Scott Airport Decided Asset to Coryell County

Irving Scott, whose enterprise has given Gatesville and Coryell County a modern airport is looking forward with sanguine expectations to the time when steps will be taken for improvements that will link up the port for feeder-line service, especially as to airmail.

Pictured above is a view of the Scott Airport, photographed from the air, which shows a section of the picturesque 55-acre tract of land, located two miles east of Gatesville on Highway 84. Among the buildings to be seen more distinctly are the larger structures of the four hangars, one of which is 140 x 160 feet, and the other 50 x 60 feet, erected of galvanized iron and practically fireproof. Other improvements are repair shops, where (skilled mechanics are always "on the job" to keep trainer and commercial planes ready to take off at any time and guaranteed to be in condition for a happy landing. The runways are sodded, but many of the larger planes traveling the airways through this section land and take off there with perfect safety.

Mr. Scott, a pilot, and, of course, an enthusiastic air-traveler, started building the airport some three years ago, and for some months has conducted a flying school under Civil Aeronautics Authority with two instructors, B. B. Chandler, civilian instructor during World War II, and B. L. Bounds in the service with the U. S. Army Air Forces during the recent conflict. Twenty students are enrolled, several of whom are GIs. The roll of students is continuously growing, as well as the patronage of the airport in commercial

service. Going up for a "spin in the air" is also getting to be a very popular holiday and Sunday diversion, and private owners of planes and prospective owners are taking lessons in order to be able to pilot their "birds", and altogether the scenes at the air port day after day and night after night indicate that Gatesville and Coryell countians are living on an air artery of Texas, and are truly moderns.

In a recent interview with Irvin Scott, the airman said, "It does not take a prophet to see

the part airplanes are to have in the program of transportation throughout the United States and the world as to that, even in the immediate future. The two last wars were eye-openers as to the possibilities of the plane, and especially as to the almost unlimited power and facilities of air freight and passenger carriers. Dear Friends:
The Republican Majority in the House seems to be considerably sobered by its assumption of power. It has been most interesting to observe the Republican, who a few weeks ago loudly proclaimed that they were going to cut all income taxes by 20%, maintain the essential functions of government including our highways, and at the same time balance the budget. Just ten days ago they said they were going to wipe out all the wartime excise taxes at once. They

have the votes to do as they please, but now they say they are going to continue all excise taxes and they talk rather softly about cutting income taxes as they first promised.

While I believe that we can and should reduce excise taxes on such items as picture shows, telephone bills and railroad tickets, I can see no justification for taking the tax off furs, whiskey, jewels, and other luxuries. Possibly we will be able to cut our expenditures somewhat lower than recommended by the President and thereby be able to increase the exemptions granted to income tax payers, particularly in the low brackets, but we simply cannot make the kind of cuts some people have talked of and maintain any of the programs that have meant so much to our people. I intend to vote to con-

tinue such programs as R. E. A., soil conservation, flood control, highways, etc. I know that these programs cost money and that the money must be raised by taxation. I propose to vote to pay the bill. I know of no better time to pay than while income is high.

I have also been concerned over the reluctance of the Republicans to actually tackle the labor problem. Before Congress convened, they talked very loudly about what they were going to do to stop the big strikes. I still hope they come up with a solution. If they do, I will gladly go along and help them, but for the last several days I have noticed many of my Republican friends appear disposed to avoid conversation on this subject. I have repeatedly stated that our labor laws should be so amended as to make unions and their members just as responsible for their acts and on their contracts as are corporations. Unions should have to account to their members, and they should not be allowed to place communists and foreigners in union offices, nor should they be allowed to use violence or so called "chain picketing" to prevent others from working. It has been said that we now have laws against violence and that new laws would not help. Our present laws are against individuals who engage in violence. It is true they are ineffectual, but if we make the unions themselves responsible for the acts of their members as the corporations are now liable for the acts of their agents, I think we would soon put a stop to much of the beating up of workers, the overturning of cars and the destruction of property that now goes on. I have supported such legislation, and I expect to do so again if given a chance.

When the Texas Delegation met this year, I was elected Vice-Chairman. It has long been the practice of our Delegation to eat lunch together each Wednesday and to discuss matters of general interest to our State. These meetings have been held in the Speaker's Dining Room. While Speaker Martin has graciously allowed us to continue our meetings there temporarily, we do not know how long we can continue to meet there.

Under the Reorganization Act, each Committee is supposed to investigate matters affecting the subject matter under its jurisdiction. The Senate seems to be having considerable trouble in following this rule which was intended to eliminate the need for a number of special investigation committees by conferring that work on the regular committees. In the House we are trying to carry out this policy and the Agriculture Committee has appointed a sub-committee to investigate food shortages. Actually this sub-committee is expected to continue the work that was commenced by the Special Committee of which Hon. Clint Anderson was first Chairman. I was one of the three Democrats given a place on this sub-committee. Our first hearings will be in connection with the sugar shortage. I am not going to promise that we will be able to abandon sugar rationing, but we surely want to see if there is not some way to get more sugar for the American people.

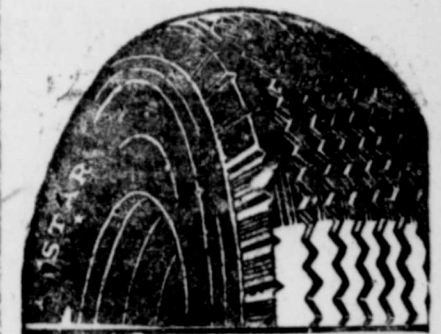

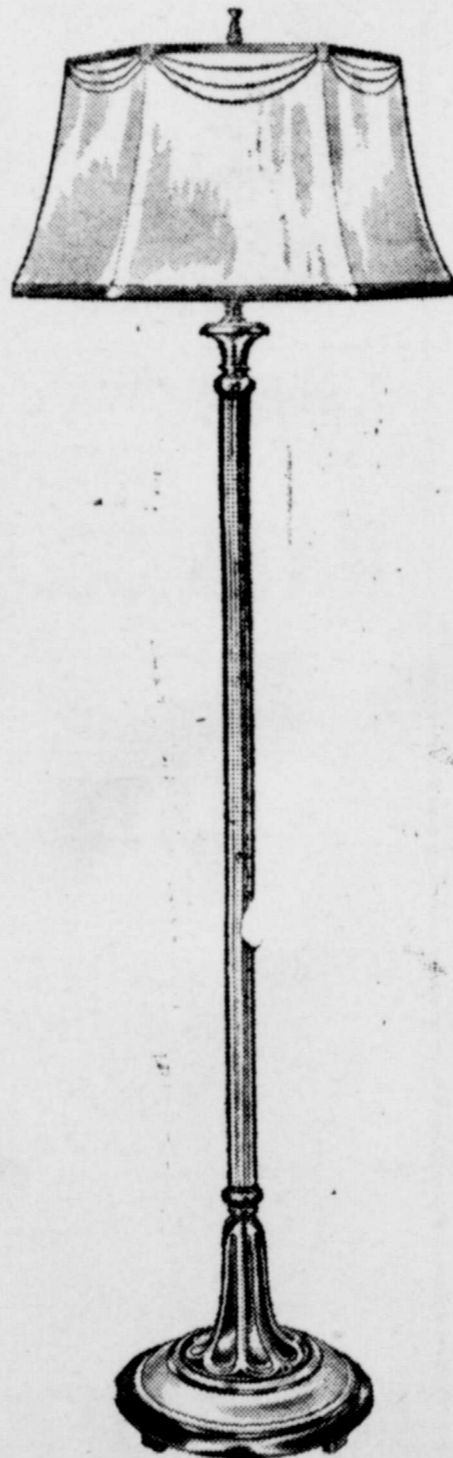

Dear Friends:

It's been going on for years and years, but it still doesn't make sense. It costs you \$4,000 a day to pay and supply your state legislature, while it is in session; and this first week has cost you \$28,000.00.

What has been done for this money? Practically nothing, is the answer. It has been a week of "organization." We spent two hours electing a speaker who was already elected before we met, since he had no opponent. But many long speeches were made in favor of him. The next day "resolutions" were introduced, passed, and then we adjourned for the week-end. Today, we sat around all morning while the votes in the governor's race were counted. Then we went through the motions of "electing" Jester governor and adjourned. Tomorrow, (for another \$4,000) we will meet go through a few motions, then adjourn for the governor's inauguration.

Yes, all these doings are very impressive. Ceremony is necessary in a thing like running a government and we expect a certain amount. But, believe me, Texas certainly goes the limit in putting on pomp and show.

Everything we did this whole first week could have easily been done the first day we met. Why wasn't it done? Simply because

"first weeks" have been wasted in endless ceremonies since longer than anyone can remember, so that's the way it's done now.

Later on, there will be long hard days. Things will pile up and when the time comes to end the session, there will be still hundreds of things to do, proposed laws not even taken out of the hopper, resolutions unconsidered, appropriations unmade, and on and on. It happens every session. But, still, the legislature persists in wasting a large percent of its time, now and later on.

All this is just between you and me. I haven't said anything about it down here yet. I don't propose to do anything about it, not yet. Like other new members, I'm just getting acquainted and keeping my eyes open. You don't make friends by coming down here and criticising right off the bat, and friends are the best things to have when you're trying to represent your district.

But, late on when we can get a better line on things, we'll try to do something to cut out a lot of this waste. The advice of a few good business men or a few thrifty farmers could save the State hundreds of thousands of dollars.

In these days when everybody is crying for more money, and the legislature is hard put to find it for them, we might look right under our noses down here and find large sums of it—large sums that nothing but time consumes, wasted time.

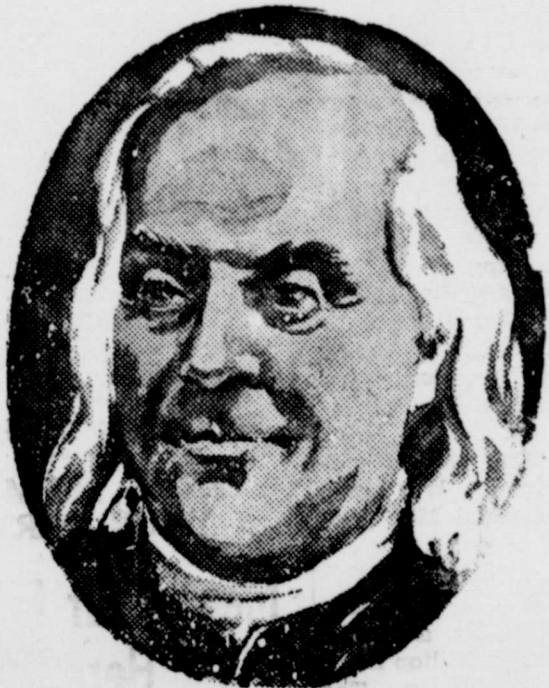

Mrs. Billy Thompson graciously received the members of the Wednesday Bridge Club this week at her home for a few hours diversion at their favorite game.

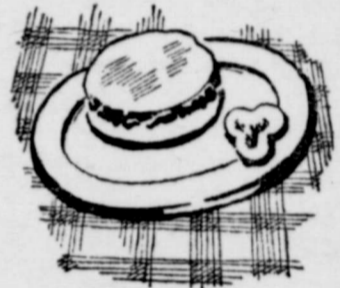
