\$30,000 Available For Conservation Practices

Farmers desiring to carry out conservation practices are reminded to apply to the County ACA Office for a prior approval before work is started on the practices. Requests may be filed in person by letter or by phone.

The Coryell County ACA Committee still has approximately \$30,000 to use in issuing prior approvals on conservation practices of drilling wells for livestock water, mowing permanent pastures construction of terraces, diversion terraces, drainage ditches, earthen dams and reservoirs, growing green manure crops of summer legumes, application of phosphate other than raw rock phosphate, control of destructive plants (cedar, mesquite and prickly pear) on pasture and range land.

Sheep, Lamb And Beef Subsidy Ends June 30

Subsidy payments will not be made to producers on sheep, lambs and beef cattle sold for slaughter after midnight June 30, 1946. In order to receive payment on sheep, lambs and beef cattle sold prior to midnight June 30, 1946, the producer must present sales receipts from the slaughterer, to whom the animals were sold, to the County ACA Office within 60 days from the date of the sales receipts.

Rat Extermination Campaign To Begin Here July 9

July 9, under the personal direction of a Mr. Adair of the Rat Extermination Extension Service of A & M, Gatesville will again try to get the rats.

The de-ratting will be sponsored by the city in an effort to prevent typhus which is the worst end of it, not to mention the rats.

Recruiting Office To Stay Open In Waco Saturday and Sunday

The Waco U. S. Army Recruiting Office, located at Room 215-Post Office Bldg. will remain open all day Saturday and Sunday, June 29th and 30th. This action is taken to facilitate the handling of all enlistees taking advantage of the June 30th deadline on Family Allowances, reenlistment in grade within three months after discharge and enlistments in grade commensurate with previous training.

All men enlisting before June 30th will receive all benefits of family allowances for their period of enlistment. Those enlisting after June 30 will receive family allowances only for the duration plus six months.

BREAD TO BE RATIONED IN BRITAIN

LONDON, June 27 (AP)—Bread will be rationed throughout Britain beginning July 21, Food Minister John Strachey announced today in Commons. Flour will also be rationed. The basic bread ration will be nine ounces daily for adults. Manual workers will receive 15 ounces and expectant mothers eleven.

COKE PICKS JESTER AND SELLERS, RUN-OFF

AUSTIN, June 27 (AP)—Governor Coke R. Stevenson predicted today that Buford Jester and Grover Sellers will be in the run-off for the Democratic nomination for Governor. He said he believed that Homer P. Rainey would run third.

News Selected As The Gallup Poll Interviewers Here

The News has been honored by being selected as interviewer for The Gallup Poll, which is known as the American Institute of Public Opinion, with headquarters at Princeton University, Princeton, N. J.

Dr. George Gallup founded the institute in 1935, and it's familiarly known as "The Gallup Poll".

Newspapers (dailies) buy the information the poll furnishes and that's the way the work is financed.

Questions are asked on all important questions of the day, and all kinds of people are interviewed. The object is to get a cross section of opinion all over the United States, and to form predictions from the interviews.

All answers used locally are mailed to Princeton, and no record is kept here of who was interviewed, what they said, in fact, when we have interviewed and mailed the papers, what we know is only what e can remember and of course, that is very little.

The News is rather proud of its being selected as the local representative of the Gallup Poll. Incidentally, The Dallas Morning News is one of the Texas papers using The Gallup Poll.

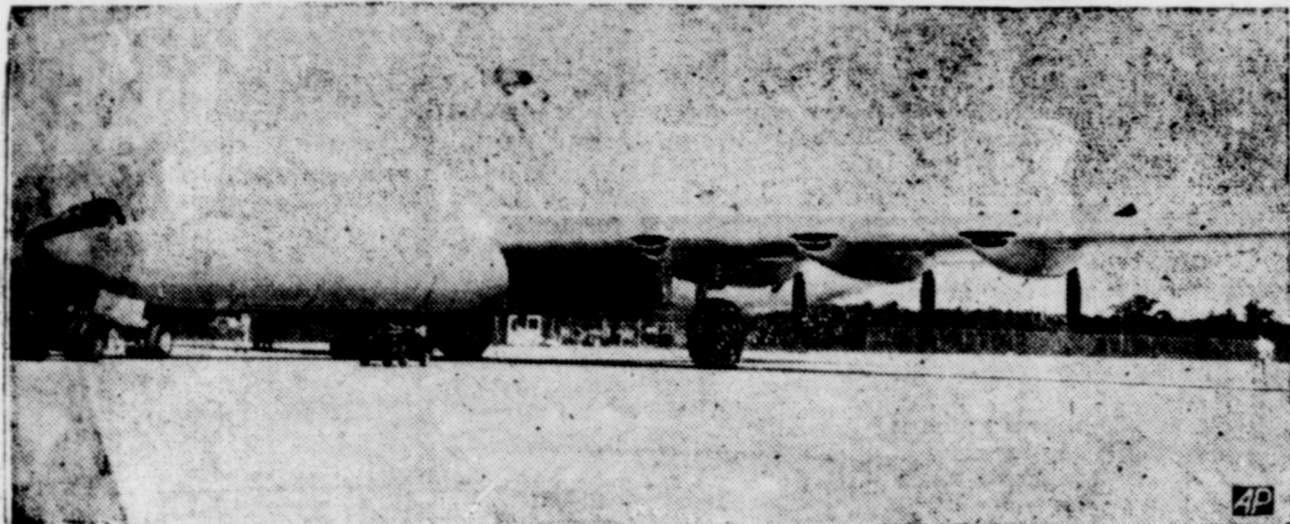
