### 15 OF 37 DIE IN PLANE CRASH

NEW YORK, N. Y. June 19.—(AP)—Fifteen persons  
of the 37 aboard a Pan American World Airways Con-  
stellation Eclipse were killed early today when the giant  
liner crashed at Meyadine, Syria, while trying to make a  
forced landing, the airline announced.

Eight of the dead were passengers, seven were crew  
members. The remaining 22 passengers and crew mem-  
bers were described as safe. The plane was enroute from  
Karachi to Istanbul.

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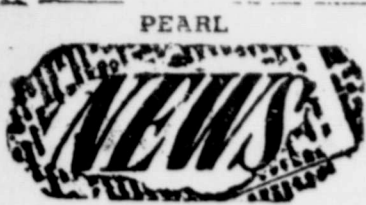

It's a nice drive out, a good diamond, and a big game. Do yourself a favor and see this ball game Sunday p. m. about 2:30.

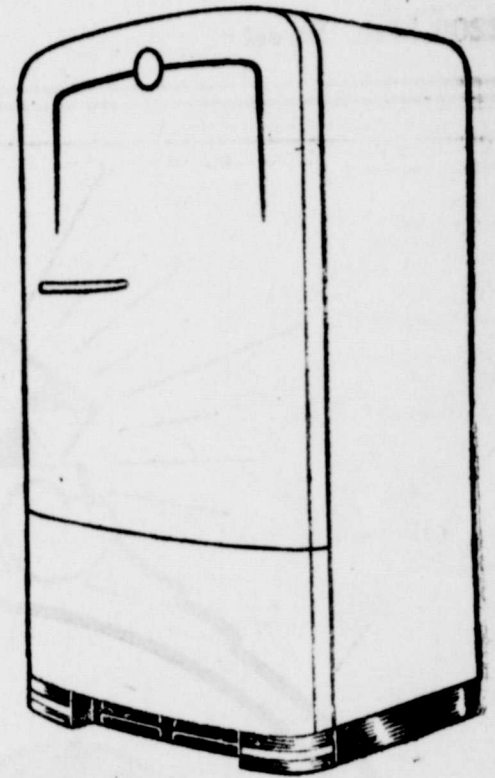

The bridegroom was attended by his brother, Gene Roberts, as best man. Lendel Jenkins served as usher.

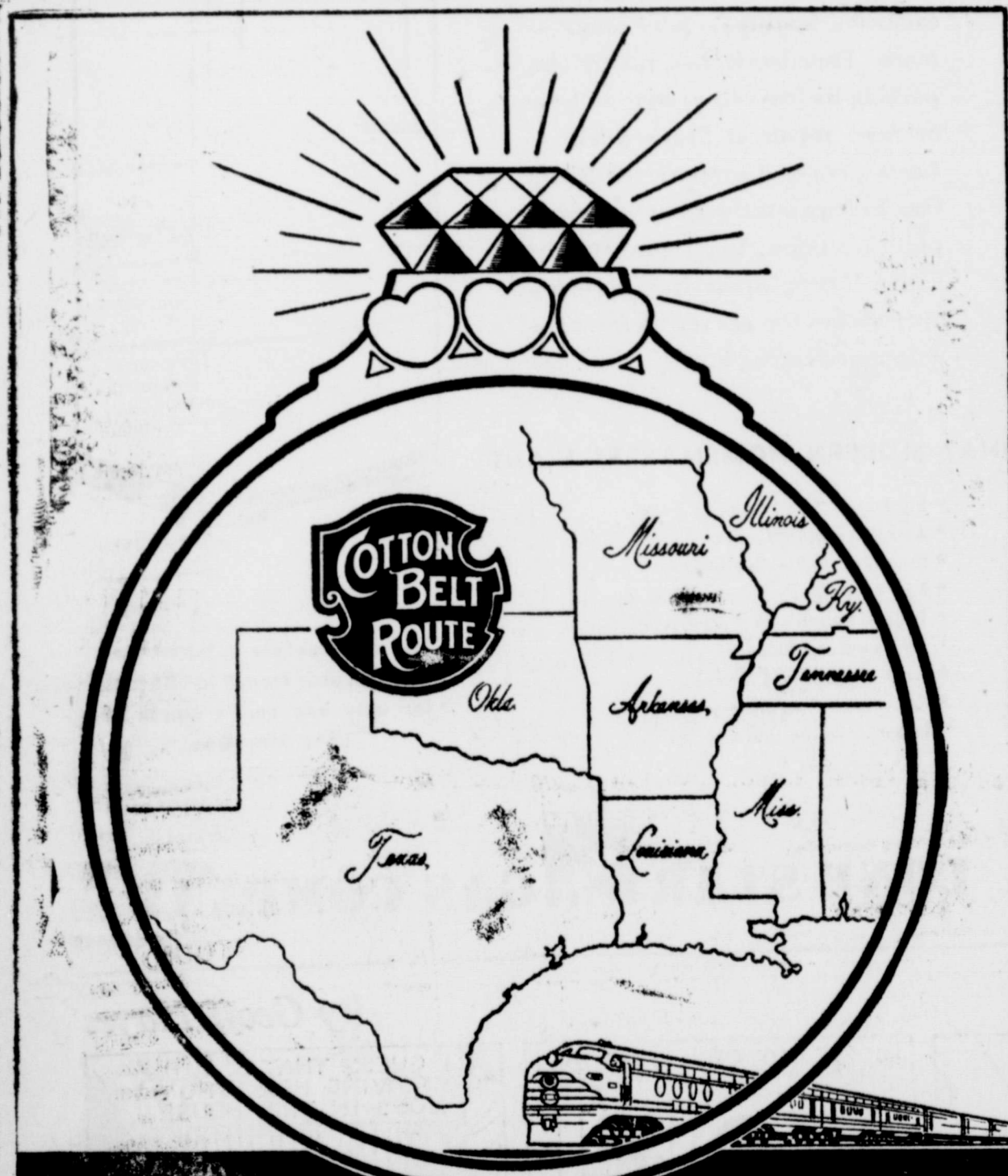

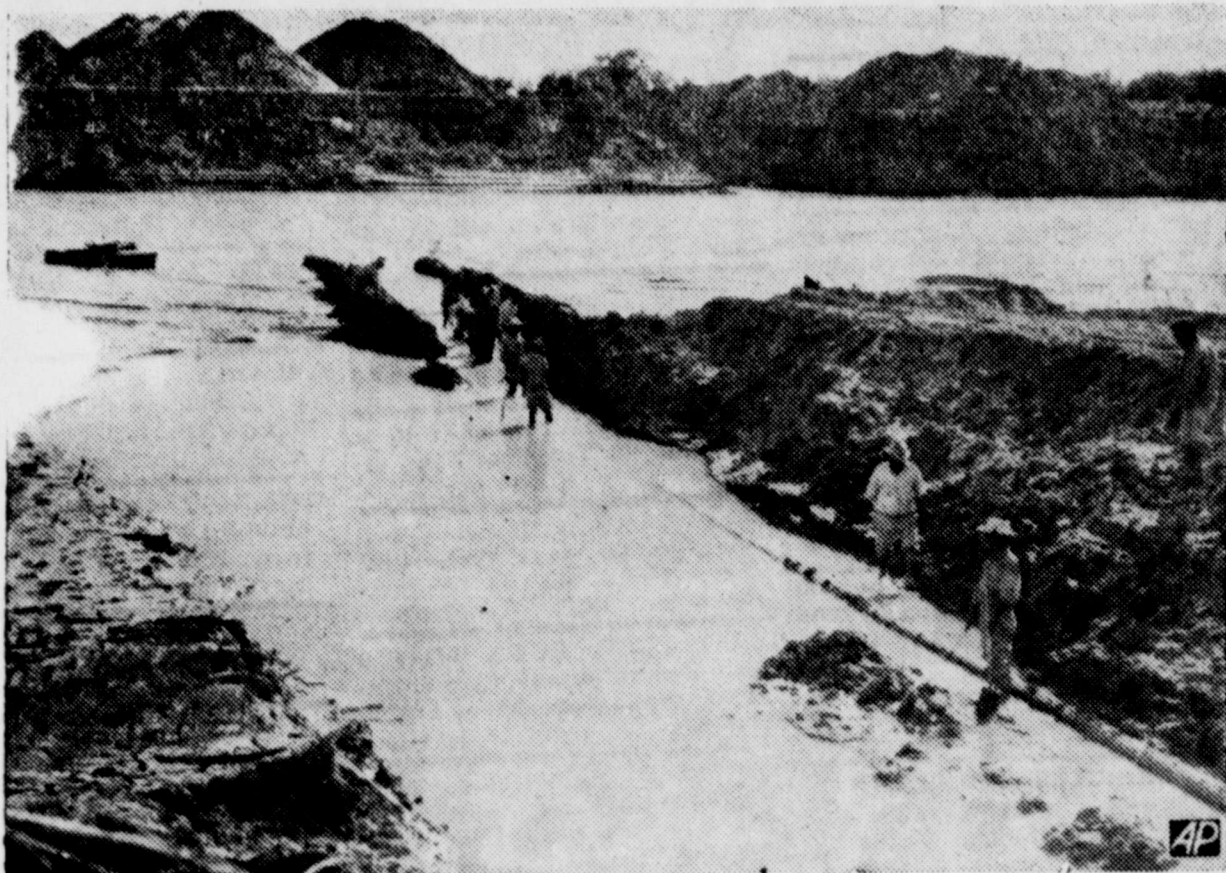

FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN

**W. R. POAGE**

June 13, 1947.

Dear Friends:

After two days of the hottest weather of the season, we are this afternoon (Friday, June 13th) experiencing some of the hottest arguments of the session. The debate revolves around the bill to continue the American Information Program in foreign countries. I think a majority of the Members of both parties believe that we need some kind of program to "sell the American way of life to the rest of the world." A substantial group of Republicans and some few Democrats still feel that all we need to do is to "thumb our nose" at the rest of the world and that we will be perfectly safe. I cannot accept this view, altho I do share the fear which is widely held that many of the individuals who have and who possibly will in the future direct this program are far more radical than I would like. I have never been able to understand why the officials at

the head of such programs cannot realize the importance of building an organization of sound thinking typical Americans. After all, we want to give the world a fair picture of America. Why not, therefore, try to get typical Americans to do it rather than individuals from New York who, as Congressman Gossett says, cannot or will not speak English.

I have spent much of the week meeting and working with friends from home who have been here in behalf of the development of the Brazos and Little Rivers. Last year an appropriation of funds to begin construction of the Whitney Dam on the Brazos. This work is under way. We hope to get funds to continue the work. Last year Congress authorized the construction of the Miller Springs Dam on the Leon near Belton. We are asking for an appropriation to start the actual work on this Dam, but we know that the policy of the Republican Majority is to

start no new works. We do not, therefore, know as yet what will be done, but I know that our people presented a good case, and I feel that if anyone gets any money for new construction this project should. I know it will surprise even some of the citizens of Bell and Milam counties to know that the Little River has at times in the past carried almost twice as much water past Cameron as the Mississippi is carrying past Hannibal, Missouri, right now.

We have a great program of flood control on the Brazos and its tributaries which requires not only the two dams I have mention but which will require a number of other dams up stream on all the tributaries and finally will require real soil conservation all over the watershed.

Early this week I took part in a successful fight to strike from the District of Columbia tax bill a provision which would have in effect exempted from District income taxes all employees here from States which have income taxes but would have imposed local taxes on those who come from States like Texas which do not levy such taxes.

I have often pointed out that I thought that our present Texas tax system was unsound I believe we should require those who use our natural resources to contribute far more to the support of our State and its institutions. I think that the State of Texas should tax the production of oil, gas, sulphur, etc. By so doing, our State could make me pay to support Texas roads and Texas schools when I buy Texas gasoline in the District of Columbia. I think it is perfectly silly for Texans to continue to put the burden of taxation on our own people as we do with our property taxes, gasoline tax, etc., when we could make the people of other states share that burden in proportion to the benefit they get from Texas natural resources. I don't think that our farmers will ever get the country roads they need or that our teachers will ever get the security to which they are entitled until we do tax our natural resources which are each year being removed from our State. I started this fight for a fair natural resources tax while I was in the Texas Senate nearly 15 years ago, and I still believe that some day Texas is going to proclaim its independence of the oil, gas and sulphur companies and write its tax laws in the interest of the people.

Be this as it may, however, I think that it is the right of the State of Texas to levy any kind of taxes it wants and that neither Congress or the District of Columbia has any right to penalize our citizens because our State does not happen to levy an income tax. With best wishes, I am,

**A Public Relations Job**

America's biggest public relations assignment, perhaps the most significant of this kind in the history of the world, is gaining momentum. It's off to a good start. You may call it industrial statesmanship, if you want to, or you may call it selling the American way of life. What it amounts to is an all-out effort on the part of each one of us to demonstrate the faith we have in our economic system. So doing, we shall weather any present or future crisis.

There must be no tongue-in-cheek when we assert that never has any other system given a people so much; nor has any other system a brighter future. We Americans are not generally an emotional people. We can read history without weeping. Europeans think of us as more "practical" and less idealistic. At any rate, we have been so busy that we have largely overlooked our selling job, until time is later than we thought.

**Selling Ourselves**

An industrialist recently indulged in a bit of analysis: "The simple fact that our American-style processes of finance, production, distribution and selling actually produce more for more people than does any other set of processes ever devised by man, has never been planted deeply in the minds of our people—at least not to the extent that it becomes an ever present and active part of the public consciousness."

I am afraid this is too true. If we had actually sold ourselves on America through the years, we would never have seen the phenomenon of certain of our public figures playing peek-a-boo with the Communists. There would be genuine appreciation of the accomplishments and potentialities of America in every university chair in the land.

**Campaign of Truth**

Against so many rampant, fanatical destroyers, a clean and constant campaign of truth, well organized and supported, can be effective. Against the doubters and the cynics, this great public relations program must be tied-in with all-out effort to produce goods for the American people, through an economy of abundance. Without good works, your theory falls flat. Only first understand the system, if you please, then it's easier to make it work.

Too many somehow have decided that business, in this "capitalistic" country, is altogether bad. These folks have not considered, however, how many cherished things they would have to give up if they got rid of "capitalism." Without private initiative in business and industry, in labor, and in professional life, we would sink to the level of some of our critics.

We take a lot of things for granted. Yet we have a job to do. If we are businessmen, let us not only sell the product we make, but let us sell the product as a symbol of the freedom under which it is made. If we are workmen, let us consider our jobs as by-products of the freedom under which we live. And no matter what we are, let us know that this sweet land of liberty offers us a freedom of opportunity as individuals that we can find nowhere else on this planet.
