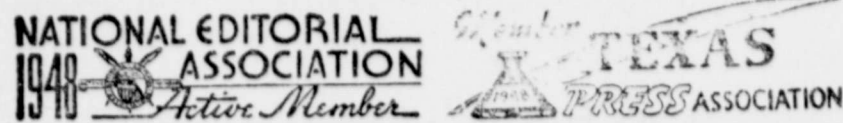

Gilmer-Aikin Committee On Education Make Recommendations

A minimum foundation program of education will be available to every boy and girl in Texas soon. This will be true if the people, through their Legislature, adopt the recommendations of the Gilmer-Aikin Committee on Education.

At present only about 68 counties in Texas operate all of their schools a full nine months each year. The tentative report calls for a minimum of 12 years of public school education of nine months each available to every child from the age of 6 to high school graduation.

This minimum program calls for a competent teacher for each 25 pupils in average daily attendance. These teachers must be professionally trained.

- There would be available:
1. One counselor for each 500 pupils.
 2. One full-time librarian for each 500 pupils.
 3. One graduate nurse for each 2,000 pupils.
 4. Instructional supervisors, highly-trained, at the rate of

one for each 50 teachers.

5. A specially trained full-time principal for each school of 12 or more teachers; for smaller schools, a proportionate provision.

6. Transportation for pupils residing more than 1½ or 2 miles from a school building.

7. A system superintendent of schools, properly qualified as a professional leader, in systems of 25 or more teachers. In smaller systems the principalship and superintendency should be combined.

"We believe the time has come when we must guarantee, for the welfare of the State as a whole, that all the people shall have at least an adequate minimum foundation program of education," said Senator James E. Taylor, Chairman of the Committee.

Terracing

Terracing and other erosion control practices have been pushed during October. June to December is usually the months devoted to this work. The Tripple A office reports funds for such practices exhausted. Any surveys for new terracing systems will have to await 1949 funds. Most of SCS Soil Conservation men will be used the remainder of 1948 in checking work done to date. Favorable weather in the first months of 1949 might permit preliminary work for new terraces.

Since there will be a larger budget for terracing through the AAA office in 1949 farmers should start planning now for such work. The larger grants for terracing next year means that work will no longer be done in piece-meal fashion. Drainage ditches and terraces will be completed while machinery is on the farm. The work will be in areas where the largest number of farmers sign up for work. This will be done to prevent long moves by heavy machinery. Neighbor farmers should get together and make plans to get engineering completed and make contracts with operators to do all the work while in that neighborhood.

BERLIN, Germany. (AP)—The new look in blockaded Berlin this winter will be designed not for chic but for warmth. Many female legs will be hidden entirely—by slacks.

Recognizing the approach of winter for this coal-short city, the U. S. Army through its daily bulletin has formally announced lifting its ban on the wearing of

slacks by female civilian employees in mess halls as well as offices.

Even the American Harnack House Club is permitting females in slacks during the noon meal period.

The new rules apply, the Army announced, "for the duration of the coal-saving emergency."

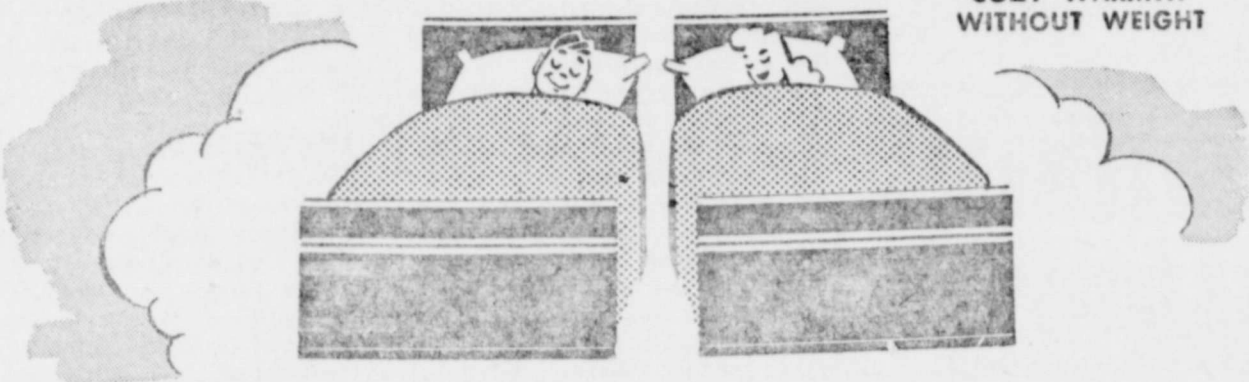

Johnson from being seated as the junior senator from Texas will probably collapse.

The Senate's acceptance of Mr. Johnson as a member would confirm his victory in the general election over the Stevenson-backed Republican candidate, Jack Porter. At the same time, it would sweep aside Stevenson's charges that Johnson took the Democratic nomination from him as a result of stuffed ballot boxes.

Stevenson and Porter tried to persuade the voters that Johnson gained his 87-vote majority in the August primary as a result of fraud. They predicted that he would not be seated even if he won the general election. They believed, apparently, that a Republican-controlled Senate would not accept him as a member.

Johnson countered with charges of his own. He asserted Stevenson received many votes to which he was not entitled. He contended that an honest count of all legally cast ballots would show him the winner of the August primary by more than 87 votes.

What has been the reaction of the voters of Texas?

Nearly half the voters believe there was some corruption in the vote counting.

To help restore public faith in the election machinery, Governor Beauford Jester already has promised that he will ask the Legislature to set up adequate means of detecting and preventing fraud in the future.

A statewide survey conducted by The Texas Poll just prior to the general election showed that more voters were inclined to believe Stevenson's charges than Johnson's counter-charges. But not enough were convinced to jeopardize Johnson's election.

This question was put to a cross section of eligible voters:

"Do you think anyone cheated in counting the votes for Stevenson or Johnson in the Aug. Democratic Primary?"

No 27%

Voters who answered "yes" were then asked: "Which side do you suspect benefitted from the cheating?"

Johnson's side only 11%
Stevenson's side only 2%
Both Sides 16%

Analysis of the results shows that most voters who said they believed Johnson alone benefitted from the alleged fraud had voted for Stevenson in the August primary. About the same proportion of Johnson and Stevenson supporters were ready to admit they suspected both sides benefitted.

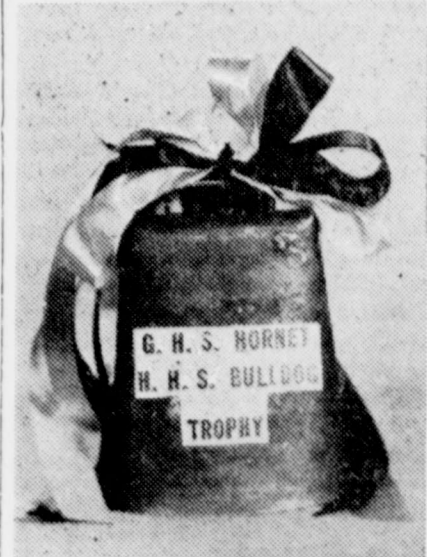

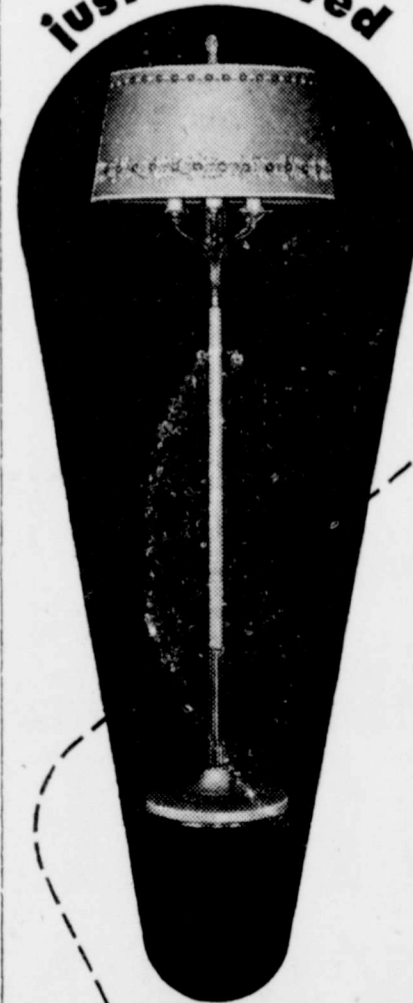
