HERE'S A LITTLE INSTRUCTION ON CLOTHING COLLECTED

Most urgently needed are the following: Collection starts April 1. Infant's Garments: All types are in urgent demand, particularly knit goods.

Men's and Boy's Garments: Overcoats, top coats, suits, coats, jackets, shirts, all types of work clothes, including coveralls etc., sweaters, underwear, robes, pajamas, knitted gloves.

Women's and girls': Overcoats, jackets, skirts, shawls, dresses, sweaters, underwear, aprons, jumpers, smocks robes, nightwear, knitted gloves.

Caps and knitted headwear: Serviceable heavy duty caps and knitted headwear (such as stocking caps) Women's hats, dress hats and derbies cannot be used.

Bedding: Blankets, afghans, sheets, pillow cases, quilts, Urns.

Shoes: Either oxfords or high shoes, or durable type with low or medium heels are desired. Shoes with high heels, open toes or open backs, evening slippers, and novelty types cannot be used. All shoes collected should be mated and tied securely into pairs.

Usable remnants, piece goods: Cut, or uncut materials, cottons, rayons, woolens, etc. One yard or more in length but not rags or badly damaged, dirty or wornout fabrics.

WASHINGTON March 22, (AP).—India-based Superfortresses bombed important military installations and storage areas at the great Burma port of Rangoon today, supporting British troops who have trapped 30,000 Japs in Central Burma.

3,000,000 Japs Evacuated From Tokyo

LONDON March 22. (AP).—Nearly 3,000,000 Japanese have already been evacuated from Tokyo, and steps are being taken to speed the removal of others, the Tokyo radio said today.

AUSTIN, March 22. (AP).—Parolees from the Gatesville State School For Boys at Gatesville, and the Gainesville State School for Girls at Gainesville, would not be released flat broke under terms of a bill passed by the House and sent to the Senate. The measure provides suitable clothing and \$5.00 be given each inmate upon release from the local funds of schools.

Russians Add Fury To Drive At Stettin

LONDON, March 22 (AP).—The Russians redoubled the fury of their onslaught against Stettin, "Key to Northern Germany", and in Hungary, reinforced attempts on a 50 mile front to batter thru the Danube Gate into Austria, the Germans said today.

West Of Rhine Nearly Cleared Of All Nazis

PARIS, March 22 (AP).—The American Third and Seventh Armies stamped out all but a few bewildered pockets of Germans west of the Rhine today, and formed numerous junctions in the Saarland and Palatinate in a mighty conquest probably costing the Germans well over 100,000 men.

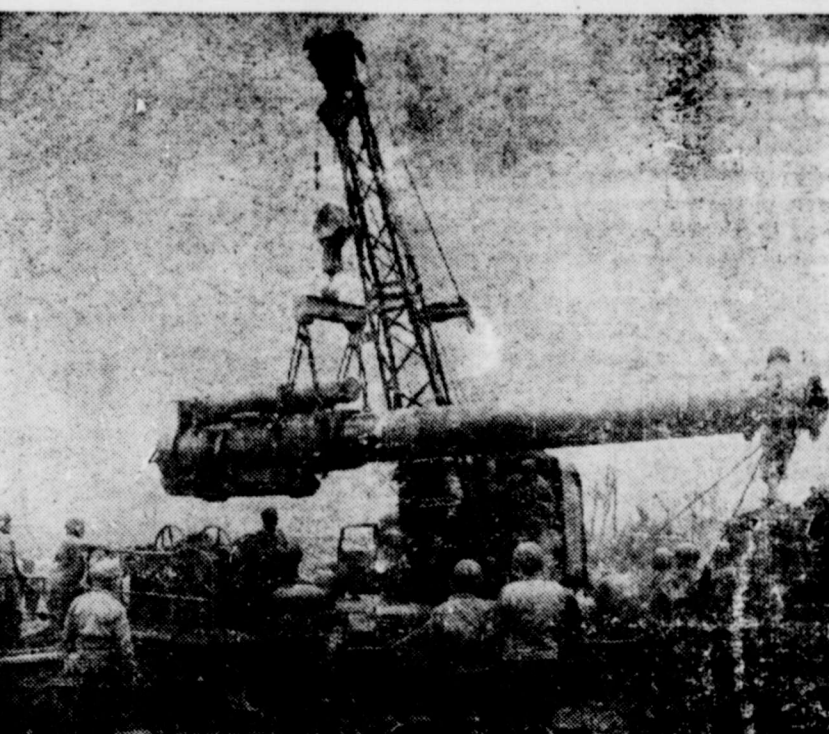

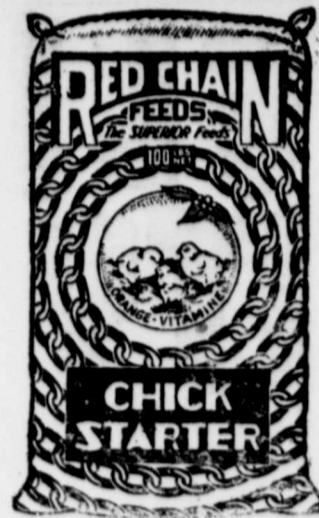

He sends a mimeographed sheet from this ship, an devidently, it was around Iwo, because it says: "this time, our job was to give heavy gunfire support to the Marines landing on Iwo Jima. We pounded the island for three days before the Marines landed, and then on D-Day when they came plowing in with their landing boats, the ships stood off the beach an dpoured tons of explosive steel into Iwo. It is an extinct volcano, and at the souther end is Mt. Suribachi, which was honeycombed with enemy guns and emplacements and proved to be a miniature rock of Gibraltar. This ship was the USS Texas.

He isn't far from me, so I might get to see him again, soon Here's a clipping from The Stars and Stripes, datelined at Simmerath, Germany, Feb. 1. "Doughboys of the 78th Division with attached tank unit pushed thru a shattered gap of the Siegfried Line yesterday to cross the headwaters of the Roer River 3 miles west of Monschau. More than 500 Nazis quit."

Got another card from my Pacific Seabee Correspondent, N. A. (Pat) Patterson--a comic V-Mail, and a note at the botom says: "Dear Mat: How's Gatesville getting along these days. Everything has been very quiet here lately and I hope it stays that way for a while. Have missed the paper, but guess I'll be getting it again soon. Good luck to you and yours. "Pat" Pat's awfully nice and hardly a month passes that we don't get some kind of a communication from him, wherever he is, and they've come in from a number of places. Thanks Pat.
