### Reds Smash Thru Bratislav Gap

LONDON, March 29. (AP)—The Red Army, smashing thru the shattered defenses of Bratislava Gap in the Danube Valley, has reached places along the Austrian frontier, it was reliably reported from Moscow today.

### Seven Injured When Tornado Hits Abner

Terrell, March 29. (AP).—Seven persons were injured some seriously when a tornado struck Abner community near here, demolishing homes. Four inches of rain accompanied the tornado.

### State May Get Back In Red

AUSTIN, March 29. (AP).—Warning that at the present rate of appropriating, the State's General Fund is in danger of getting back into the red, came from Governor Stevenson. He said the Legislature either will have to vote new tax bills raising additional revenue or 'be back on deficit'.

### British-American Armies Race Thru Break

PARIS, March 29. (AP).—British and American troops were today racing thru a wide break in German lines north of the Ruhr and were reported menacing Hannover, 142 miles from Berlin while the First Army shock troops moved to a point 207 miles southwest of the capital. The city of Duisburg ran up the white flag.

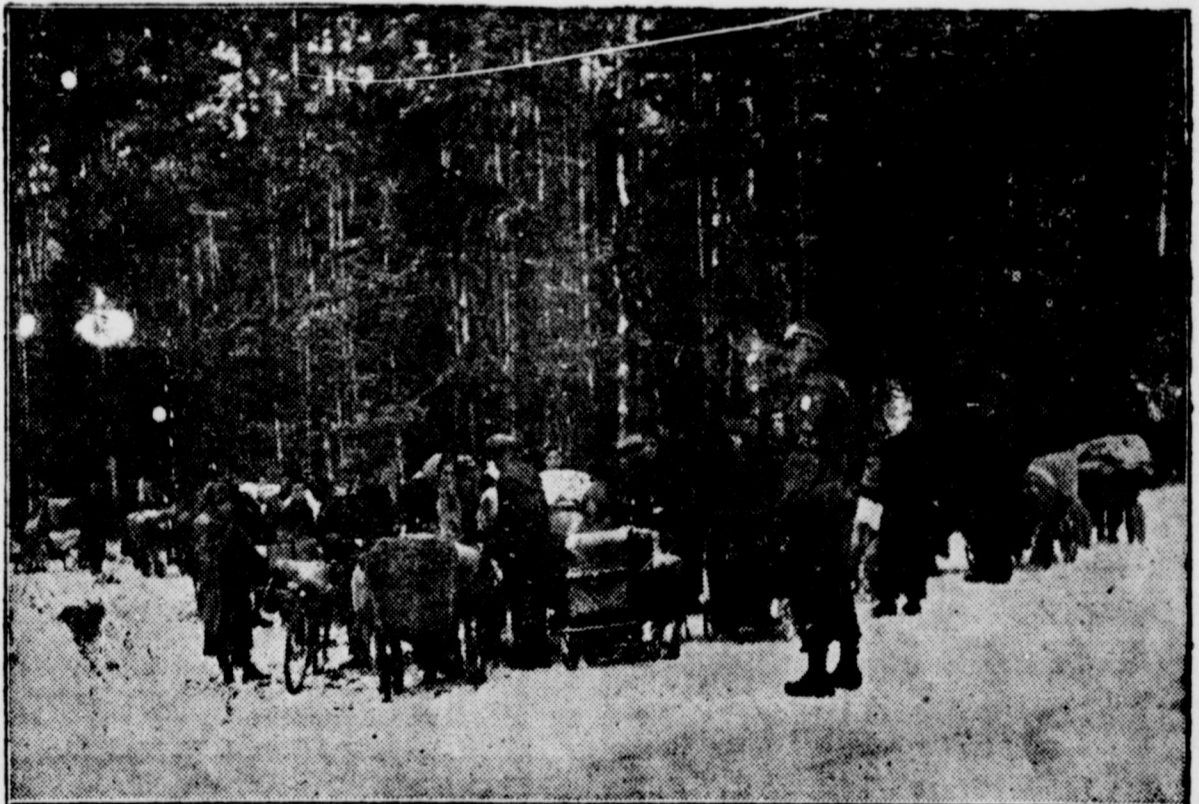

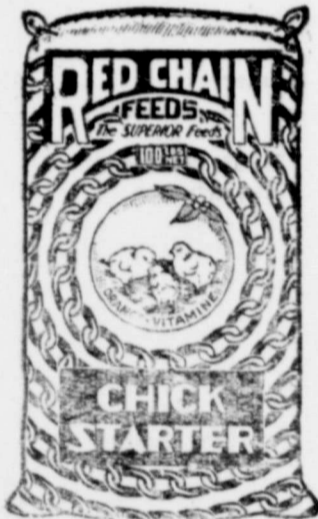

Certainly it's good economy to re-use your fats... but there's always some left over even after that...and that little is more important than you can imagine. Only one tablespoonful of used fat will help make 5 machine-gun bullets. So there just can't ever be too little to save! Come on, everybody, scrape your broiling pan, your roaster, skillet. Save meat trimmings and scraps of fat left on plates.



**OTHERS TELL ME:** "But my fats are often too dark to turn in." It doesn't make a mite of difference how dark or blackened...or what smelly things like onion or fish you've cooked in your fat. Every drop of it will help make parachutes, synthetic rubber, soaps for the fighting and war fronts. Don't feel ashamed to hand it in to your butcher. If you save every bit of fat you possibly can, you're doing a job to be proud of!



**THEN YOU HEAR:** "But what sort of container will I use?" Any kind of tin can will do. The next time you open a can of fruit or juice or soup or vegetables, save it. But please don't use glass...it almost always breaks and makes the fat difficult to salvage. When the can is full, take it to your butcher. For every pound, you'll get 2 red points. If you have any difficulty disposing of your fats, call your Home Demonstration or County Agent.

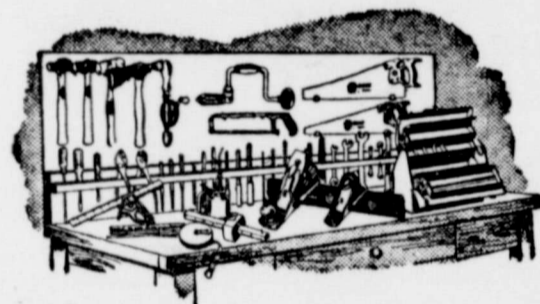

Undated (AP)--Unconfirmed Japanese broadcasts reported today that amphibious forces "attempting to invade" two Ryukyu Islands in center of area of announced air, naval, attacks that knocked out 25 Jap ships, crippled war industries in Japan, Formosa.

**RUSSIAN FOURTH LAUNCHED LONDON, March 27 (AP)--**A 4th Russian offensive has been launched toward Germany's southern mountain redoubt, Berlin announced today.

Moscow dispatches said enemy shifted divisions from Italy and sagging Western front to defend Vienna against not distant attack.

**3 ARMY AFTER FRANKFURT PARIS, March 27 (AP)--**The 3rd Army besieged Frankfurt on the Main today and sent tanks crashing across the Main at Aschaffenburg into the plains of central Germany. Bare 250 miles from the Russian lines.

Unconfirmed report said Frankfurt had been entered.

The Fourth Armored Division burst loose 40 miles beyond the Rhine. The Germans caught without time to blow Aschaffenburg Bridge.

The American Ninth, the British Second armies are ten miles past the Ruhr on a solid 31-mile front. A general breakthrough is expected momentarily.

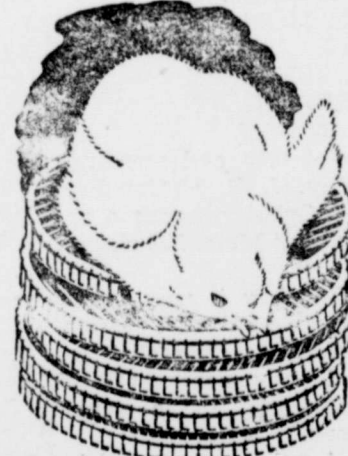
