Three inmates who escaped from the Gatesville Training School Monday night in a stolen truck were being sought Tuesday for questioning about Bosque County burglaries.

Sheriff George Grimes of Bosque county said three boys during the night took food and a 16 inch knife from the Meridian Coffee Shop. The sheriff said they also entered a telephone company warehouse at Meridian and obtained tools used in entering the H. B. Mounce Service Station at Walnut Springs.

Sheriff Joe White of Coryell County said one of the inmates was a 16-year-old Wacoan. The escape was his second since he was returned to the training school late last year as a parole violator.

The inmates escaped in a training school truck with the school's name painted on its side, Sheriff White told Waco police. The Waco inmate was accompanied by a 15-year-old boy from Sinton and a 16-year-old inmate from Odessa.

Probation Officer J. B. Brown, Jr. said the Wacoan earned two paroles during 1947, but was returned to the training school each time for offenses committed during his probation period. He is accused of twice entering the Lockwood office at 1900 Franklin Avenue, taking the same pistol each time.

WASHINGTON NEWS
FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN
W. R. POAGE

DEAR FRIENDS:

Members of the House Agricultural Committee are continuing hearings this week on the long range Agricultural program which were interrupted last fall by the call of the Special Session of the Congress. As Mr. Poage is a ranking member of the committee of course he is attending these Hearings. He expects to be back in Washington Monday, the 29th, in time to participate in the discussion, and vote on the European Aid Legislation. The testimony, evidence, etc. on the long range Agricultural Program will have to be gotten into proper form, also before it can be intelligently studied and decisions reached.

As Mr. Poage wrote you recently, I joined his staff a short time ago—last September to be exact. I was born at Walnut Springs. Some of you in that section will remember our family, I am sure. In addition to having been a small town merchant himself, my father, J. H. (Horace) Graves, and brother, Murray, were both associated with our good friend Mr. J. R. Carlton, and Murray was in an accident which resulted in his death there.

After that we moved to Waco, where my father was foreman of the Waco Broom Factory for many years, returning again after being in West Texas for a while. He and my mother both passed away in Meridian, where my sister, Mrs. L. J. Burch, Sr. still lives, and where I maintain my legal residence. We have some wonderful friends at Walnut Springs, Meridian and Waco. As a matter of fact, it isn't hard to find friends anywhere you go—even in Washington. I know some of you who have visited here won't believe that, for there's no loneliness which exceeds that of being loney in a crowd, and that's what Washington is full of—crowds! But then, there's just that much more opportunity for that many more friends.

I have loved Washington since the day I set foot here seven years ago, as a Civil Service appointee. The Cherry blossoms were in full bloom. The weather was beautiful (some of you haven't been that fortunate, but I was) and although the Cherry Blossoms had very little color, and although I had seen many a Texas peach orchard which was much more beautiful, there was a thrill about it. The trees lined along the walk around the Tidal Basin (Tidal basin! why did they call it that? Being inland bred from the "Southwest" I didn't know much about tides; and when they told me the Potomac River had a tide I didn't believe a word of it. "Rivers don't have tides", I said to myself. "They needn't think just because I came from where there are no large bodies of water I don't know anything." I could take a joke, so I laughed with them.—It was a good laugh for later I found they were right.) Anyway, Washington was wonderful. I made enough pictures to stock a gallery of my own, and sent copies to everyone I could foist them onto, and wrote letters pages long. I went to the National Art Gallery every Saturday afternoon, and dozed comfortably in an air-conditioned lecture room while a nice voice told about some famous artist and slides were shown on the screen. On Sundays I went to every different kind of church I could find—and there are literally thousands in Washington. Many of them I had never heard of. My

ears just couldn't hear enough of the wonderful words I heard spoken, nor my eyes just couldn't drink in all the beauty I saw, especially at Easter time in the large churches. God became more real and more practicable. There is anything you want in Washington, whether it be good, bad or indifferent, social, educational or religious. It is all here in your Capital. But I still automatically jump up and stand at attention when "The Eyes of Texas" is played!

On the 17th I heard President Truman when he addressed the joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate. It was a grave occasion. You are familiar with what he said. Seats were at a premium; many begging for tickets and every foot of standing room was assigned. The President shook hands with only one Congressman, Hon. Robert Crosses, who attends to all of his business from his wheel chair; he sat next to the Speaker's rostrum. Movie cameras were grinding all around from the Gallery; photographers flash light bulbs were in action; the public address system was not working very well, but the President spoke clearly, and all except a few back of him up in the Press Gallery were able to understand every word. As he left, escorted by a group of notables, including Presidential Candidate Taft, Mr. Truman stopped and shook hands with a little girl about 8 years old who was sitting with her Congressman father—on the Republican side of the aisle.

I hope to see some of you this summer.

Chinese Have War Words; Several of Them, In Fact

PIEPING—Strange new terms have been added lately to the glossary of China's civil war.

One of the latest and most popular is "cubic bombing". This is supposed to denote "bombing from the top sides" of a given area, presumably square. It apparently is intended to convey the idea of saturation bombing.

This winter there have been references to "freezing warfare". This, according to Chinese explanations, means that government planes circle over communist-occupied areas for prolonged periods. The theory is that the communist armies, unable to move will freeze to death as they lie motionless. The theory doubtless works better than the practice,

but Chinese reporters regard the stratagem zestfully.

There also has been reference lately, both in the press and by official spokesmen, to "tunnel warfare."

This derives from the alleged communist practice of digging underground tunnels for troop hideouts and ammunition depots. The entrances are supposed to be so cleverly camouflaged that detection is difficult.

The nationalists claim they have developed experts in finding and sealing such passages, with the communists inside.

In originating such odd-sounding phrases, the Chinese are running true to form. During the recent world conflict, several of their terms became famous.

Perhaps the best known of all was "the scorched earth," to denote the policy of destroying everything that would aid or comfort the advancing enemy.
