



Forced Prices

Foreign trade is good for our nation, just like it is good for the British. It's a two way street. If we fail to get into the competition ourselves. then our goods will stop moving as fast as we know our production lines can move them.

This lesson Britain is teaching us works at home, too. The one thing we want to do is to keep production going, for we know that our people want jobs and have the capacity to consume. But if we are going to keep forcing prices upward, we may one day realize that depression is here just because we have done that very thing. We can have nothing but false prosperity that foretells depression, if we force prices too high.

In order that the public might be brought up to date on building plans, and at the same time justify the delay. the following information is submitted:

- 1. After the bonds were voted a 30 day period was required by law before anything else could be done. This was to cure any litigation that might b. pending or brought up.
- 2. After this 30 day period an equalization board had to meet. This required 10 days notice by law. and four days were required for hearings.
- 3. After the equalization board met all the transcripts had to go to the Attorney General's department for a review. This requires time, and the Gatesville Board is now waiting on this report.

When an official report is cleared through Austin the Board is ready to start receiving bids. We hope to get this cleared within the next few days.

The bonds have been sold subject to the approval of the Attorney General.

The Gatesville School Board is standing by with plan and every thing ready as far as they can go pending the Austin clearance.

Everything possible is being done to expedite the program, and we hope to get started on the building in a very short time. The board has moved along as fast as the school laws will allow.


then mounted and rode back toward Gatesville. Mr. Matthes died about 36 hours later. The news of the murder spread rapidly. The next day Bob Wells identified Jim Leeper on the street. Mr. Matthes, before he died, told the people that one of them had taken a Mexican silver dollar off him. Jim Leeper had the silver dollar when arrested by Sheriff John Lanham. Powell told the sheriff that Leeper would be found at the Buster place (Mr. Buster was reputed to be a very fine gentleman. He knew nothing of the affair until a posse arrived to arrest Leeper.) Sheriff Lanham headed a posse, and arrested Powell. Within 24 hours of the robbery Jim Leeper and Ed Powell were behind the rock walls and iron bars of the old rock jail.

An exmaining trial was had and Ed Powell and Jim Leeper were charged with murder in the first degree. The case was set to be tried February 16, 1890. J. L. Crain, attorney for defense, made a motion for continuance of the case until the next term of court. The motion was overruled and the trial proceeded, in a heavily guarded courtroom, for it was feared that the enraged citizens would resort to mob action. The jury dliberated a short time and returned a verdict of "We the jury, find the defendants guilty of murder in the first degree, and assess the penalty at death."

A motion for a new trial was filed. It was denied. A notice of appeal was given. On May 24, 1890, the Court of Criminal Appeals re-affirmed the decision of the trial court. A motion for arrest of judgment was filed in District Court in July, 1891. It was denied.

On July 23, 1891. Jim Leeper and Ed Powell, stood before Judge C. K. Bell, in open court for the purpose of having sentence passed. Again the Court was under which he euolgized the earl ypioneers and declared that heavy guard to prevent mob action. The spectators were very restless as they waited for Judge Bell to pronounce to the determination of our forefathers to make this secsentence of death. "Jim Leeper, Ed Powell, is there anything you would say before sentence of death is passed be hanged by the neck, at public execution, until you are dead."

Much conniving was done by J. L. Crane to free his clients, or to stay execution, even thru Governor J. S. Hogg, but to no avail. On September 29, 1891, vast throngs gathered to witness the oonly official execution Coryell County has ever had. Armed guards were again placed at all strategic points, to protect the prisoners from mob violence. At 2 o'clock Sheriff John Hammack sprung the trap and the souls of the two men were released to the keeping of eternity. The double scaffold on which the men were hung, was erected at the rear of the jail.

Old Log Jail Is Moved

Since the preceding account of the Old Jog Jail was published the history minded people of Coryell County have placed the old eddifice in Raby Park as a memorial to the pioneers who dared carve a new country out of the wilderness nearly a hundred years ago.

Saturday, September 26, 1947, hundreds of people gathered in Raby Park to witness the dedication of the first unit of the Corvell County Museum, which was the old jail moved from the Powell farm to be set up as a place to preserve historical data, and pioneer relics of the long ago. The old edifice is now solidly set on a ce- CHROME DINETTE ment floor and is filled with relics and historical mementoes illustrating the early pioneer period of Coryell County.

In the dedication ceremonies, Horace Jackson served as master of ceremonies of a service which began at 4 o'clock. Ed Davidson, son of the rst couple married in Coryell County, delivered the invocation. Mayor Kermit R. Jones spoke an address of welcome; Mrs. Crawford Scott read the Corvell County records pertaining to the erection of the jail. The Gatesville High School Band played several numbers including "The Old Gray Mare."

Judge R. B. Cross delivered the dedicatory address in the log building would be a "silent symbol thru the years tion of Texas a strong law-abiding country."

"These people were ruggedly honest", the judge said. upon you?" There was no response. "I sentence you to "They were workers whose prime concern was to build and erect a society here that would give their children and their children's children a maximum of liberty and freedom consistent with the law. Liberty and freedom were magic words in those days, serving as a veritable cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night to guide them in transforming this section from near savagery to a civilized community."

"May we hold high the torch hande dus by our fore- HOTPOINT ELECTRIC fathers, and may we preserve the freedom they fought to give us. It is with this spirit that this historic little structure is dedicated as the Corvell County Museum." Judge Cross then presented the keys to the building to Mrs. T. R. Mears, President of the Coryell County Historical Society which manages the Museum.

Mrs. Mears called for the support of the citizens in her organization's efforts to collect historical data and relics. She surprised the audience by saving "the state archives contain less historical information on Coryell County than any other county in the state. She also praised the pioneer mothers of the county saying they were deserving of equal honor with the men.

Mr. Jackson then introduced all decendants of the Corvell County organizers, and recognized other pioneer FELTBASE RUGScitizens in the audience.

Ed Elms and his quartet, composer of himself, Troy Jones, William Black, and R. H. Wicker, sang some old-Ph. 69 time songs, after which the program was closed with Mrs. A. W. Ellis' singing "The Star Spangled Banner."
