

"NATIONAL" and Coryell Closely Linked In County's Growth

A history of Coryell County is closely linked and interwoven with The National Bank of Gatesville, and

Visa-Versa.

The, then, "Territory of Coryell county, was organized in March of 1854, and Gatesville, itself was then established as the county seat, there being only one other town in the county, and cattle raising was the occupation, with only about 8,000 acres under cultivation.

These facts are brought out, when you study the history of the "county" and the "bank", the latter to celebrate its 60th Anniversary, Saturday, August 20th.

Carrying on, the facts show, Coryell had 250 in autumn of 1853, and it was 1880, when Gatesville had risen to 434 souls.

In 1875, Gatesville's first bank was J. R. Saunders & Co., a private institution, which was succeeded by the City National in 1892, and it failed in 1897, all depositors being paid.

Secondly, Coryell County Bank, 1887 started, operating 2 years.

In 1889 local and non-residents joined and applied for a charter for a notional bank, which was granted August 21, 1889, and it was called The First National, and altho, many have been the changes The National Bank of Gatesville now operates under this charter, with a board of directors, Sam J. Mings, J. R. Raby, B. M. Stone, W. M. Squires, and W. B. Sedwick. S J Mings was president, J R Raby, vice-president, and A R Williams, cashied. The capital stock was 650,000, stock paid in full by end of the year, and by the close of 1889, deposits were \$55,000.00.

Rugged individualists that they were, another, The Citizens National opened in 1890, consolidated with the First National in 1891, and The Gatesville National was chartered on February 12, 1902 with J. E. Walker, president, Dan E. Graves, vice-president and J. P. Kendrick, cashier. The Farmers Bank started in 1905, lasted a year, being absorbed by The Gatesville.

The Farmers National was chartered in 1907, liquidated 2 years later by The Gatesville. Another, The State Bank & Trust Co. was organized by G. W. Royalty, Leake Ayres and others in the fall of 1907, and merged with The First in 1908.

The Guaranty State Bank & Trust Company opened in 1913, and beside The National Bank of Gatesville, is the lone operating bank in Gatesville.

The First State Bank of Turnersville voluntarily closed and was liquidated with The First in about 1927, and The First National Bank of Ireland took the same course, being liquidated by The Gatesville in 1937.

In February, 1938, The First and The Gatesville combined to form The National Bank of Gatesville and continued to operate under the charter granted in 1889.

If you add them, there have been 13 separate and distinct fi-

Republicans Plan To Shave \$160,000,000 Off Arms

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15 (AP)—Senators Vandenberg and Dulles, Republican Foreign Policy Leaders, today offered a plan to shave \$160,990,000 (million) off the Administration's \$1,450,000,000 (billion) foreign arms program.

Vandenberg said the plan would permit the recapture of any equipment furnished by this country "if the program goes sour".

The plan essentially would make interim arms aid only waiting for the defense councils of the North American Pact Countries to determine needs before more money was authorized.

Fuel Exhausted, Plane Bellied Into Atlantic

GALAWAY, Ireland, Aug. 15 (AP)—Its fuel exhausted, an American four-engined airliner bellied into the Atlantic off Ireland in darkness today. Nine of its 58 occupants were killed and the rest saved in a dramatic sea-air rescue.

Among those saved was Ruth Nichols, 48, noted American aviatrix, a stewardess.

The big Skymaster, bound from Rome to New York with 47 Italian emigrants to Venezuela and 11 Americans, overshot Shannon airport and became lost. Another American airliner, tried to escort it back to Shannon airport but the Skyliner's gasoline gave out 15 miles from the coast.

British and American transport planes guided surface vessels in rescue operations.

Nine Americans were crew members and two were employees of Transocean Airlines, the plane owners. Survivors were brought here.

Play Party Songs

We herewith append a number of old Play Party Songs to the foregoing article. We have preserved the wording, and verse form of these songs in the form they were sung forty and fifty years ago.

Weavely Wheat

I won't have none of your weavely wheat,
 Neither rye, nor barley,
 I'll take some flour in the course of an hour,
 To bake a cake for Charley.

Chorus
 Charlie is a nice young man,

 He feeds the girls on candy.

This song was sung thru as many verses as the singers could improvise, as were all the others, provided the rag time, or dance time, was not broken. It mattered not whether the rhythm was false, or true. Many an uncouth rhyme was sung to these unlettered country boys and girls.

For instance—
 "I'll have some meal if I have to steal,
 To bake a cake for Charlie."
 And—
 "Charlie is the very lad
 That stole his daddy's brandy".
 Were often sung to the Weavely Wheat verses.

Another old playparty song was "Hog Drovers". It was played by first setting two chairs in the middle of the room, side by side, facing opposite directions. A young gentleman took one, a young lady seated herself in the other. Then a couple of men circled around them singing:

Hog drovers, hog drovers, hog drovers we are,
 A courting your daughter so rare

and so fair,
 Can we get lodging here o here?
 Can we get lodging here?

Then the gentleman in the chair sung
 "I have but one daughter, she sits by my side,
 But none of you hog drovers can

make her your bride,
 You can't get lodging here, o here,
 You can't get lodging here.

To which the couple circling the chair would reply:
 "We care nothing for your daughter,
 Much less for your self,
 We'll go a house further and

better ourselves,
 We don't want lodging here o here
 We don't want lodging here.

Then from the chair:
 "O this is my daughter that sits by my side,
 And Mr. — can have her for his bride."
 By bringing me another one here,
 of here,

This last verse was sung after the young lady had been consulted as to whom she would like for a partner. After another daughter had been brought to the master of the house, the play was continued until all had partners.

The play begun by the first couple meeting in the center with a once and a half swing, and dancing to the tune of the lively song. This continued until this couple reach the foot of the line. Illiterate and coarse as it would seem to our sophisticated society, those young people of another generation found a great deal of wholesome pastime at these old play parties.

This song was begun with a mournful air; warming up as the play advanced until it became one of the liveliest dance plays sung by the folk.

Another song "Two Old Tuckers" was a grab partner song. A circle was formed by all parties in the play joining hands. Inside the circle were two boys. The song was as follows:

Farm News

Farm Activities

Trips to Turnersville, Jonesboro, Flat, Pancake, Plainview, Oglesby and Purlmela during the past week were made to visit 4-H Club work and adult demonstrations.

Swine

Clovis King has forty-six hogs on his farm. Thirteen of them are being fed in the Texas Ton Litter Contest. Too much hot weather has kept pounds off these hogs. Mr. King has just completed a concrete hog wallow. This is important in a hog program.

4-H Club boys are doing a good job developing their registered gilts. These gilts will show at Gatesville in September.

Beef Cattle

Frank Alexander, 4-H Club boy reports his Angus steer calf weighed 575 pounds August 1. This calf was started February 6th.

Shirey brothers calves weigh 300 and 900 pounds. Leslie Earl Davis' calf weighs 600 pounds plus. Four calves at Jack Days' farm being fed by the Day youngster and his sister weigh 500 to 600 pounds.

This group of calves will be shown at Houston.

Corn

Corn is good on land adapted to corn. Unfortunately too many acres are planted in the wrong crops. A good plan would be to put thinner land in temporary pastures in which hubam clover or some legume is used to build up the fertility of the soil. What is known as firing corn usually attributed to dry weather, is more often due to lack of nitrogen. It may be due to shallow plowing. Corn land should be plowed deep. Several plowings before planting helps to get the land in proper condition for making a crop.

Cotton

Dry weather has caused the shedding of much fruit. There is heavy fruiting if this crop developed. Murvil Gartman of Turnersville, was dusting for bollworms. He was using 10% DDT and 75% sulphur.

Most cotton this season has a shallow tap root and is not getting deep moisture. Showers if followed by hot sunny weather may do damage.

Terracing

Land is being terraced in every community. A heavy run on the PMA office has depleted the quarter's quota for terracing. A check with the office revealed that additional approvals will be made in October.

Sweet Sudan

J. R. Hodges is combining sweet sudan. He states seed will bring 5c per pound and the remainder of the plant will be baled for hay.

Broom Corn

Broom Corn harvest has been under way for some time. The tops of this plant is pulled. This means labor is the big problem and wet weather at harvest time makes it hazardous.

W. E. M. Cooper, I. F. Elam of the Pearl and Evant groups have completed approximately 2.4 mi. of terraces during the past week. Commissioner Curtis Smith constructed these terraces with county equipment. These terraces all have protected grass outlets.
