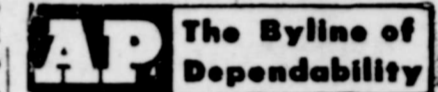

HST WANTS Anti-Inflation And Higher Taxes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 31. (AP)—President Truman declared today he still wants his anti-inflation program and higher taxes.

He spoke of the recent drop in prices as only a temporary let up in inflation pressure.

At the same time, he said his request for stand-by price controls has been a factor in checking price rises.

As for the taxes, the President said the Federal deficit would be much more dangerous to the country's economic health than a tax increase.

ACA NOTES

Two members of the ACA committee, H. D. Gann and N. Foote, with County Administrative Officer, C. D. Stone, Mrs. Curtis G. Watson and Mrs. Louis Bone, attended a District PMA Meeting in Waco Friday, March 25, studying the procedure for setting up wheat and cotton acreage allotments which will be necessary for 1950 if the Secretary of Agriculture proclaims allotments. Allotments have not yet been declared necessary. However, it appears that if the 1949 production of these crops equals the 1948 production, there may be sufficient surplus to bring back acreage allotments for these crops.

The committee was given full instruction to proceed at once to secure necessary information from each producer in Coryell County to calculate acreage allotments of each farm in sufficient time for producers to plan adequately their 1950 farming operations.

Price supports and loans for farm crops are a part of the acreage allotments. In order for farmers to continue to receive price supports, in the way of loans or purchase agreements for the various crops, acreage allotments are necessary to keep the supply in line with consumer demands for such crops. Without acreage allotments on these crops, which are surplus, there can be no price support or loans. The main crops, which are grown in Coryell County and for which a price support has been established in the past, are: Cotton, Wheat, Corn, Oats, and Grain Sorghums. In 1943, the price supports or loans for these crops were: Cotton \$30.53-15/16 middling; Wheat \$2.03; Shelled Corn \$1.49; Oats 77c; and Grain Sorghums \$2.38. Because of the war and the need for food in foreign countries, acreage allotments have been suspended for the past few years. The primary reason for collecting crop acreage information at the present time is to establish procedure for price support crops in the coming years. The acreage of wheat and cotton and all other crops for the years 1941 and 1945 through 1949 must be secured to determine properly the producer's allotments.

The War years, 1942 through 1944, are not required. Information must be obtained on all crops because Congress passed a law in 1945 permitting the substitution of some crops for either wheat or cotton. There were certain crops which could be substituted for cotton, only. The information on information on all crops will indicate the substitution as well as the trends in crop acreage. If a surplus should develop in any of the other crops grown in Coryell County, there will be the possibility of allotments on those crops. The information, which will be used in the future, to determine wheat, cotton, and any other crop allotments, which might be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture at some future date. In-

formation will be secured from all farms, since those that do not grow either cotton or wheat, may be affected by some other allotment at a later date.

The ACA office is very anxious for every farmer in Coryell County to fill out the questionnaire which will be sent out soon so that every farmer who is entitled to an acreage allotment on any crop, especially wheat and cotton, may receive his full proportionate share along with every other farmer in the county. The ACA committee realizes that, because of the sale of many farms, some a number of times, and because many farmers served in the Armed Forces, much of the information concerning the crops planted, will be difficult to obtain. However, the questionnaire, which will be sent out, will give farmers some time to contact the previous owners or operators and secure much of the necessary information.

Every effort possible will be made to have the wheat allotment mailed to the farmers by July 1, 1949, so that each wheat grower will know what his wheat acreage will be for the 1950 harvest. This will give ample time for him to plan for his 1949 fall sowing. Those who have been planting wheat and vetch will be interested, especially, in a wheat allotment because the land will be considered as planted to wheat even though vetch is grown with it. Thus, farmers who want to plant wheat and vetch, will need a wheat allotment. There has been a tremendous increase in wheat acreage planted with vetch

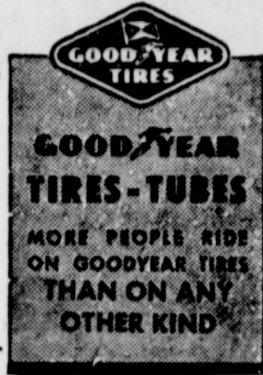

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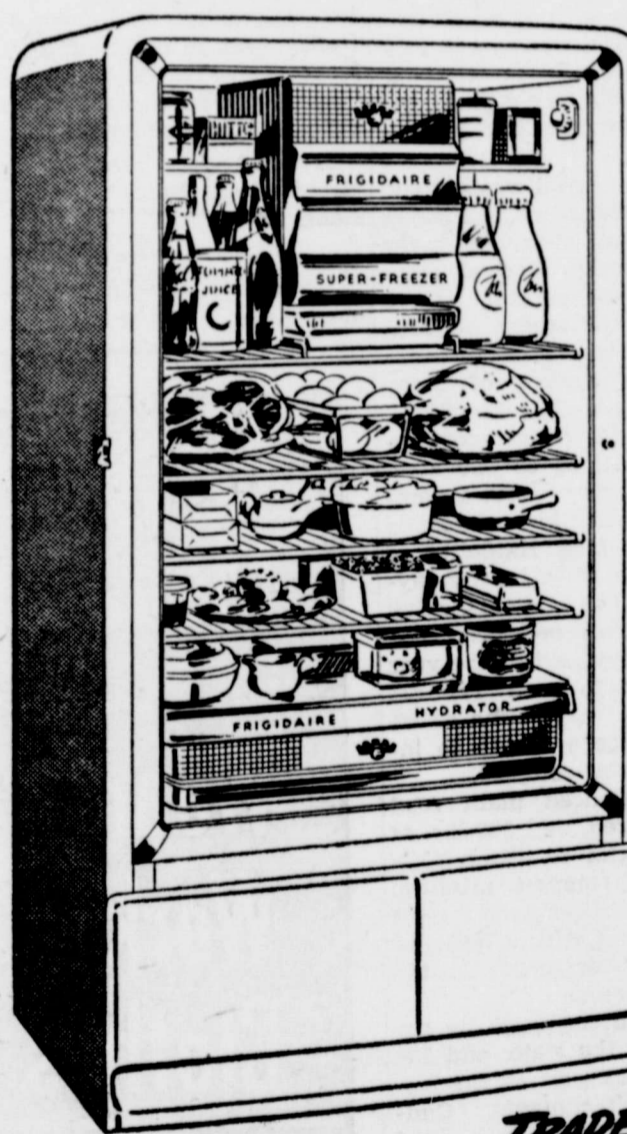

Save The Leaves! Don't Burn The Leaves! Turn Into Leaf Mold

Don't burn the leaves.

Instead, turn them into leaf mold or a compost. By burning the leaves, you lose the value of organic matter and kill off the grass that's already growing.

Other plant refuse besides leaves works fine in a compost too, such as clippings, weeds, and vegetable tops, says Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A and M College.

Nature is constant making soil fertilizers. Dead wood, old leaves and other plant materials make acid which releases mineral plant foods already in the soil. When released, this matter can be used by plants and tree roots.

A simple enclosure of scrap lumber, brick or stone should be provided to hold the compost together. In sections of the state where high winds prevail, a compost pit is preferable—almost a necessity, says Miss Hatfield. If a pit is available, spread a thin layer of soil over its contents, after adding the leaves or grass clippings. In the dry part of the year when there isn't much rainfall, it's a good idea to wet the entire pit once or twice a month to insure a well-rotted compost.

If a well-balanced plant food mixture is desired, add 100 lbs. of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer to a wagon load of compost mixture. Sprinkle the fertilizer over the pit before covering it with a layer of soil. The fertilizer speeds up the leaf rotting process.

In acid soil areas, such as the eastern part of the state, add 100 pounds of lime as well as the fertilizer to the pit contents. Compost of this type is especially good for soils which tend to pack, or become hard and crusty during dry periods, Miss Hatfield adds.

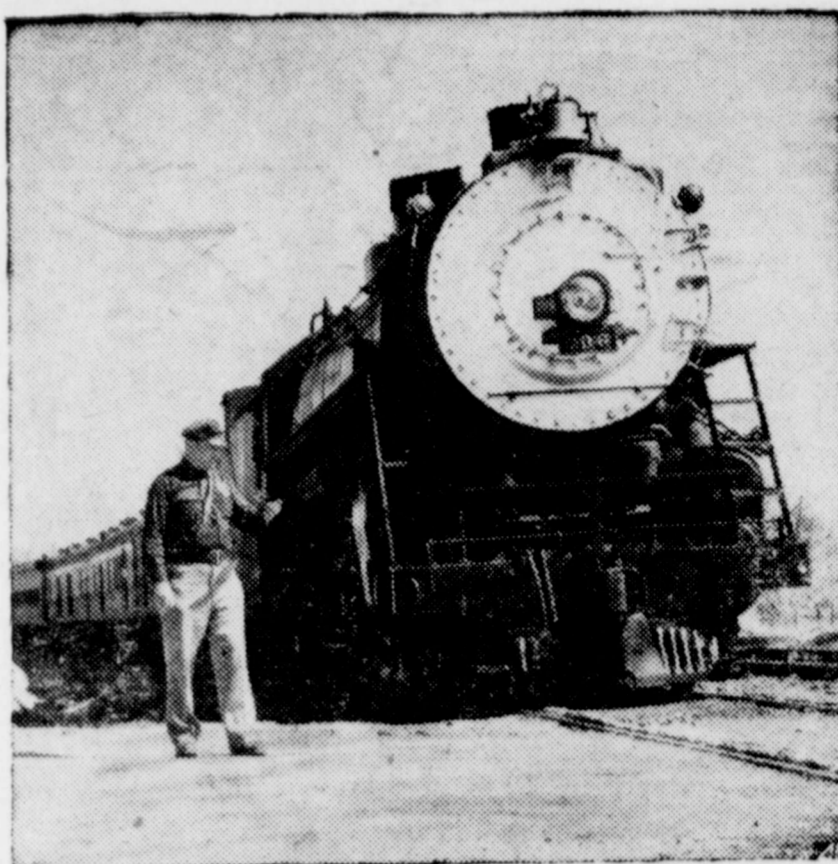
It usually takes about three months for leaves, weeds and limbs to rot. Use a half pound to a pound per foot of row space for flowers, vegetables or shrubs. Mix the compost thoroughly into the soil before seeding.

If you're figuring on using the compost material for pot plants, use a mixture of one-half compost and one-half good loam or sand.

Save the leaves for compost material, urges Miss Hatfield. It's one of Nature's best fertilizers.
