### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration

law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of

sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the

Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.





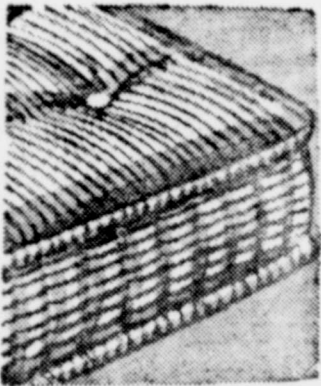

**Look at the Label**

A lot of persons, who like to think that they think, are bandying about a couple of terms that mean less than a whole lot to a whole lot of people. I refer to the terms: "liberal" and "reactionary." May I put in my two cents worth in hopes that you may know these modern labels better?

What I mean is that armchair commentators and soapbox spellbinders throw these terms at you, without any apology. **The Real Test**

Then how is it that those who claim liberalism as their doctrine are found waving the banner for the very worst enemies of all liberty?

**State Supreme**

We Americans declare that we hold sacred the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. We have said that man is to be as free as possible, while also being responsible. The nation's founding fathers clearly insisted that government must be set up to serve man, and not man to serve the government.

But here and now we have the sorry mess of the liberals today wanting to change all this. They propose to improve this arrangement by "planning" us into either a socialist or a communist or a fascist society in which all signs of human freedoms must certainly vanish. These planners and plotters would have the society (government or state) to be supreme in all things. Even God they would replace by the State.

**A New Serfdom**

What need would we then have to guarantee personal rights and freedoms, if the state is to assume all the responsibility for everybody? No need, at all, if the State is supreme. These liberals (I am now applying the label test to their works) care nothing for the Constitution. They are all totalitarians at heart. Their aim is political power to suppress the personal liberty that belongs to the individual. Here we have the strange spectacle of dangerous "liberals."

A "reactionary," strictly speaking, is one who objects to progress and desires to turn back the clock. We must conclude then, that the real reactionaries of today are those liberals who would return us to the slavery of the State. They would make the coming century a new Dark Age.

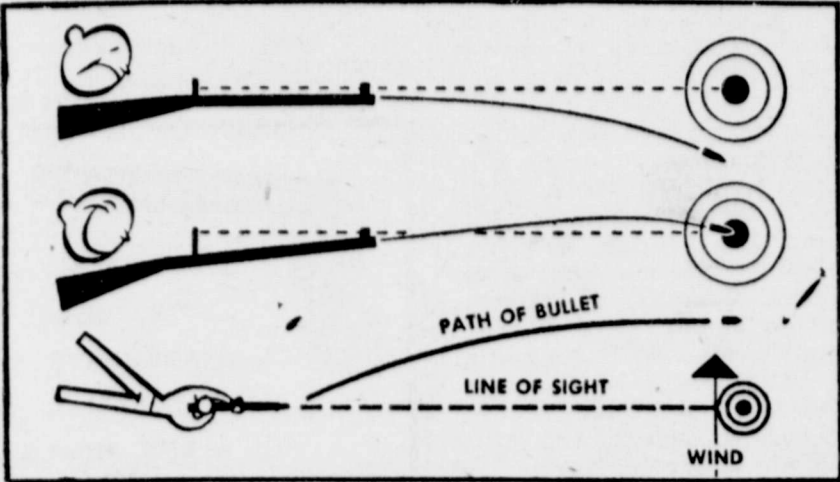


# HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

By ARTHUR E. COOK  
National and Olympic Rifle Champion



## Advanced Training



A bullet never travels in a straight line. As soon as it leaves the gun muzzle, gravity begins to pull it toward the ground. Therefore, at longer distances, the bullet is likely to fall short of the target unless (1) you deliberately aim high, or (2) you adjust your sights to compensate for the drop of the bullet.

The same thing applies to horizontal (or sideways) movement of the bullet due to wind while shooting outdoors. Particularly with small caliber bullets, wind is capable of blowing the bullet inches off course. Again it is necessary to compensate for this action.

If your rifle is equipped with an adjustable rear sight you need only to determine the amount of adjust-

ment needed and the direction, and then turn the adjustment knobs the necessary amount. There is one basic rule to follow: **MOVE THE REAR SIGHT IN THE SAME DIRECTION YOU WANT TO MOVE YOUR SHOTS.**

Don't try sight adjustment until you have learned to put all your shots in a tight little group on the target. Then, if the group is not in the center you can correct the rifle's point of impact by adjusting the sights. Remember that a rifle is only as good as its sights—put the best ones you can afford on your gun.

**Maj. Dave H. Culberson**

Maj. Dave Houston Culberson, 27, who was in the European area with the Ninth Air Force as a fighter pilot, died in France in a plane crash, July 16, 1944. His home was at 1020 College street in Gatesville.

He entered the Air Corps in April, 1941 advanced to the rank of Captain while serving at various airfields in California, and went overseas in December, '43. He became a Major February 1, 1944, and received the Air Medal with seven Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Distinguished Flying Cross. He damaged two Nazi planes in combat and downed two others.

Before entering the army, he attended the University of Texas and was a graduate of Gatesville high school where he was a football star.

plan goes so far in the direction of government building that I fear that it will make it impossible for the average citizen to ever hope to pay for a home of his own. We all know that the cost of home construction has already reached absurd heights. We also know that the supply of both building materials and skilled labor is very limited. In fact, it is clear that there is not enough material and labor to build very many more houses than are now being built. Therefore if the government come into the field and bids for this labor and material, it will of necessity run wages and prices higher than they are now in order to get what it needs to build houses. This in turn will mean that most of those who want to build homes for themselves will have to pay substantially more than even today's high prices. Of course, most of our people will simply be unable to compete with the government and will have to give up the idea of building their own home.

I think this would be most unfortunate. I believe that it would be much better for the government to restore a broad program of guaranteeing construction loans (F.H.A.) and let every citizen make his own trade with his own builder to build the kind of house he wants than to have the government build thousands and hundreds of thousands of costly houses of a type that few people want. We all know the government costs always exceed private costs, and certainly our people would be much happier if they were housed in homes of their own choice which they themselves owned. In the final analysis, we must always remember that there is just enough material and labor to build a given amount of housing. If the government takes that material by paying more for it, it will still only build the same number of houses. Maybe we should approach the problem from the labor and material supply end and not the finished house end.

I leave for Texas tonight as my Mother is to undergo a serious operation the latter part of the week. I do not know how long I will be away from Washington, but I will be back just as soon as her condition permits.

# The Texas Poll

## The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

By **JOE BELDEN**,

AUSTIN—The rank and file of Texas adults still tend to favor the poll tax as a requirement for voting, even though feeling among the state's political leaders is that it should be abolished.

Research by The Texas Poll indicates there has been little or no change in public opinion on the poll tax during the past six months. Of a statewide cross section of adults questioned in May, 51 per cent said they thought Texas should keep the tax. Exactly the same percentage voted in favor of the tax in a comparable survey last December.

In its latest survey, The Texas Poll asked persons favoring the poll tax why they thought it should be kept. One out of every three said they felt the state needed the revenue. Some of these pointed out that the tax now helps to finance the public school system, and a few were worried that other taxes might be raised if the poll tax were abolished.

Another important reason why people favor the poll tax, they confess, is because it "keeps the poor and ignorant from voting." Only two per cent, however, admitted they backed the poll tax because they feel it keeps Negroes from voting.

Most of those who want the poll tax abolished criticize it general-

ly as being undemocratic. Their typical comment is that "voting is a privilege everyone should have without paying for it."

In its May survey, The Texas Poll asked these questions:

"In your opinion, should Texas do away with or continue to have a poll tax as a requirement for voting?"

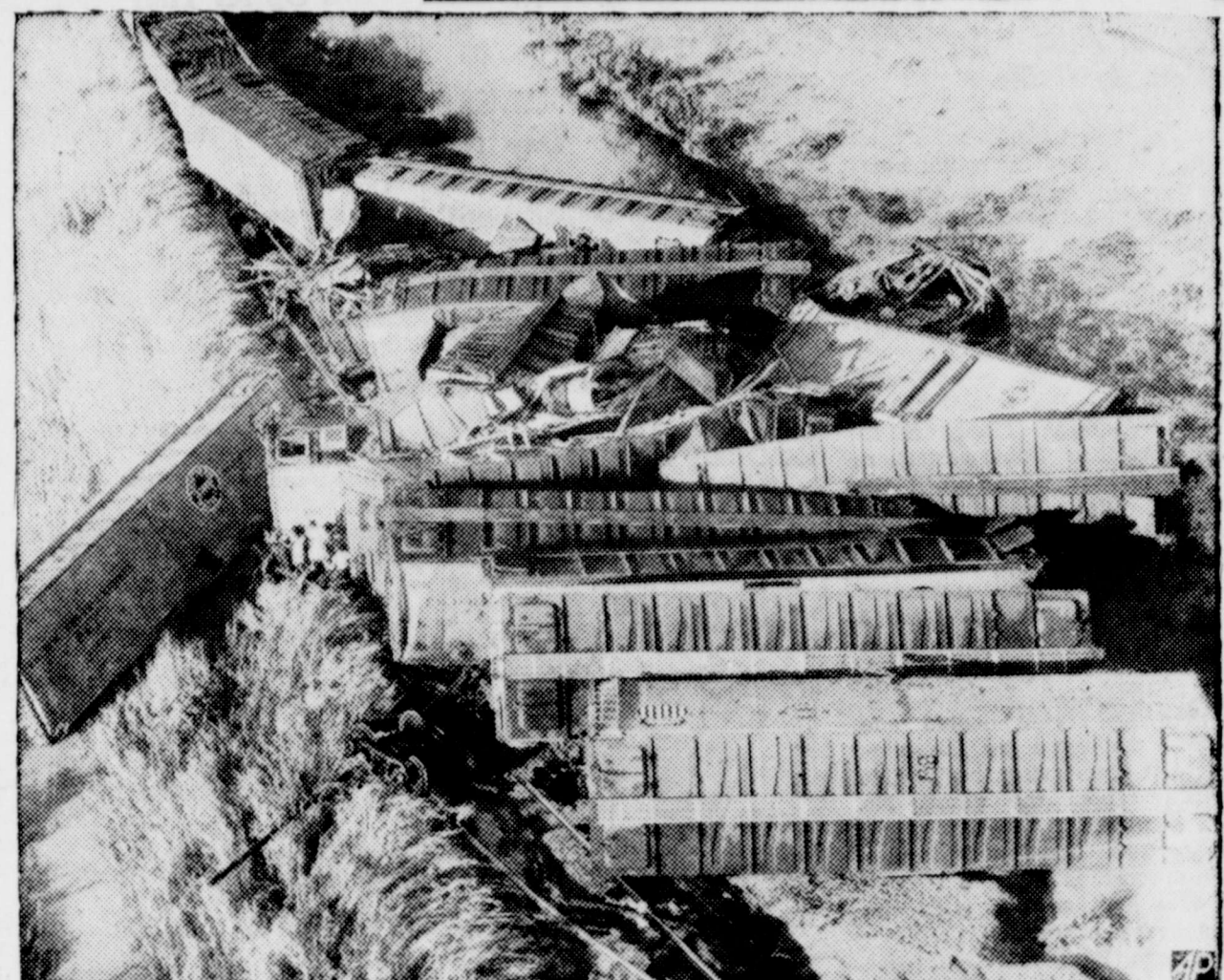
In previous surveys, the question was worded merely as follows: "In your opinion, should Texas do away with or continue to have a poll tax?" There was no addition of the phrase, "as a requirement for voting." In spite of this difference, the results of the May survey were exactly the same as those of last December. An earlier survey, however, indicates that opinion used to be even more favorable to the poll tax.

The cross section for this survey included a correct proportion of Negroes as they exist in Texas.

Among the state's political leaders, poll tax repeal has gained much support because of the threat of federal action. Two out of every three members of the Texas Legislature have put themselves on record in favor of a proposed constitutional amendment in a special election set for Sept. 24.

The poll tax as a requirement for voting is still in effect in six other Southern states, besides in Texas. President Truman is in-

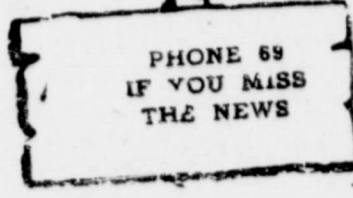

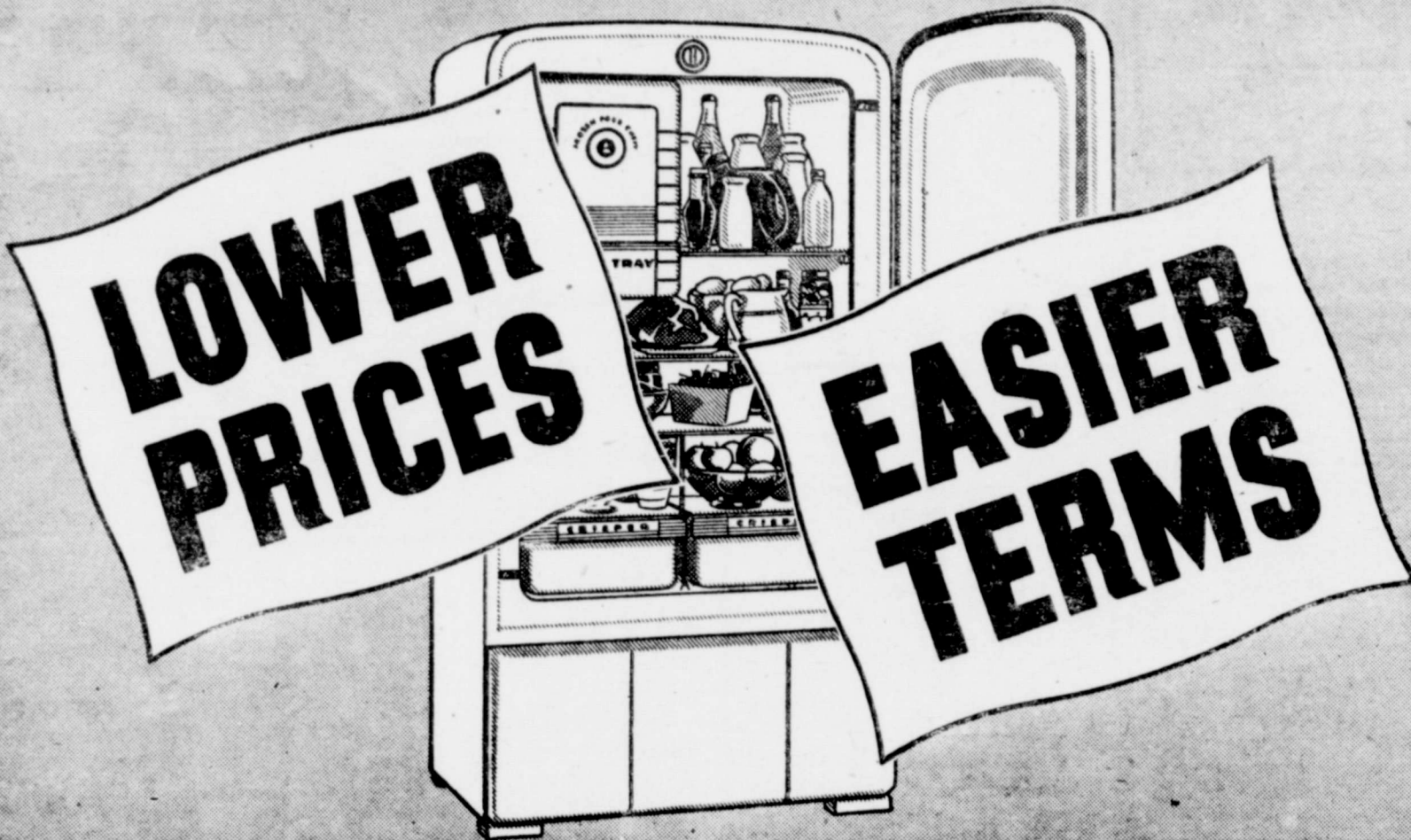
