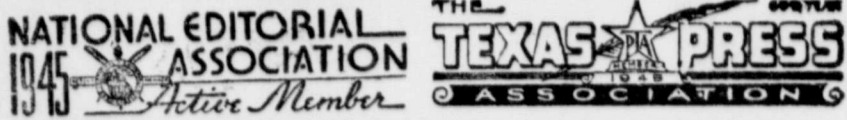

**Guns and Such**

Revolutions come from abuses of power, not from the normal use of it. I am not talking about wars in particular. All kinds of revolutionary developments fit themselves into much the same pattern. It would be hard to find a better illustration than the one presented by America's bewildering canon of statutes on the subject of firearms—their possession and use.

Guns are violent. They make men formidable. They add to the force of people who own and understand them. In some states, citizens walk unmolested in the street wearing side arms. In other states, any resident must buy a permit if he wants to keep his great-grandfather's "Revolutionary flintlock" at home in a glass case. The difference is no political whimsy.

**Matter Of Abuse**

It would take a big book to tell why guns are prohibited in some sections and winked at in others. If the whole story were told, however, it would add up to this: Wherever the right to own arms has been abused, an indignant public sentiment has welled up demanding laws against them, enacted and enforced. Without popular approval it is hard to enforce any law, wise or otherwise.

A few days ago I wrote a prediction that the American people some day would rise up and enact laws requiring compulsory arbitration of labor disputes. Since I penned those lines I have been in several states and talked with men who are close to the public pulse. Almost all of them share my fears as well as my slender hope that compulsory arbitration never comes.

**Need Never Happen**

Outlawing strikes, a threat plain to see, would be an unnecessary calamity. No detail of human freedom should be sacrificed to anything but public safety. Strikes, like guns, have their uses. If outlawed, all working people (not unions only) will suffer a setback; lose the gains of many toilsome years. If I might advise Labor, I would say, "Clean your gun and put it away." Don't make such action necessary.

Civilization has made progress at times by force of arms. Just so, a large group of people have made wholesome advances by force of the power to strike. Being disarmed would weaken them, and they are likely to be disarmed because the public is weary of violence. The war is over and peace has problems that can't be solved by rattling sabers or carrying banners in torch parades.

**Hear Henry Wallace**

Writing about pressure groups in his recent book, "60 Million Jobs," Secretary Wallace said: "Any one group can, for a time, get a larger share of the national income but it doesn't work when all try it at the same time. Sooner or later the pressure game will blow up in our faces. This is . . . practical arithmetic. Unless we learn it, our future is black indeed."

Elsewhere he wrote: "In labor-management cooperation lies the very hope of . . . jobs. With mutual understanding between labor and management, in the difficult years ahead, we stand our best chance of getting good wages for labor, good prices for the farmer, stable profits for business men and a higher standard of living for those who need it most." Henry Wallace is a friend of Labor, but he foresees danger.

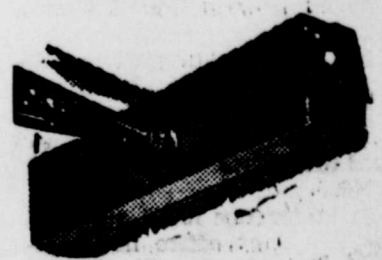

#### TO THE PEOPLE OF CORYELL COUNTY

In an opinion of the Attorney General of Texas has ruled that persons who were exempt from the payment of a poll tax from physical disabilities such as being blind, deaf or dumb, those who have lost a hand or foot, those permanently disabled, and all disabled veterans of foreign wars, where such disability is 40 percent or more must pay one dollar constitutional poll tax before they are qualified to vote.

This in no way effects the soldiers right to vote without a poll tax unless he has been out of service 18 months. In other words a man discharged before May 5, 1945 must have a poll tax receipt before he is qualified to vote in the General Election which will be held November 5, 1946.

According to this opinion then every person between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a poll tax receipt to be able to vote in next years elections, unless he has been in the service of the United States Army, Navy, United States Merchant Marines, since May 5, 1945.

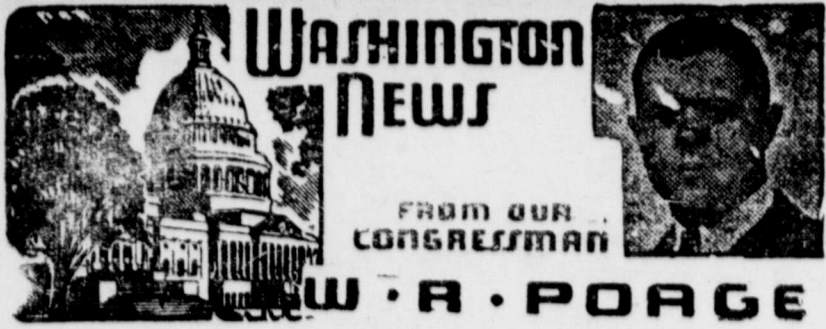

Dear Friends:

This letter is written on Thursday (November 15) rather than on Friday, as the House will not be in session tomorrow, and I have promised to go to North Carolina to speak to a farm meeting. I hope to be able to come home the last of this month and attend the State meeting of the farm bureau at Waco on the 28th. If I am able to do this, I expect to also attend the state convention of the R. E. A.

Cooperatives in Austin on the next day.

Washington is having its cold spell. We had tomatoes, carrots, and egg plants out of our garden just a week ago. It is most unusual for winter to hold off so long up here.

Today General Eisenhower appeared before the House Military Affairs Committee. He drew a big crowd. I was unable to attend as I had to go before the Rules Committee at the same time. Along with other members of the Agriculture Committee, I sought to get the Rules Committee to give right of way to the "Pace Bill". This bill is essential if we are to ever receive recognition of the right of the farmer to equal consideration with other elements of our society. It seems so fair and just to me that I simply can't understand the attitude of the Chairman of the Rules Committee, who with some others, is trying to kill the bill. He says he objects to including the labor of the farmer and of his family in the parity formula. I can see no reason why we should not be concerned with the labor of the men and women and boys and girls who work in sun and wind of the fields just as we are with those who work in factories. I am trying to include all farm labor costs in the calculation of parity. Even then we will only have a measuring stick. We must still fight to get parity.

General Eisenhower is expected to present arguments in favor of a unified Army-Navy control; compulsory military training; and new contributions on the part of the United States to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration. While it has been reported that the British Prime Minister was also interested in getting the United States to advance some substantial sum as a loan, gift, or grant to Great Britain, he has not so far made any official statement to that effect.—He has doubtless decided that many Americans feel as I do; that we should try to help these people, but that they in turn should be willing to pay their way as far as they can, even to the extent of selling us all their western hemisphere possessions and giving us an opportunity to travel and

trade freely with other parts of the world.

On November 13, Mr. Atlee addressed a joint session to the Congress. His predecessor, Mr. Churchill had vsted here several times and was extremely popular. Mr. Atlee was a decided handicap inasmuch as he is not a great orator as was Mr. Churchill, but he made a very interesting and appealing plea for better understanding of his labor party government and for international cooperation. He lacks all of Churchill's great eloquence and showmanship, but he was frank and courteous, and I thought he was very well received. He was accompanied by Hon. McKenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, who received a great ovation when he entered the Chamber. I believe that these visits from the heads of other governments cannot but help to bring about a better feeling and understanding even though they may not accomplish any immediate, tangible results.

The joint committee investigating Pearl Harbor finally began its hearings today. In spite of a poor start, I am still hopeful that this committee will give the American public all the facts, not only in regard to Pearl Harbor itself, but also in regard to the crimes of the military government in Hawaii and the loss of our air force in the Philippines several hours after the attack.

**FAMOUS U. S. ARMY DIVISIONS**

**101st AIRBORNE DIVISION**



Screaming Eagle

**THE SCREAMING EAGLE**—that's the nickname of the 101st Airborne Division—holds the Distinguished Unit citation for the epic defense of Bastogne in the Belgian bulge operation against a vastly superior foe. It was the first time in the history of the American Army that a unit larger than a regiment received the award. Paradoxically the airborne troops traveled, not by plane, parachute and glider, but by Army trucks, in rushing to the front for their most historic battle. Although completely surrounded, the Division held firm against the fiercest Nazi attacks and refused to surrender. It was credited with being one of the greatest single factors which blunted the enemy's drive.

The Division was activated in August, 1942, and sailed in September, 1943, its component units at that time being the 321st and 907th Glider Field Artillery Battalions; 502d, 506th Parachute Infantry Regiments; 377th Parachute Field Artillery Battalion, and 401st and 427th Glider Infantry Regiments. It trained in England until the opening of the European campaign, June 6, 1944.

On D-Day the 101st made its airborne landing in France and began its march across Normandy. Strong resistance was met near Ste. Marie du Mont but the Division fought through to Carantou and on D-Day plus six liberated that French city. It went into action again in December, this time to write a memorable chapter in American military history. Its assignment was to hold against the mighty winter effort of General Von Rundstedt in the enemy push designed to shove the Allied forces back and roll into France once again. In a short time the Division was cut off from other units, ammunition and blood plasma had to be dropped from the air and the enemy asked it to surrender. Maj. Gen. (the Brig. Gen.) Anthony C. McAuliffe, who commanded the 101st at Bastogne, gave the classic answer, "Nuts!" The Germans renewed their attacks but the Division held steadfast and was reached by the 4th Armored, causing the enemy to recoil.

In February, 1945, the 101st was placed in the Seventh Army in action near Strasbourg and by March had plunged into vital areas of the Reich. In April it speeded toward Hitler's Berchtesgaden retreat and in towns near there captured high ranking Nazi officials. By the war's end the Division had reached Berchtesgaden itself. Maj. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor commanded the Division in the European theater.

The shoulder patch is a black badge with a black arc streaming above. On the badge is a white screaming eagle. Appearing on the arc, in white, is "Airborne."

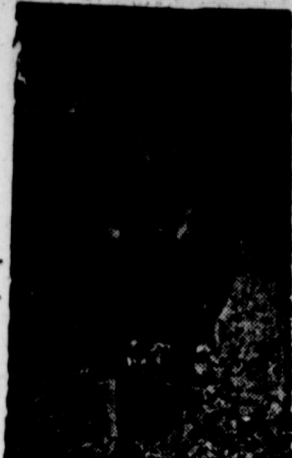

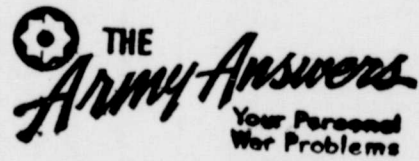

training entitled to a pension?

A. If the injury is the result of the pursuit of such training and not the result of his own wilful misconduct, his claim will be rated and an award made just as if the disability was incurred in service.

Q. If a copy of the Public record of death is not available as evidence in a claim before the veterans administration, what will be accepted in lieu of this record?

A. If a copy of the public record cannot be obtained, death certificate or report issued by the proper official shall be secured. If such proof is unobtainable, the reasons should be stated and the fact of death established by affidavit of persons who have personal knowledge thereof and have viewed the remains, stating to their best it was the body of the deceased and setting forth all the facts and circumstances concerning death, including date and place thereof. The evidence which from the nature of the case, appears the best proof available must be furnished.

Q. What is a statutory award as it applies to pension paid by the Veterans Administration?

A. A statutory award is an award determined by statute, in which a specific amount is payable in contradistinction to benefits rated on a percentage basis.

Q. By paying additional premiums may the insured on a National Service Policy have a disability clause added?

A. No provisions are made for the payment of disability benefits. The only such benefits associated with National Service Life Insurance is the waiver of premiums

for total disability continuing 6 months or longer.

Q. What becomes of compensation or pension accruing to the veteran at the time of his death?

A. It may be paid to his widow child or children or dependent parents in the order named upon application. Payment may be made to the person who bore the expense of last illness or burial provided no preferred claim is made.

Q. May a veteran receive a loan guaranty to refinance an existing loan?

A. Only in case the mortgage has matured and the debt is in default.

Q. What is readjustment Allowance?

A. Readjustment Allowance is a monetary benefit payable to eligible veterans of World War II who have not been able to obtain satisfactory employment. It is intended to assist the veterans in making economic readjustment to civil life. It might be called unemployment allowance. In Texas it is payable upon application by the Texas unemployment compensation commission.

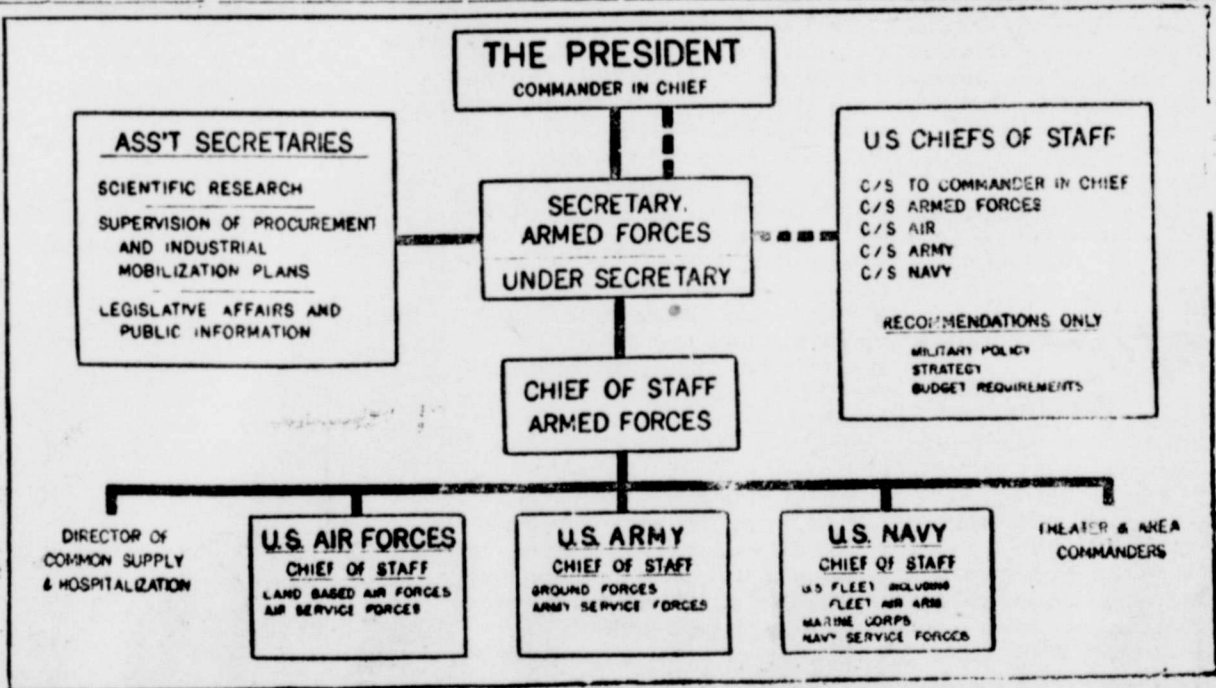
