J. B. Boykin Died At 1:30 Monday: Hit By Car At Jonesboro

Jackie Bruce Boykin of Jonesboro, 14, died about 30 minutes after he was brought to Coryell Memorial hospital in an ambulance after being run over in Jonesboro a short time before. He died about 1:30 a. m.

Two automobiles figured in the accident, one passed the boy, driven by John H. Phears, Rt. 2, Hamilton, Sheriff Joe White said, lying in the highway, dodged him and then turned around and started back to where he was lying. This car was going west toward Hamilton, on Hwy. 36. A following car, driven by Jack Harrell of Hamilton, ran over him, the Sheriff said. He was dragged about 50 feet before the driver of the second car could stop.

Sheriff White investigated the accident and reported no marks to indicate he'd been hit more than once. Both cars stopped and were at the scene of the accident when officers arrived.

Boykin was born February 28, 1935, at Miles and was a son of E. A. Boykin, formerly of Robert Lee, and the former Miss Edna Johnson. He was a student, and a member of the Methodist church. Funeral services will be held May 3, 1949, at 2 p. m. at the Methodist church, Jonesboro, with Rev. Huddleston conducting the services, Morton Scott & Son, Funeral Directors, in charge.

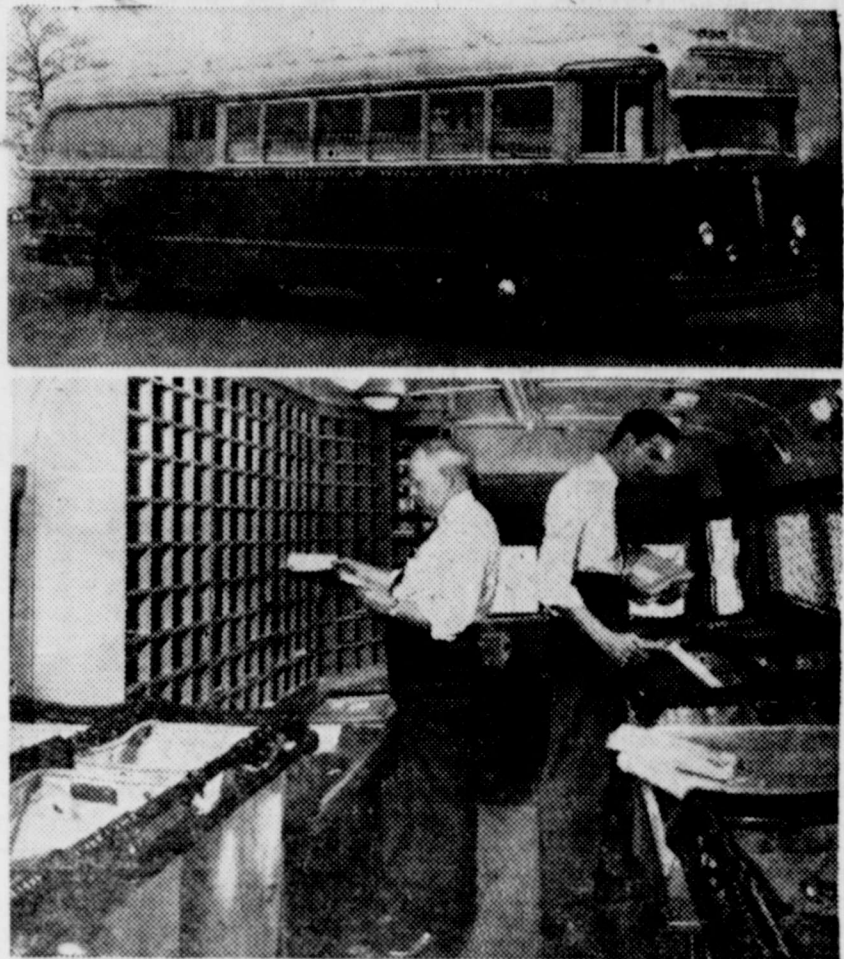


Joyce Gray of Denton, senior at North Texas State College, was crowned Queen of the May in ceremonies on the campus Friday night.

DAIRYING

May 4 is still Dairy Day for Coryell County. A short but helpful program will start at 10:00 o'clock at the Possum Oak Dairy Farm (Sartaria Dairy Farm). First left hand road beyond the State Training School going toward Hamilton leads to Dairy headquarters.

"Hoot" Gibson, Dairy Specialist for the Texas Extension Service, will be introduced at 10:00 o'clock.

At 11 o'clock two classes of Dairy Cattle—four cows and four heifers will be lined up for placing. There will be two groups of judging—adults and juniors (4-H and FAA). A first prize of \$5 will go to the winners in each group.

Following judging will be an inspection of dairy equipment on this farm.

Clovis King is a contender in the Texas Swine Breeder's Ton litter at the age of 56 days was 564 ter at the age of 175 days is the winner. The weight of Clovis' litter at the age of 56 days was 564 pounds. There are 13 pigs in this litter.

COTTON INSECTS

1949 is the year to expect favorable moisture conditions for early fruiting of cotton. Save the early fruit and make high yields.

sects with 3-5-40 Dust. What is this insecticide? It has been recommended by the master minds of the Cotton World. You will call for 3-5-40 and be able to get it. It should be stocked locally. Get your supply now. Since it is a dust you will need to make arrangements for using a duster. The time to start is when cotton has four or five leaves. Apply seven to ten pounds and repeat every seven days.

GRASSHOPPERS

Yes, Sir! Grasshoppers are hatching by the millions. Look on the fence and ditch rows for small hoppers. One pint of 74% Technical Chlordane or one and one-half pound of Toxophene to fifty gallons of water was recommended for the control measure to all inquiries to date.

Chlordane was used in demonstrations last year and proved effective. Early season control is important. No heavy equipment

is absolutely necessary. Put three gallons of water and three table-spoonfuls of Chlordane in your sprayer and cover all areas where small hoppers are found. Remember—

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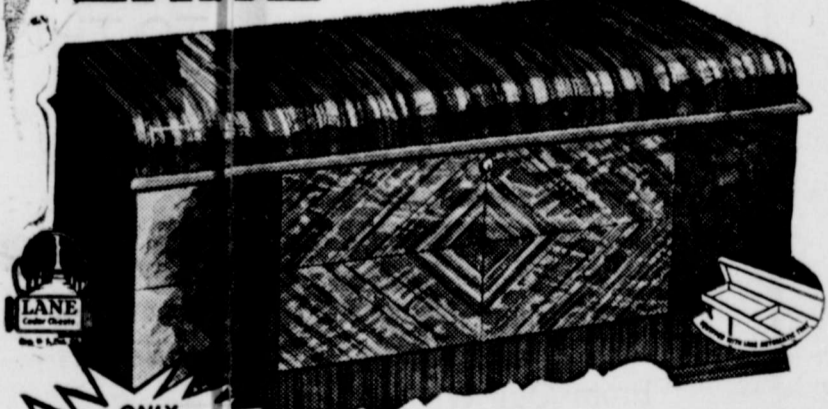
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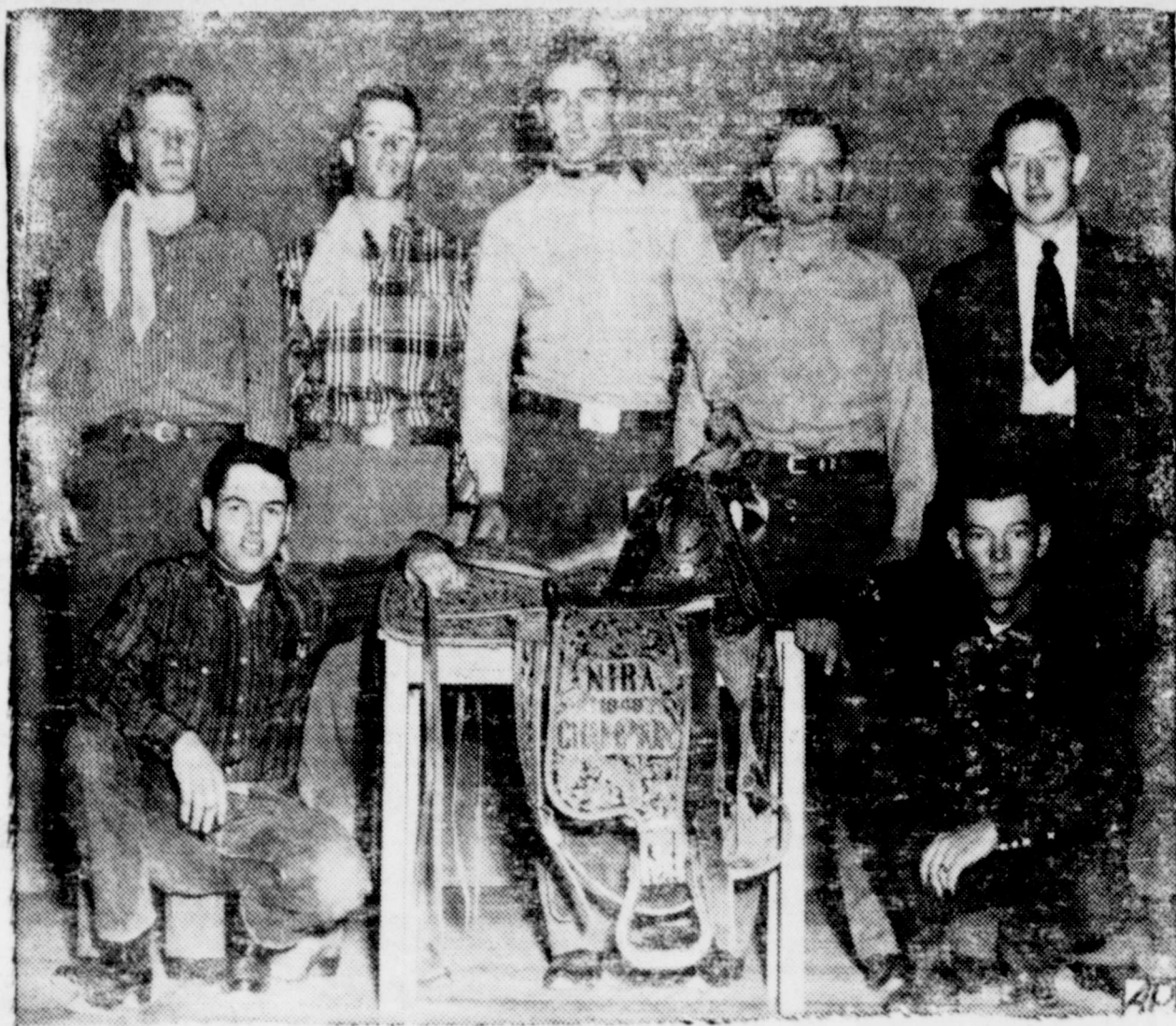

Dear Friends:

For the past week the House has worked on labor legislation. The bill before us is known as the Lesinski Bill. For practical purposes it is with a few exceptions a complete repeal of the existing Taft-Hartley Act and a return to conditions as they existed under the old Wagner Act.

I recognize that the Taft-Hartley Act has a number of defects. I recognized this at the time it was passed, but as I have often pointed out, legislation must be a choice of the best measures before us. We are still faced with a situation. As the matter now stands, the House is going to have to choose between the Lesinski Bill, which I think goes too far in repealing the good as well as the bad, and the substitute known as the Wood Bill. I don't think the Wood Bill is perfect, but it does correct at least part of the defects of the present law, and it keeps most of those provisions which seem to have helped us attain a larger measure of industrial peace and stability than we ever enjoyed under the old law. Today I supported an amendment to the Wood Bill to give striking workers greater rights. I believe that before the vote is taken, this measure will be made reasonably fair to all. In that event, I expect to vote for it because I cannot vote to return our country to chaotic conditions that existed prior to the passage of the present law. I want every union to have the same rights we accord to business, and no more. I want every laboring man to enjoy equal rights with his employer, and I shall do my best to secure such rights, but I would not favor any special rights for either side.

There have been many threats and false claims made by both sides in this fight. I am trying to ignore everything except the questions of justice and public good and to get a bill that is fair. The House had expected to vote on this measure today, but late this afternoon it looked as if each side felt it would be stronger if it had more time, and the House adjourned after putting off further action till next Tuesday.

Early this week the new Secretary of National Defense, Mr.

Johnson, ordered work stopped on the great new super carrier which the Navy was building at Newport News. I have been one of those who always supported a strong air force. I have always voted for the "70 Groups" which has come to be a symbol of air power. I still feel that absolute superiority in the air is essential to our national safety.

I have also supported "unification" of the armed forces. I believe that it can save dollars in time of peace, and that it can save lives in time of war, but I do not believe in overlooking any arm of our defense. I think that in addition to a powerful air force we must have a powerful naval force, and a well equipped ground force. We may never need this super carrier. It might be destroyed by an enemy, but we do know that in the last war we did need the largest carriers we could get, and they were no more vulnerable than any other kind of vessels. We may be able to fly large bombers to any point in the world, but they can surely carry a larger load if they take off nearer to their destination. I can well imagine a situation which would make it of tremendous value to us to have a movable base such as this super carrier would have provided. I would much rather have it. Therefore, I cannot approve Secretary Johnson's action.

One week from today (Friday, May 6) the Secretary of Agriculture will come to the 11th District. He will speak in Waco Hall. I assume that he will explain his proposed farm program. I cannot approve this program in all its ramifications, but I recognize that it does involve a vital recognition of the importance of gross farm income to the whole economy of the Nation. I think that the Secretary's proposals will likely affect every citizen of Texas one way or another. I believe our people will want to hear him explain them. I have, therefore, arranged for him to come and talk to us. This will be his first official visit to Texas. The meeting is open to all. You are all invited.

AUSTIN, Texas, April 30—Ladies, the men have changed their minds. Before the war, the weight of opinion among Texas men was that women should not serve on juries. Now two out of every three think it is all right. The Texas Poll measured public opinion on this question once before the war in March 1941 and twice after the war. Here is how comparable cross sections of adults—men and women combined—voted each time:

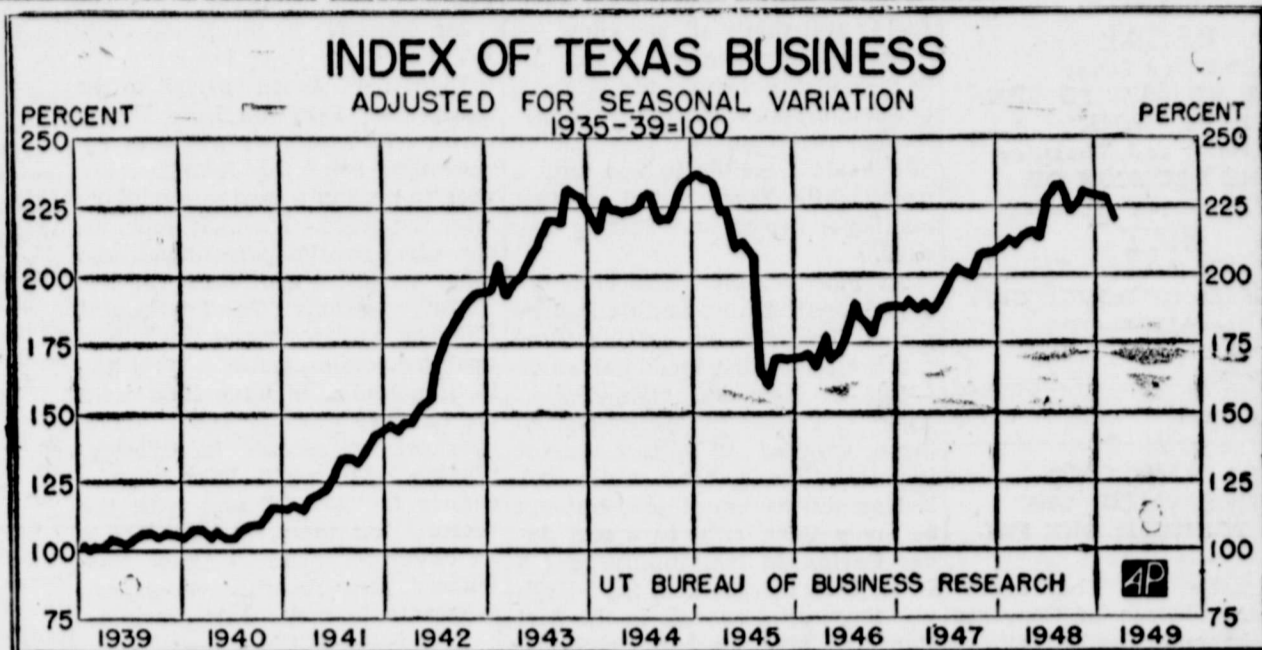

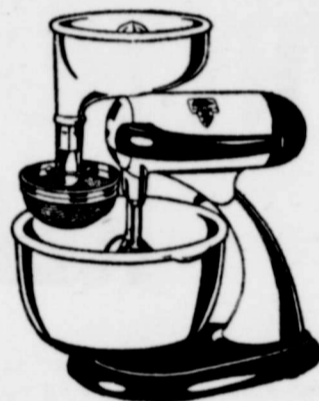
INDEX OF TEXAS BUSINESS ACTIVITY

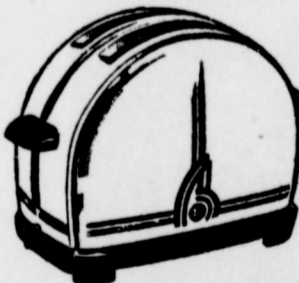

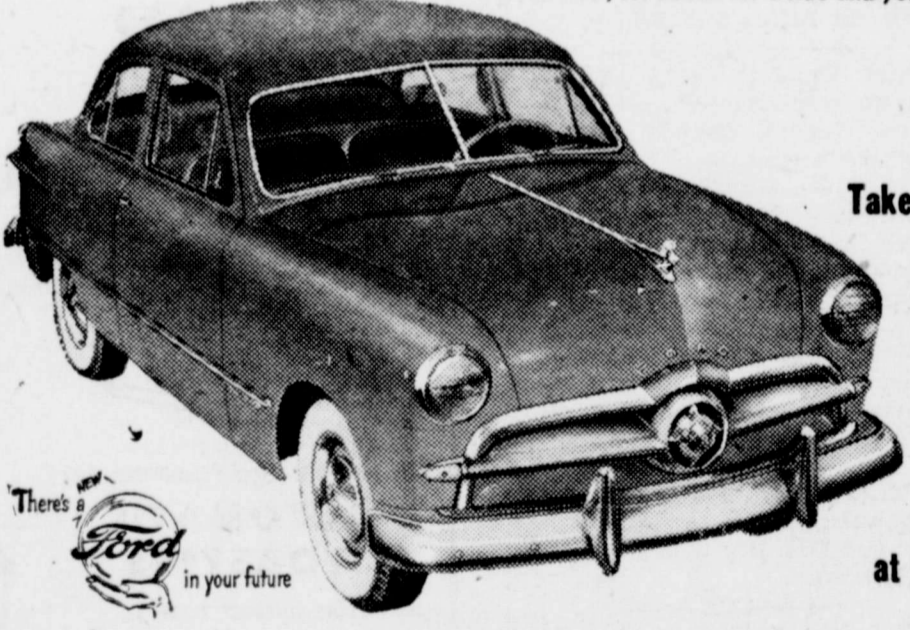
