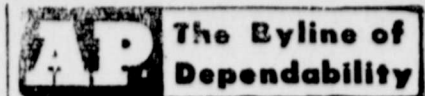

Smithwick Denied Bond: Jailed In Alice

ALICE, Aug. 4. (AP)—Deputy Sheriff Sam Smithwick accused of murdering radio commentator W. J. (Bill) Mason was denied bond and jailed today at the examining trial.

Justice of the Peace Brown Fuller ordered Smithwick held for the grand jury which meets October 31.

Although the defense pleaded Smithwick be given bond, District Attorney Sam Reams insisted that in his opinion this was a capital case and Smithwick would be assessed the death penalty.

HST Rejects Compromise On \$1,450,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4. (AP)—President Truman today rejected the suggestion that he compromise in his request for \$1,450,000,000 (billions) for arms aid to friendly nations

Truman at a news conference indicated however he does not oppose the suggested Congressional curbe on his broad authority over the funds.

He also said: "The United States will publish tomorrow a white paper relating this nations relations with China." He has rejected an offer by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to resign as a member of the Human Rights Commission of the United Nations. He called it a routine resignation which all diplomats send in regularly.

He is not acquainted with James V. Hunt mentioned in investigations of persons who help obtain government favors for a fee.

It will be impossible to repeal any excise (sales) taxes before the next Congressional session.

IS AMERICA "ILL-HOUSED"?

If you listen only to boosters for government housing, you will sometime get the miserable feeling that America is in a bad way for shelter and housing. You will be made to feel that the situation is beyond remedy and nothing at all is being done about it. According to the "let-government-do-it" boys, if we don't start throwing billions of tax dollars around for housing projects, then the whole population is at once ill-housed.

Record of Industry
While the year 1947 did not quite reach the peak of our building boom in 1925, it is estimated that 825,000 new homes were built. One family out of every 40 got a new house in 1947. That is an excellent record! The Bureau of Census has reported that 93.2 per cent of all city houses are in satisfactory repair, compared to 88.6 per cent in 1940. Our American housing is steadily improving, despite the many difficulties that have been placed in the way.

One of these problems facing private building is government activity in house construction. Many government projects put up so far are said to have been built because costs were too high for the citizens to undertake them. Yet, because the government is willing to pay these same "high" costs, the costs are sure to remain high. In government housing, the difference between the rental income and the actual cost is simply passed on to the taxpayer. The government can't work miracles but it can levy taxes.

Slum Clearance
If it is the object of federal housing legislation to clear away slums, then I say let communities in which these poor conditions exist clean up their bad sections. Some cities have already put slum clearance programs into effect, without calling on Congress for legislation. Our local governments can do much to stimulate building. Besides requiring property owners to meet good housing standards, they can also eliminate "horse-and-buggy" building codes that keep costs high.

To assume that Congress, with a public housing bill, can clear away slums, is taking a phony position. There will always be some older and less expensive housing, no matter how much we may build. But if you take charge of the folks with very low incomes and put them in palaces, the rest will be paying the bill for it. Then who gets the premium? This is a beautiful way to get-more-for-doing-less! You see, the fellow who earns less is better off!

What You Can Do
A public housing bill could in no way relieve the housing shortage. Certainly, this is not the time for the government to come in and bid up prices of the building materials that are available. Right now, a government housing program would bring no additional skilled labor into the industry, but would simply take the labor that already works for private builders. Do you think these men would produce any more housing, working for the government?

If you want to add to inflation and make it more difficult for private housing to go up; if you want to pay your share of multi-billion dollar expenditures; if you want to risk these experiments while European recovery is costing us billions; if you want a federal bureau to control 10 per cent of our housing and keep building prices high; if you want to create a giant bureau for political purposes—then you're for public housing. But the only sane thing to do is to ask your Congressman to oppose public housing bills.

CHAPTER XVIII

The Dust of Kings

Lampasas, "Lily Pads" for that is the interpretation of the Spanish for the name of that beautiful river. It flows thru a wide valley in our beautiful hill country. Most of the soil in this region is stubborn and stony, and many people believe that in its miserly clutches it holds the dust of an Aztec King.

After Cortez's first entry into the City of Mexico the native warriors arose in rebellion and drive the Spaniards and their Tlascalan Allies out, but not until the greedy Spaniards had filched the city of several million dollars worth of gold. Before the second attack upon the city by Spaniards and their hundred thousand Indian Allies the Montezuma notified Cortez that if he were able to re-enter the city he would find it barren of gold. When the Indian monarch was convinced that a second attack was about to be made upon the city he stripped it of every particle of gold and on the backs of fleet footed Indian runners, he sent it to the far outposts of the empire to be hidden in secret places, safe from the violent, grasping hands of the conqueror.

Pictograph maps were made of each locality where gold was hidden so that the rightful owners, could in time, retrieve the gold. Legent says that the "Mexican Charts" that we hear so much of, were made at that time and have been in the secret possession of the descendents of the Aztecs since that time 420 years ago when the Aztec empire was conquered by the Spaniards and their Indian Allies. Those charts are now being used by apparently humble Mexicans in efforts to locate the anciently hidden gold.

Could old King Tut be brought to the hills of Coryell County and be shown the tomb of an ancient Aztec King that legend says the unrelenting hills holds in the miserly grasp, he would turn green with envy.

The proverbial Mexican came to the Lampasas with a chart and fell in with a wood chopper. We was looking for a tomb containing three vaults, each lined with solid masonry. A location was made, and upon excavation modern coffin handles were found. Our Mexican had read his chart wrongly. To him the tomb is still lost, but one man, if no more in Coryell County, has it located.

In the hills north of Owl Creek a hill farmer walks over this tomb every time he walks from his front gate into his house. He nightly snores in peaceful slumber within the length of his bed of a tomb containing three chambers. One chamber is empty; one contains the dust of an ancient King and a magnificent diadem made of hammered gold and studded with precious jade, sacred turquoise and glittering pearls. A crown that King Philip, in all his glory, was too poor to duplicate.

The Aztec goldsmiths were the most excellent the world has ever seen, and into the third vault was thrown load after load of golden trinkets representing birds, beasts, gods and every other pattern is scited the goldsmiths fancy to fabricate. They were not jack loads, for there were no jacks available to the Mexicans of that day. They were man loads, for the Mexicans had no beasts of burden at that time, and all transportation was upon the backs of hardy Indians trained to that work.

"Yes," my informant says, "it is there in that farm yard. I have tromped all over it. But what am I to do about it?" There it is where it has lain for more than four centuries. Who will contrive to redeem it? Will a dead monarchs dust someday be thrown out to mingle with the dust of the silent cedar brakes, and his gold dissipated in riotous living.

Associated with this tomb that holds the dust, and wealth of an ancient king, are a number of strange weird stories. W. A. Mathney of Waco, and others have done considerable exploring in the region along a line that follows an approximate straight route from the mouth of Station Creek on the Leon River to Sugar Loaf Mountain. The kings tomb is somewhat north of this line. On the Leon River near our starting point, Mathney and his confederates have found what they believed to be the remains of an ancient dam built by some prehistoric race that dwelt here, to impound the waters of the Leon River. This dam, however, is not ancient at all. Descendents of pioneers tell of a dam built by "Old Captain Graham" to impound water to turn a grist mill and I have talked with two pioneer sons who remember having gone to the mill there with their fathers. (We infer that "Old Captain Graham" refers to Captain Gideon Gra-

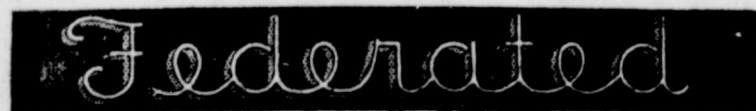

ham, whose small son was killed by Comanche Indians). Following the line toward Sugar Loaf Mountain several caves have been located. In one of them was found the skeleton of a man chained to a copper peg that had been driven into the living rock. Nearby were more skeletons. Further on toward Sugar Loaf was a strange well. When the wind blows from the south this well furnishes an abundance of water. The flow of the water was so strong that it floated out green leaves and small mammals from some unknown region and furnished a draft of air that would "blow your hat off". When the wind is from the north the well dries up. Mathney believes that there are extensive subterranean caverns that furnish the air drafts. Back along the route toward Station Creek, many lesser caves and some ancient mining shafts have been found.

Over near Sugar Loaf are numerous caves and a surveyor has been employed to trace lines, and strange carvings found on stone, to their focal point. The point of supreme interest is back in the hills north of Owl Creek. On the way back let us go by Luther Stovalls cave south of Owl Creek. Here many years ago Luther Stovall began excavating a curious cave or rock shelter in a bluff on his farm. The remains showed it to pre-date any Spanish influence. Hundreds of stone artifacts belonging to the Neolithic stone age were found. The camp refuse had accumulated to several feet in depth. On many stones were carved symbols that could not be deciphered. Below the cave, in the field, was an extensive midden that yielded hundreds of stone age artifacts. In this field was found a piece of jade, also several pieces of obsidian. There is no known source of supply for obsidian within 800 or 900 miles of this place and no man can tell the source of the jade.

From Stovalls farm it is but a few miles into the hills north of Owl Creek where strange things have happened. Some prospectors began to notice carvings on stone, many of them, and hundreds of yards apart. Spears, tomahawks and other symbols. Upon close study of these it was found that they had a common focal indication. After months of exploring a few large stones were removed from a point overlooking a valley, and behold, an ancient mining shaft, large enough for a man to go down into. In time this was penetrated to a depth of about thirty feet; here a tunnel was found, striking down at about a 45 degree angle. This extended about 40 feet. Here in direct contrast with the solid limestone was a hard, red sandstone dike. A large part of the sandstone had been broken off and removed from the tunnel. The finders of this strange place believed they had found an abandoned mine that had been worked by ancient Indians or Mexicans. Back on the surface, a hammered copper spear-head and a knife of the same material was found.

An Indian interpreter was brought to the scene. The Indian declared that three bows with drawn arrows found carved on neighboring rock, indicated that three great battles had been fought there by ancient Indians who were contending for possession of the place. Other symbols indicated that this had been a place of great importance to the ancient people who dwelt here. Whatever the importance to the ancient people this place might have had, it is no less important to a few modern men and women. It has furnished a legend, a dream of wealth, and filled weary prospectors with high hope. There are no less than three companies of men and women trying to solve the mystery of this place. Some of them are professional men and women who dream of removing a vast fortune, in the form of gold bullion, from this place, or its environs.

A man and woman from Waco penetrated this shaft during a cold, rainy winter night. Their divining rod "cut all kinds of capers" while in and around this shaft.

One of the caves on this strange line of signs and symbols has a distinctly modern tinge, in so far as its contents are concerned. In this cave, 500 feet, or was it yards (?) back from the entrance, W. A. Mathney found a Wells Fargo strong box. This cave is big enough to lead a horse into, for Mathney states that he hitched a horse to the handle of the strong box to try to dislodge it from its resting place in a crevice of the rock. He was able only to pull the handle off it, as it was wedged so tightly in the crevice.
