DR. HOMER RAINEY SPEAKS FIRST HERE IN RUNOFF CAMPAIGN

Dr. Homer P. Rainey, one of
the run-off candidates in the
Governor's race spoke in Gats-
ville Saturday afternoon at 3 be-
fore a sizeable crowd variously
estimated at 1500 to 2500.

The runner-up candidate lashed
out in sharp words against the
leader, Beauford Jester.

In punchy, one-sentence para-
graphs, the deposed president of
the University of Texas reflected
none of the professional influence
that marked some of his first pri-
mary speeches as he materially
altered the tenor or his cam-
paigning.

Uses Many Phrases

He cried out repeatedly against
"use of wicked tactics" against
him, "deceitful political tricks" an
unprecedented "storm of slander,
name calling and personal abuse",
a "vicious and wicked character
assassination conspiracy," "scand-
al mongers," and efforts "to cru-
cify Homer Rainey upon a cross
of falsehoods."

The phrase "professional politi-
cians" familiar to the campaigns
of W. Lee O'Daniel, also cropped
up in the educator's lambasts.

Thanking the nearly 300,000
who voted for him he said:
"We fought against the most
tremendous odds and the most
wicked tactics ever known.

"We are going to win this fight.
"Now the issue is drawn".

Facts Promised People.

It is a fight, he continued, of
"reaction against progressive de-
mocracy; do-nothingism against
action; entrenched wealth and
greed against the interests of the
people; glittering generalities and
vague promises against specific
proposals for a greater Texas;
slime and slander against clean,
sincere and forthright principles."

The people must understand the
issues and facts, he said, promis-
ing "We are going to see that they
get the facts."

Then he delivered fifteen charges
pointed against his opponent and
forces he contended were support

WILLIE EASLEY JAILED MURDER CHARGE: ALICE JACKSON VICTIM

In a disturbance in the colored
section of Gatesville late Satur-
day evening Willie Easley, colored
is alleged to have shot and killed
Alice Jackson, also colored.

Weapon used was said to have
been a .20 guage "long tom" shot-
gun. The discharge entered her
left breast and she died shortly
afterward. Easley was taken in
charge by Deputy Sheriff Eric
Sharp, and placed in the local
jail.

Burley Moree, formerly employ-

Mattress Factory was jailed here
on a charge of theft over \$50, af-
ter he was alleged to have taken
around \$375.00 while Eddie Win-
field was on a vacation. He also

amounts due on the car.

EARTHQUAKE HITS DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

CUIDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, Aug. 5
(AP)—Fresh tremors shook the Dominican Republic
today after yesterday's violent earthquake in the Carib-
bean area. Reports indicate yesterday's earthquake cen-
tered in the deepest hole of the Atlantic and so intense
it was that it knocked out recording seismographs in St.
Louis Mo., 2,000 miles away. No immediate reports
were given of damage or casualties.

MOLOTOV REJECTS BRITISH PROPOSAL AT UN

PARIS, France, August 5 (AP)—The Soviet Foreign
Minister today rejected a British proposal for the Peace
Conference to vote on recommendations either by two-
thirds or a simple majority.

JEWS REJECT BRITISH-AMERICAN PLAN

LONDON, England, August 5. (AP) — The Jewish
Agency Executive committee flatly rejected today the
British-American Committee's Proposal to divide Pales-
tine into federal states. The British government sources
said Prime Minister Atlee would ask his Ministers to
submit the Palestine problem to the United Nations if
President Truman also rejects the plan.

H. J. R. No. 49
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring right-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration

fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating and interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto

H. J. R. No. 62

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent

Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State of Texas Veterans of the present war or war, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds of the sale of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purpose of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such

result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

ing him. The phrase "People's Path" preceded each. Main ones include:

That "Texas is being ruled by a political hierarchy" controlled by "selfish minority interests."

That Jester "is the choice of that small but powerful group" which also dictated his program.

That Jester "has ridden into the runoff campaign under a smokescreen of mud-slinging, falsification and distortion uttered by other candidates."

'They' Blamed for HCL

That "they" are so confident of continuing in power they have increased the cost of living in Texas.

That Jester helped bring about the increase in the price of gasoline to benefit oil companies while doing "nothing to remove the ceiling on pensions."

That Jester made trips to Washington to get the ceiling on oil prices lifted.

That Jester's "People's Path" slogan is a catch phrase to fool the people, coined by a Dallas advertising expert "who has had as clients the Texas Regulars, and Republican Committee for Constitutional Government."

Other charges were that the ceiling on pensions was a "deceitful political trick" that Jester had not denounced, that it was sponsored by the same interests financing Jester's campaign; that Jester has not denounced personal slanders against Rainey; and that he had failed to support Democracy in 1944.

It was his program on education, health, social security and farm-to-market roads, to be financed with an increased tax of 2c a barrel on oil and 2c a thousand feet on natural gas.
