers hammered Witten and Hanan, two vital German communications center last night while Mosquitos delivered their 27th straight night raid on Berlin.

1,400 US Carrier Planes Bomb Japan Sun.

PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, GUAM. Mar. 19. (AP). Japan was bombed Sunday by 1,400 American carrier planes and 350 Superforts, with airplane and steel plants on Nagoya and Kyushu as their main targets.

Admiral Nimitz's announcement of the attack said it was being carried out by a "strong force of carrier aircraft."

1st Tactical Air Force B-26 Marauder Base-France, Major Byron L. McClellan of Gatesville is a new arrival in the ETP and has been assigned as a pilot in this medium bomber group in the AAF which supplied 79 of the 80 men who first bombed Tokyo. They participated in the Tunisian and Italian campaigns, Anzio, and Southern France. The group has the Distinguished Citation, Croix De Guerre with Palm, and is a component of the 1st Tactical Air Force.

After 24 months on the Pacific battlefield during which his Navy Seabee battalion served at Guadalcanal, Finschafen and in the Admiralty Islands, George S. Lam, Jr. CM 2-c of Rt. 2 Gatesville, has returned to the USA for leave.

He worked on the construction of the great naval base in the Admiralties which helped launch the blow at the Philippines.

Pvt. Kenneth D. Malone son of Mrs. J. H. Malone is somewhere in China. He is in radio and code work.

T-Sgt. James G. Pierce, grand-

son of Mrs. J. S. Torbett of Gatesville has been reported missing in action since February 7. He is a son of Mrs. Annie Pierce of Lampass who is well known in Gatesville. Sgt. Pierce was an engineer on a B-24 bomber of the 15th AAF in Italy. His plane failed to return after bombing with other aircraft the oil refineries at Moosbierbaum Austria. The pilot kept in touch with his base by radio and the last message received stated that he was ordering his crew to bail out over Maribor Yugoslavia. All of them are listed as "missing in action".

Pfc. Maurice E. Young, a cannoner, son of Mrs. Grace M. Young Rt. 2 Jonesboro is with the 5th Army in Italy, specifically the 346th F. A. Bn. which helped the doughboys take Monghidoro, 25 miles south of Bologna.

They opened up at Futa Pass to facilitate the breaching of the Gothic Line, and helped capture Poggio, and Pietramala and Loiano, guarding the approaches into the Po Valley.

It's initial mission was near Cecina last July 11, and on the Arno River they kept the Nazis frustrated while the infantry bridged the the water barrier. Their ammo was not big enough to blast out the concrete fortification of the hilltop village of Poggio, but they laid down such an effective concentration that the defenders were forced to cower in their placements while the doughboys moved into the town, dug out the Germans and took 200 prisoners.

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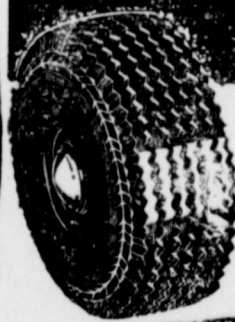

"I've seen Chinese and Negro soldiers sitting in trucks together and Burmese natives walking side by side with men of all faiths. There is certainly no caste system in the midst of war and no religious prejudices. Since we don't have bars to religion in war time it should be a part of our post-war plans to eliminate them in normal times." Thus said General Joseph Stillwell Commanding General of Army Ground Forces when he visited Camp Hood last week.
