At 8:30 Tuesday evening of this week, Gatesville had a new mayor. Former Mayor H. K. Jackson swore in Dr. K. R. Jones to this post, after the ballots had been canvassed by Aldermen Sadler and Cummings. The official count was as the News reported it last Friday.

Before the swearing in, bills and accounts were read and approved, also, the 2-year audit of the previous administration, which by the way showed a nice record, approval was made of the purchase of a truck from the War Assets Corporation.

Following Jones being sworn in, he in turn swore in the new Aldermen, Donald McKinney and Jim McClellan, also, City Secretary El'and Lovejoy, who's new bond was approved, and then, Police Chief Rufus Butteson, night policeman H. B. Sims, night watchman R. A. Wicker, and his substitute, J. M. Sims.

The new council okehed the idea of a rat extermination campaign, plans were okehed for opening of the swimming pool, the date to be announced later; voted to pay for water tower reconditioning and painting, with a 10 year guarantee, cost, \$4,500; authorized purchase of car of asphalt for street repair.

Dr. Stonewall Jackson McMurry, 83, pioneer Presbyterian minister, and state clerk emeritus of the Presbyterian synod, passed away in a Brownwood hospital at 10:15 a. m. Tuesday.

Dr. McMurry was born in Valley Mills May 13, 1862. In September, 1888 he was married to Miss Blanche McKee of Robinson. He received degrees from Austin college and from the University of Texas, and was one of the first students at the Austin Seminary. He was formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church in Gatesville.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p. m. Wednesday at the Presbyterian church at Robinson. Dr. W. R. Hall of Marlin assisted by Dr. Gaines B. Hall of Gatesville and Dr. C. P. Caldwell of Waco officiating, burial was in Robinson cemetery.

He is survived by two sons, Lt. Cmdr. Jan A. McMurry of Banana River, Fla., and McKnight McMurry of Bangs; one daughter, Mrs. Percy Owens of Pittsburgh, Texas; nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Realizing the need of a permanent organization to deal with such a vital matter, the Texas Safety Association was permanently organized in June 1938 to continue this important work.

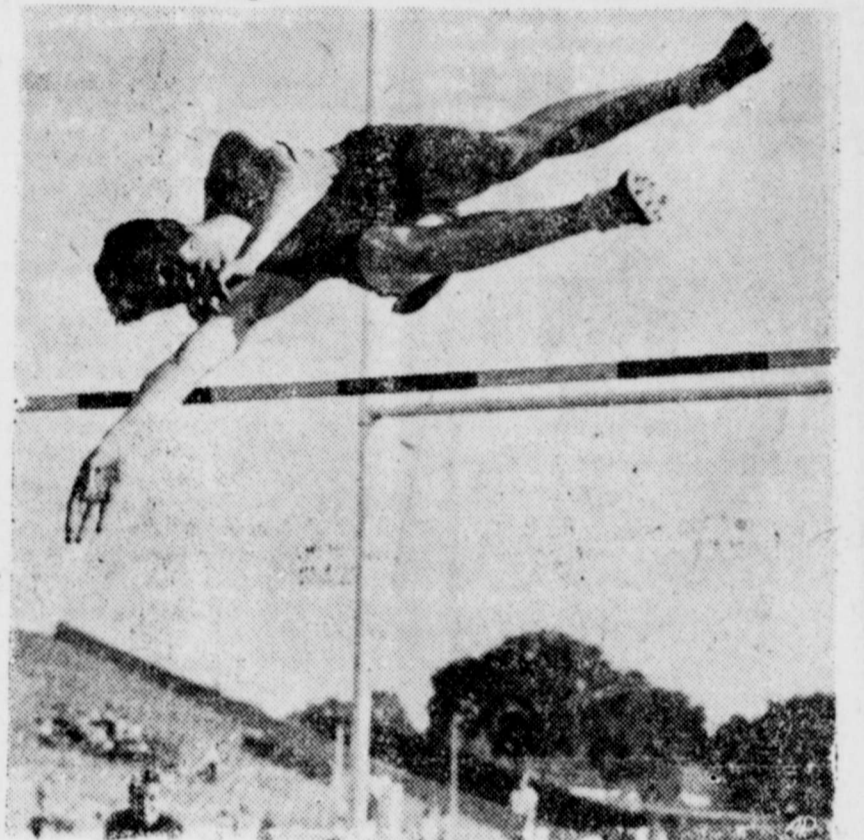
