payers poured more than \$300-
000,000 into Uncle Sam's cash
register during the period July 1
through October 31, or 7 percent
more than last years' federal in-

rooms.

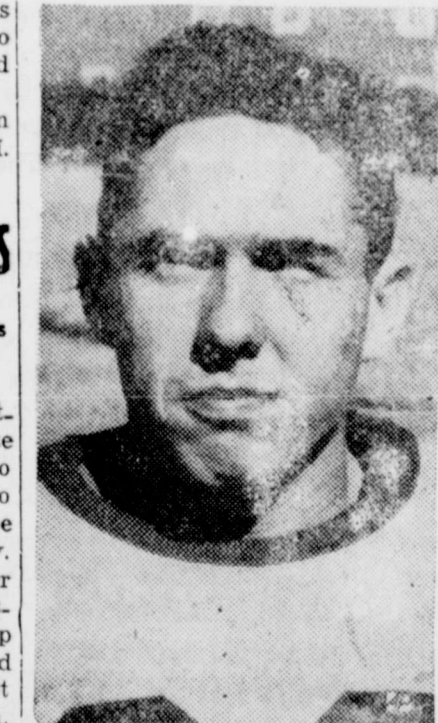
In the dining room, the table

for—or, will it?

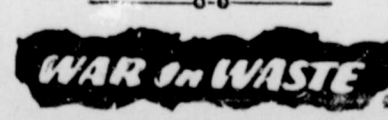
Fifth Graders To Take Train Ride, Bus, And Barbecue

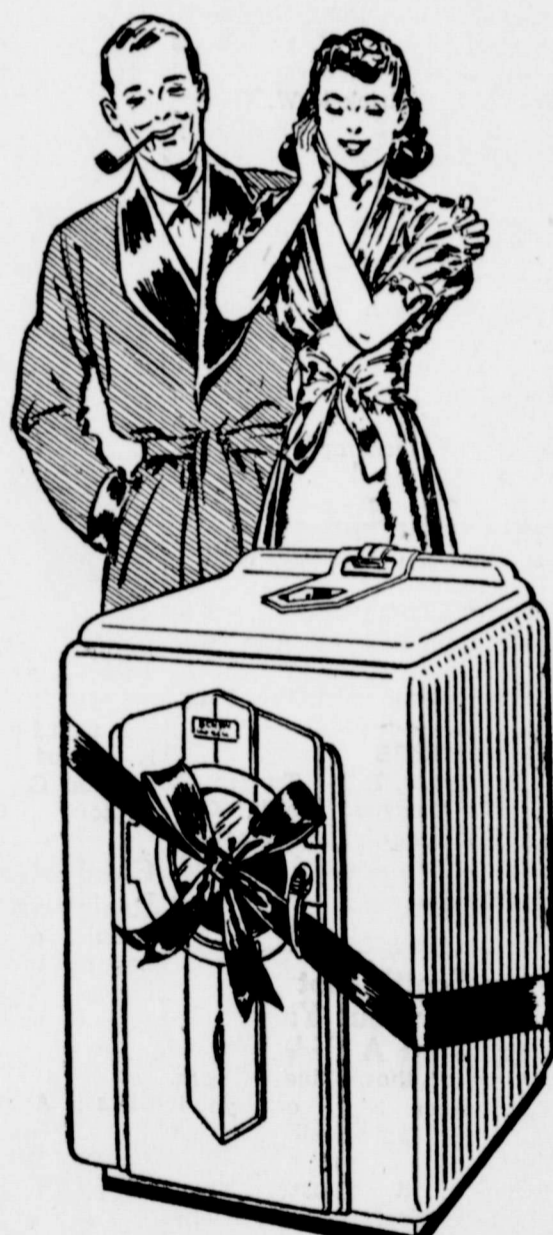

M. MUD TAKES CHARGE: HORNET-BULLDOG CLASSIC 0-0

SCORING OPPORTUNITIES ABOUT EVEN, BUT FIRST DOWNS POINT TO BULLDOGS!

Gatesville played a kicking game Friday evening in the mud in the annual Gatesville-McGregor Classics, and managed to stay out of trouble long enough to come home with as much as the Bulldogs kept at McGregor, which was even 0-0.

With the usual 6 or 7 points "spot" for "at home" teams, it might be called a moral victory, but these don't count in the old

score book, unfortunately.

It was a typical game, barring General Mud, who "stacked" up under the player's feet all during the evening, which was misting rain since 2 or 3 days.

Outstanding for the locals was Davidson with his punting, which in a large way, kept the Hornets out of trouble. Gilmer at end, did well, and the hard plugging boys, Vandiver, Anderson, were not to be sneezed at, but the heartbreaking backbreaking work was in the lines, featuring K. and R. Crawford, Deavers, Dysinger, Fredde and that smoothie playing Captain, Clay Davis.

Standing way out, for the Bulldogs were Medlin, Lechler, big Hempel, S. Anderson and Williams

The Gaffe

Capt. Clay Davis and Francis Davidson won the toss from Capt. Bobby Medlin and Sammy Anderson of the Bulldogs, and chose to defend the south goal, with the hosts kicking from the north.

Ball went to R. Crawford on the 35, returned to the 38. Davidson made 1 at tackle and then quick kicked, the Bulldogs safety, fumbling and the Hornet's recovered on the 15.

Davidson fails to gain and Anderson is thrown on an end play for a 2 yd. deficit. Vandiver passes incomplete to Gilmer. Davidson takes, passes and fails to make 1st D. and ball goes over on the 6.

Medlin, stopped by Crawford, and then he makes it 1st D on the 18. Lechler at RT makes 4. Lechler goes next and it's its 1 D.

Marshall makes 4 on delayed buck at center. Lechler is stopped by Dysinger, 1 yd. Medlin kicks to Davidson on the 35, returns to 45, stopped by Anderson. Anderson flips to Gilmer, low and incomplete. Newton for Crawford. Davidson kicks to Lechler and he's stopped on the 20. Dysinger nails Lechler for none. Medlin is stopped by Gilmer and Anderson. Lechler kicks out on 50.

Davidson laterals to Anderson, who drops, losing 1, but recovers. Davidson's kick is blocked by F. Anderson, but Davidson recovers. Davidson kicks to Fletcher on the 20, and he returns to the 38. Fletcher to Marshall, and he gets 2 yds. as the quarter ends.

2nd Quarter

Gene Anderson hangs on to Harding and he goes for 5 yards. Marshall is stopped by Vandiver after 2. Lechler kicks to Davidson on 15, returns to 38, stopped by Williams and Anderson. Vandiver carries, a penalty on Hornets, refused. Davidson kicks Lechler takes on 42, stopped by Price.

Lechler completes to S. Anderson for 1st D. on the Bulldogs 19. Medlin at end makes 2. Lechler to Fletcher, and Gilmer drops him back to the 48. Lechler punts to Davidson and he's stopped by Hampel on the 22. Davidson goes again, stopped by Hampel for 1/2 yard. Vandiver takes, stopped after 4 by Williams. Davidson kicks, ball killed on Bulldog 45.

Medlin makes 6, to the Hornet 49. Lechler is stopped by Vandiver and Deavers, etc. for 1. Medlin makes 1 D. Handed to Marshall and he makes 3 at tackle, ball on 40. Marshall makes 2, stopped by Fredde and Anderson. Medlin makes it 1st D again, Deavers got him. Lechler is stopped by all center of line, after 1 yd. Ball on 30. Lechler passes to Hampel, stopped by Vandiver. Pass next to S. Anderson and it's 1st D. on 12 yd line. Gilmer intercepts next pass and is stopped on the 18 as half ends.

3d Quarter

McGregor kicks, ball to Anderson on 15, returns to 31. Vandiver carries for 4 at left side. Davidson makes 2, tackle, Marshall stopping. Davidson passes to Vandiver and he goes to the 28. Vandiver carries, fumble, recovers, drops 1. Davidson passes incomplete over C, nobody there. Davidson

kicks out on 11.

Lechler makes 9, nailed by Vandiver, Medlin makes 1st D at T, stopped by Anderson. Marshall's nailed by Crawford and Fredde 1 yd. Marshall from Lechler to Medlin, and they drop 2 yds. Lechler punts to Davidson, fumbles, recovers on 45. It was slick-slimy.

Davidson passes to Anderson, knocked down by Fletcher and Lechler. Davidson passes incomplete to Anderson, knocked down by Hampel. Price for Crawford. Davidson completes to Gilmer, pass, 5 yards; stopped by Anderson. Davidson punts to 5, stopped on 5 by Gilmer.

Medlin breaks away and goes to 35, run out of bounds by Davidson—a 30 yard run. Double reverse. Medlin carries to Hornet 45 before being run out of bounds. Lechler, thru C makes 5. Larry in, Fredde out. Medlin thru T makes 1st D on 36. Marshall takes stopped by Crawford, 1 yd. Anderson stops Medlin on double reverse, 4. Medlin takes to 30 for 2. Medlin is stopped by Fredde for 0 and ball goes over.

Davidson passes, incomplete to McIlroy and Gilmer. Vandiver is stopped at 30 for none by Bryant. Collins for Vandiver. Davidson punts to Fletcher and he returns to the Hornet 40, run out of bounds. Harding for Medlin, and he passes o Hampel over center, incomplete. Gilmer and Anderson stop the next play for none. Five Hornets stop Medlin, after 3, and that's the end of the third quarter.

Ball on Hornet 36. Lechler punts to McIlroy and he's stopped by Williams. Davidson, thru big hole in C is stopped by Medlin and Hampel, 8 yards. Davidson at RE makes 1st D, 3 yards, stopped by Medlin.

Vandiver at tackle makes 1, Hampel and Anderson. Anderson at C makes 3. Lechler got him. Anderson makes 1. Davidson punt to Fletcher, stopped by Anderson on the Bulldog 29.

Davis throws them for 4 yard loss on end play. Pass, incomplete is incomplete when McIlroy jars Hampel. They quick-kick. Davidson gets, slips down, stopped by Hampel. Anderson for Collins. Bertrand for Crawford.

Women Under 40 Seldom Victims of Heart Attack

ROCHESTER Minn.—(AP)—Women under 40 only rarely have the spectacular coronary heart diseases that plague men in their prime, especially executives and leaders of industry and profession.

This report is made in the Proceedings of the Mayo Clinic, a publication that records staff meetings of the Mayo physicians. The feminine heart study is described by Doctors Laurentius O. Underdahl and Harry L. Smith.

Coronary diseases three in number, all affect the two arteries that supply the heart muscles with blood. The three are coronary sclerosis which is hardening and narrowing of these heart arteries, or angina pectoris which is either one of the first two plus extreme pain.

The Mayo clinic studied the records of 95,000 women under 40 who were examined at the Mayo Clinic over a period of 11 years. They found 27 with coronary

heart trouble. They concluded that this form of heart disease is practically non-existent in women under 40, except those who are obese, those with high blood pressure and those having a fault in fat metabolism.

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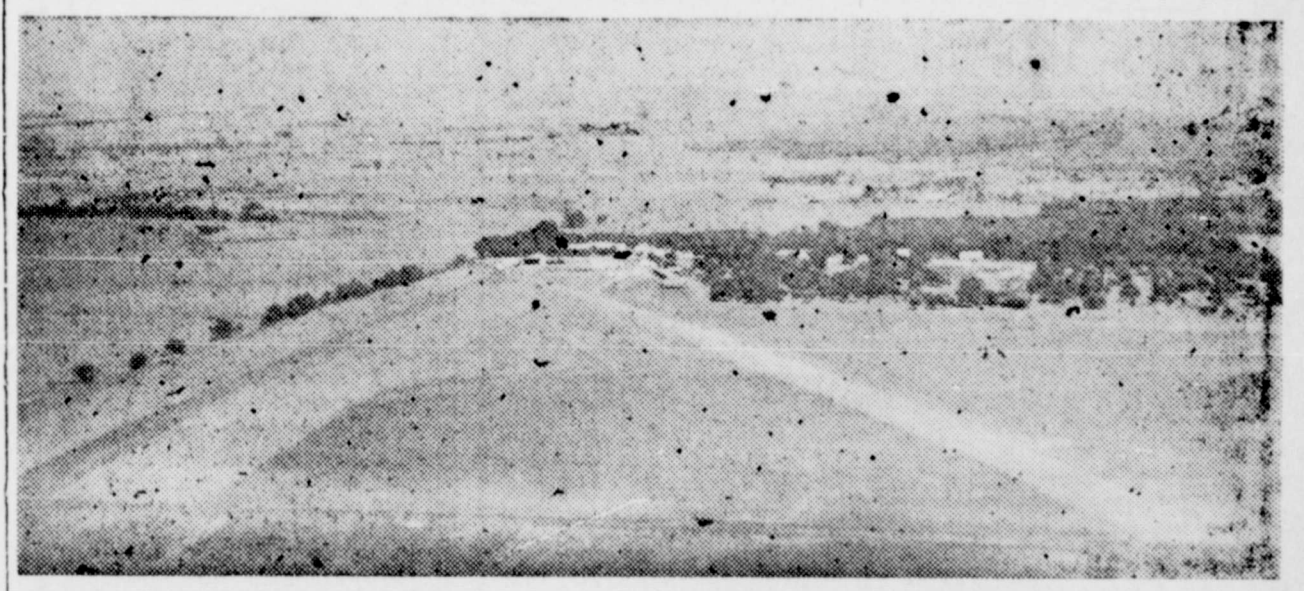

Foreign Aid and Its Effects

An understanding of human nature will tell us that when we stop giving aid to European nations, most of the countries there will become angry at us. The more aid you give to an individual and the longer you give it, the more disgruntled he becomes when you stop. This seems to be true of nations. Naturally, now that we have hinted at a little less liberality toward Europe, some have yelled "selfish" and "unsympathetic" at us.

The more we give and the longer we give it, the greater will grow this scorn toward the giver. When finally we have to stop the flow of our money toward Europe, anger will be the reaction. That was true after World War I. America had been very liberal, but when aid was halted, up went the tariff barriers. England campaigned: "Buy Within the Empire." Depression followed.

What Results?

Following World War II, America again has been extremely liberal. We have spent some 10 billion dollars during each of the past two years. Help we gave to England during the war and since will total nearly 40 billion dollars. We have not been stingy with our food, our goods, nor our dollars, although this drain on our resources has helped to make things tougher for the average American breadwinner.

All the Lend-Lease, all the UNRRA relief, all the goods, all the dollars—what are the results? England is not even on her feet, much less Europe. The crises seem to mount, with England right now facing her greatest crisis since the war. All of these facts must lead us to re-study our aid to Europe and the possible effect of continuing handouts to so many outstretched palms.

Europe's Problem

Obviously, we cannot keep on giving at the rate of 10 billion dollars a year to Europe for the next ten, twenty, or thirty years. Then what can we do? It is plain common sense that the best thing we can do is to help Europe figure out how she can help herself. We must help Europe to get up on her own feet and off the necks of American taxpayers. That is the only kind of aid that will ever be worth much to Europe.

The sooner we get Europe to thinking in terms of helping herself, the better it will be for all of us. We might send her food and money till doomsday, but it would only make America poor and would not make Europe rich. Europe must understand that the problem of rehabilitation is her own problem, first of all, and not entirely ours. We must try to re-educate Europe in the principles of American enterprise and initiative. Hard work and self-dependence are among those first principles.

Europe needs production. We can supply machinery on the basis that it may be paid for with goods produced. We can keep down our trade barriers and buy from Europe. Only in that way can those nations get on their feet and buy from us. There are definite ways to help war-torn Europe without imposing the serious injury of continued, outright aid. The sooner our help gets on this basis, the better for everybody.

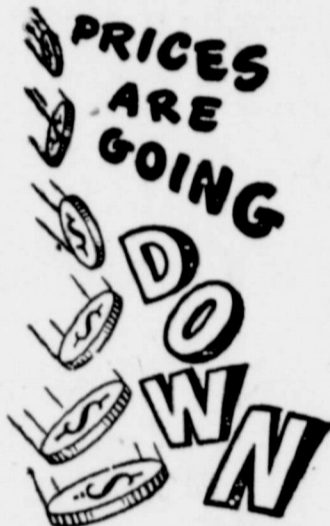
