GUAM, May 10 (AP).—400 superfortresses, the largest fleet ever attacking Japan bombed naval oil storage areas in Honshu, main home islands, and air fields on Kyushu and Shikoku today.

PARIS, May 10 (AP).—General Maxime Weygand, the last commander-in-chief of the French Republic, was arrested last night the Police disclosed today.

Nazi Dunkerque Garrison Surrenders

LONDON, May 10 (AP).—The Allied Luxembourg radio declared today that the German garrison at Dunkerque has surrendered.

Chinese Push Japs Back At Chihkiang

CHUNGKING, May 10 (AP).—The entire Japanese line in Western Hunan province where the enemy aimed an offensive at the American airbase at Chihkiang has been crumbled by a Chinese counter-offensive, the high command announced today.

"Scoring" For Discharges Announced

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP).—The War Department announced today the point score of 85 had been decided as the minimum required for discharge of ground, sea and air forces enlisted men.

Men with this total start moving next week for separation centers.

1. SERVICE CREDIT—one point for each month of army service since September 16, 1940 (more than 15 days be counted as full month.)

2. OVERSEAS CREDIT—One point each month overseas since September 16, 1940:

3. COMBAT CREDIT—5 points for each award of combat decorations since September 16, 1940.

4. PARENTHOOD CREDIT—12 points for each child under 18 up to the limit of three children.

Separate cric scores for each of services will be established in about 6 weeks.
