The "forgotten child" is rapidly becoming less "forgotten". Injured at birth, these children (about 9,000 of them in Texas) are severely, sometimes totally, handicapped. They can't control their hands, or their legs or their speech organs fail to develop because of perpetual uncontrollable shaking and twitching—a palsy caused by brain injury.

Now it is becoming recognized that these children can be trained—taught to talk and walk and in some cases can be almost cured through long and careful training. The injury is to the body, not the mind.

So the state is preparing to provide funds to establish a hospital and begin training of spastics. Senator Buster Brown has introduced a bill that will allow the state to accept gifts of property for this purpose.

So far, Gatesville, Meridian and Brownwood have come forward offering hospital sites. The Board of Control will decide which site the state will accept when the bill is passed.

Teachers pay is still the major issue around here along with its twin issue, taxes. It's clear now that they are Siamese twins—kill one and you kill the other—so I'm happy to report that the temper of the legislature now is to kill neither.

The great game of chess is coming to a head, and the teachers and rural roads are winning. (Rural road-building gets a percentage of every teacher-tax bill.)

First we introduced large natural resources tax bills. Then we introduced a tax bill on natural gas—it looked small besides the first one, so the oil and gas people (who have great power down here) would almost happily accept the small tax to escape the large one. The result—the House favors this tax bill (H B 44) by about 75 to 50 at the last count.

Legalized horse racing, fair trade, basic science, Veterans' bonus, and state transportation aids to children going to private and religious schools are all getting weaker every day and likely won't pass this session.

It's in the balance now as to whether or not to allow women to serve on juries. I can see no rea-



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son why women shouldn't be allowed to serve on juries. But right now the court houses in the state are not equipped to handle women over night periods, so I am not supporting the measure.

Robert Lee Smith Rites Held at Leon Junction Wednesday Morning

Robert Lee Smith, 20 died in Hillcrest hospital at Waco, March 24 at 7 p. m. as the result of injuries suffered in an auto-truck accident on the highway between atesville and McGregor Monday at about 5 o'clock. His companion in the car was Joe Hopson Burt, killed instantly.

Funeral services with the Rev. Alvis Bishop officiating were held in Leon Junction Methodist church on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. The requiem music and the masses of beautiful flowers were impressive tributes to the memory of the young man whose untimely and tragic death has brought grief to a legion of friends.

Interment was in Seaton cemetery with the Morton Scott & Son directing arrangements, and with honors including the services of soldiers from South Camp Hood, who were pallbearers.

Robert Lee Smith was born in Brown county, Texas, September 24, 1926 to T. M. Smith and wife Mrs Ella McDavid Smith. The family home is in Leon Junction. He was a veteran of World War II his serial number being 38643230. He was a member of the Baptist church.

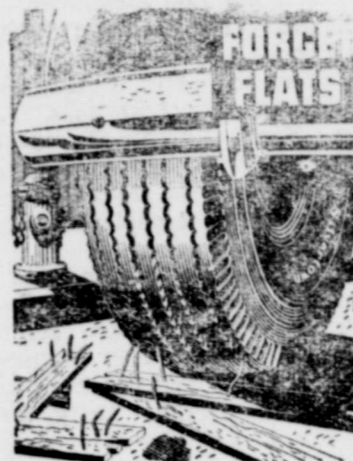
A native of Arkansas, Mary Jane Smith was born January 26, 1874 to Mr. and Mrs. Tillman

Mrs. Ogden was a member of the Methodist church, and her life is a memory worthy of emulation by her family and younger friends.

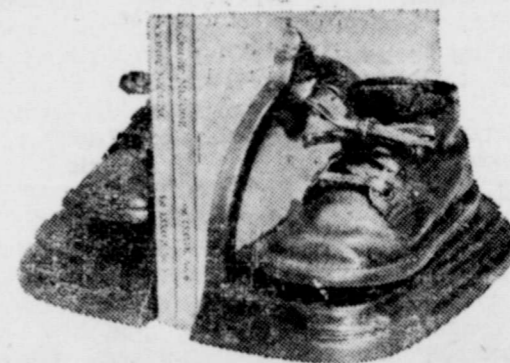


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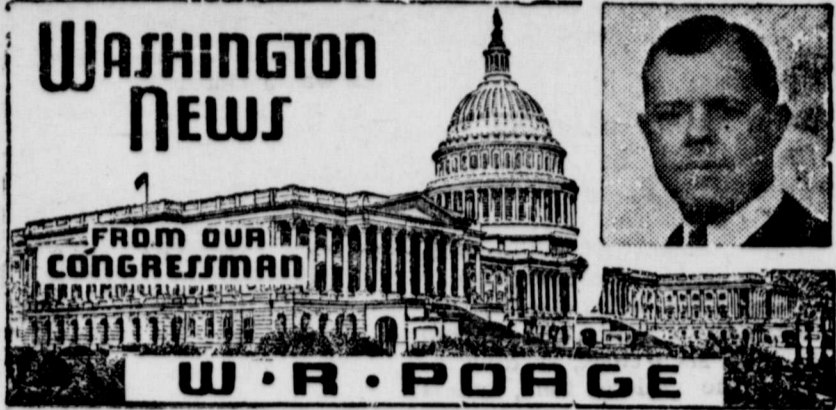

Dear Friends:

It has been most interesting to note the reaction to the President's appeal for aid to Greece and Turkey. It has put all the Reds, parlor pinks and outright communists right back in bed with the arch-isolationists, just as they were before Hitler invaded Russia. As long as Hitler was simply murdering Poles, Norwegians, Greeks, or Dutch, this strange array of "fellow travelers" opposed even the slightest intimation of sympathy for the invaded people. The day German troops double-crossed Russia and attacked her just as they had attacked the smaller nations all of this group began to insist that we should "go to the aid of Democracy".

I have much more respect for the isolationists of the Middle West who have consistently believed that they themselves were safe and have, therefore, been unwilling to do anything to stop aggression anywhere. I think that these people are mistaken in believing that anyone is safe. I think that the airplane and the atomic bomb put everyone of us in danger. I think we should, for our own safety, stop aggressors, whether Fascist or communistic, just as soon and as far away as we can. But at least the open isolationists are honestly selfish while the fellow travelers seem to be interested only in the effect that a policy has on Russia. I want no trouble with Russia, and I believe we can avoid it by following a firm policy. On the other hand, I know of no better way of bringing on trouble than to try to appease Russia. It would be just as foolish and criminal as was the attempt of Mr. Chamberlain to appease Hitler at Munich.

The committees have already begun hearings on the aid to Greece legislation. I hope that they will be able to get the information they properly want as soon as possible. I am pleased to see the State De-

partment offer to make all the background public. I think that our people are entitled to know all there is to be known of our agreements and commitments.

My own Committee (Agriculture) has been reviewing the Crop Insurance Law. It now seems that the Government is going to lose more than \$40,000,000 on 1946 cotton insurance. The other crops, chiefly wheat, made a profit of about \$6,000,000. Cotton has always lost money, but I am convinced that with enough experience we can put it on a sound basis just as we seem to be doing with wheat. It may be that we will have to contract the whole crop insurance program until we know more about the losses we must expect, but I definitely feel that we should continue to try to work out a sound program. We need soil conservation to assure the farmer and the Nation that our soils will continue to produce; we need price floors to assure the farmer that he will get a fair price for what he produces; and we need crop insurance to assure him that he will have some income if an act of nature keeps him from making a crop.

The Agriculture Committee can only establish the rules of crop insurance. The Appropriations Committee has to provide the money to pay the deficit. That Committee has not yet acted, but it has promised to go into the question in the near future. The Department of Agriculture has been forced to suspend payment of 1946 losses on cotton because it simply doesn't have any more money for this purpose. I have not found any Member of Congress who would say that the Government should not make good on its contract, but since all these losses are in the South and 62% of all of them are in Texas, you can understand that the Republican Majority is not moving with the speed we would like. They may be some time appropriating the money, but the Agriculture Committee has asked the Chairman to appoint a committee to meet with the Appropriations group and try to get them to speed up payments. I feel sure that ultimately our cotton farmers will be paid.

The House has just a few minutes ago overwhelmingly passed a bill transferring sugar controls from OPA to the Department of Agriculture and giving that Department the right to continue price and rationing until October 31, 1947, with control over industrial inventories for an additional five months. As I previously explained, it is necessary to keep some control to prevent the big industrial users from buying all the sugar at exorbitant prices. I, therefore voted for the bill.

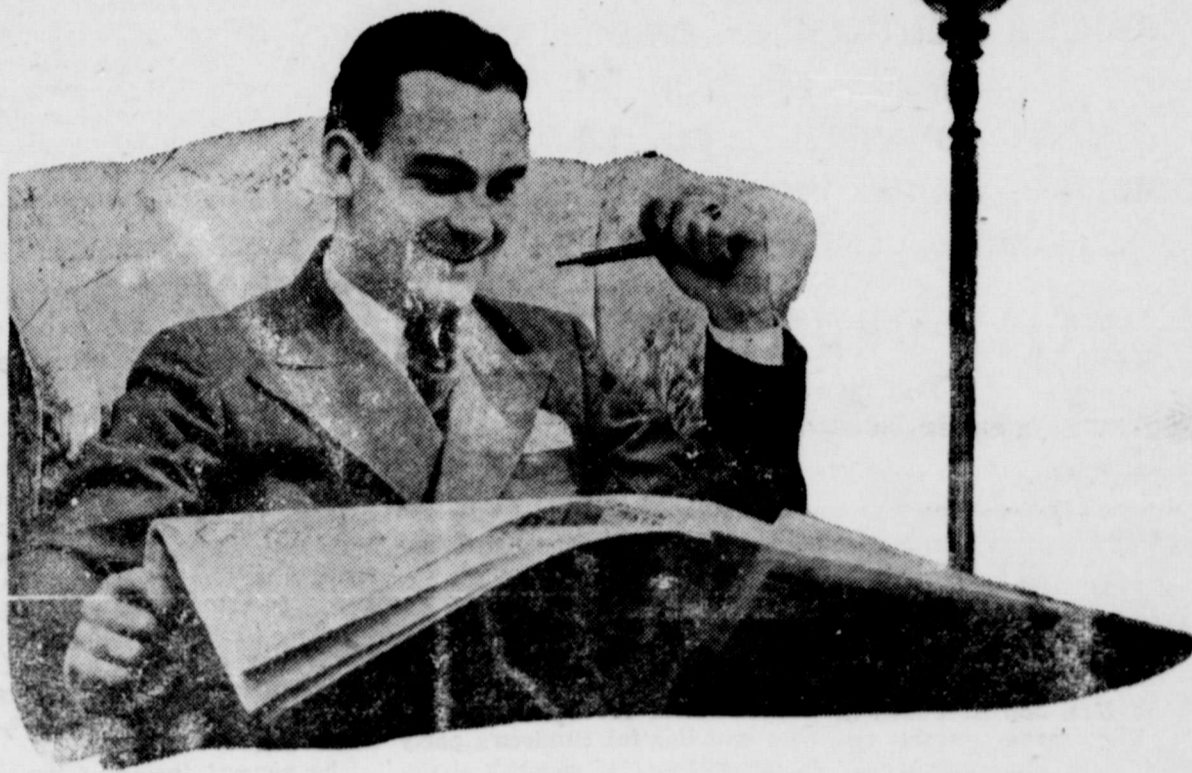
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Final Rites Held At Copperas Cove Tuesday Honoring Paul Kindler

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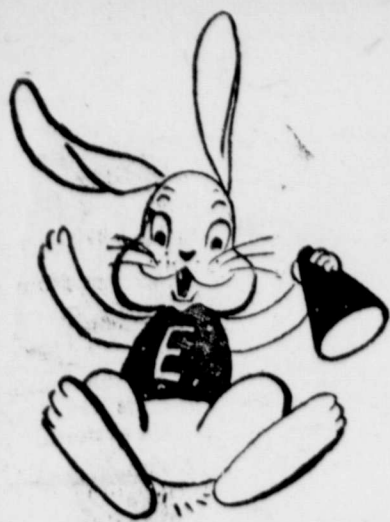

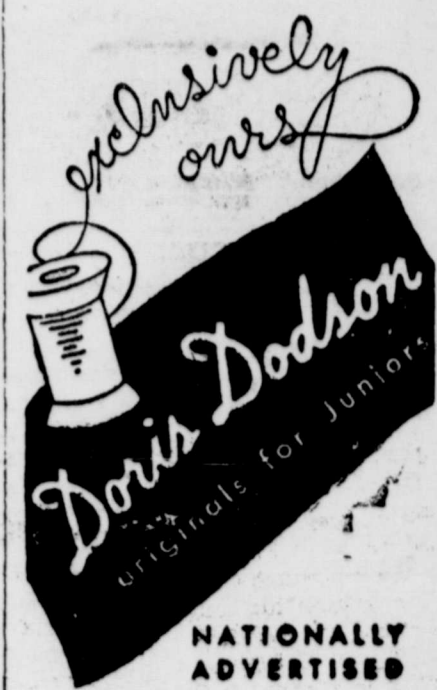
Everybody is invited to attend this service and unite in the worship hour. The regular Sunday services at the various churches will be held at the usual hours.

Mrs. Edna Timmons of this city recently returned home from a visit to Waco, where she was a guest in the splendid new home, 2626 Summers, of her nephew, Sidney Evans and his bride of a few months, the former Miss Dorothy Allison of Waco. Sidney is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest J. Evans now of Waco, but former residents of Gatesville, where Sidney was reared and graduated from the Gatesville High School. The young man, who is in the postal service in Waco, and has recently acquired the home mentioned, has one of the most dramatic World War records of all of any returned hero from the Pacific area. He volunteered for service in the U. S. Army, and was stationed in the Philippines at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack. He was one of the first Americans made prisoner in the islands, and suffered four years of the cruelest treatment the Japs could conceive for their victims. One of the first to be captured he was one of the last to be released from the Jap prison camp a little more than a year ago. His happy marriage and his prosperity are both subjects for happy comment by many Gatesville friends of Sidney Evans.

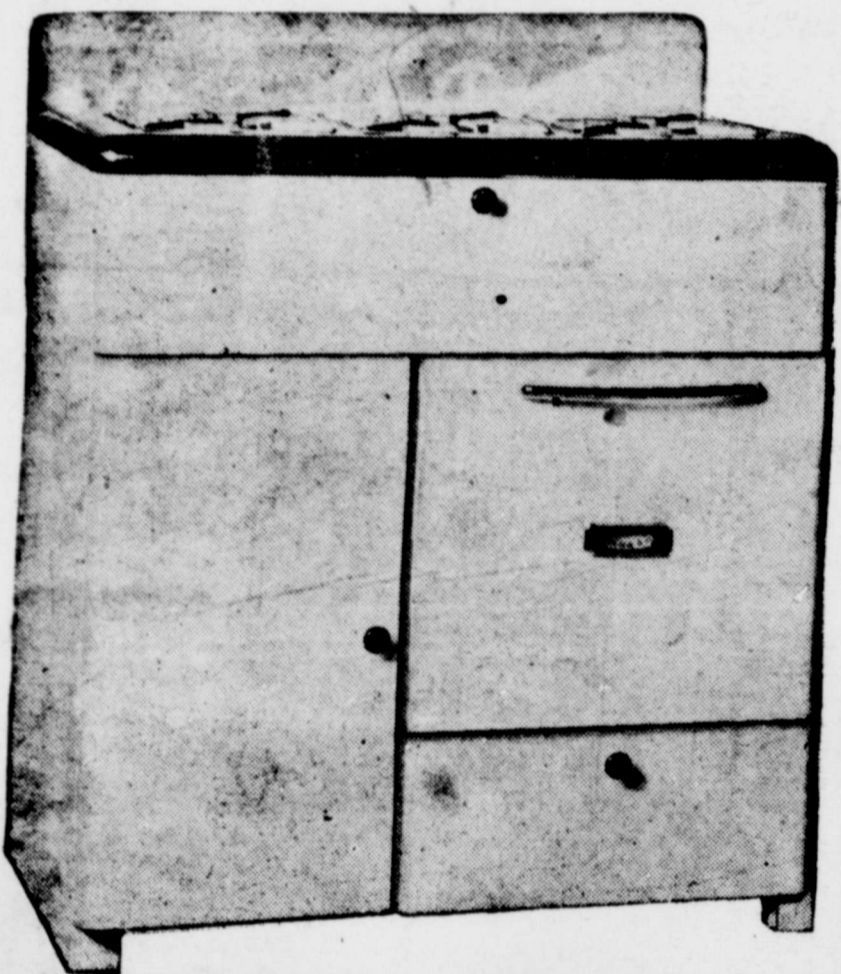
