WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7. (AP)—President Truman today described the economic situation as "bullish". He mentioned the recently rising stock market as bearing him out.

Truman also indicated he now is resigned that Congress will not pass his proposed four billion dollar tax increase.

He also said he will continue the fight for the repeal of the Taft Hartley Labor Act but left immediate action up to Congressional Leaders.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7. (AP)—Columnist Westbrook Pegler said, today Labor Unions "have become infiltrated with despots, criminals and Communists".

Pegler said "millions upon millions of dollars" are in union treasuries and may be "spent for any purpose the union's bosses choose".




