## HISTORY OF CORYELL COUNTY

(Continued From Last Week)
The story follows
Tearing down of the Old Jail brings bac kto mind the act that it once held Powell and Leeper, Bill Babb, and many other early day outlaws, but it also brings back the memory of incidents that illustrate the code of frontiersman, such as an incident which happened there 60 years

There was one man in the jail, in particular, that had cen accused of a very foul deed in an adjoining county, and had been brought here for safe keeping. It is around him that our story hinges.

Some of the men in the run-around and Ben McClimfon, the deputy sheriff went in to feed them. They overpowered him,
In the lower southeast room were Mrs. Ben Friend, wife of the sheriff, an infant daughter, only a few days old, and an old Negro woman. As soon as she heard the disturbance in the rear, and realized what had happened, she hurried the Negro woman off for help. She then got out of bed, locked the front door, tossed the keys out the window, and returned to her room and sat down by the cradle of her baby. When the men saw their escape blocked by the iron door in front, they turned to her and demanded that it be opened. She told them that their efforts to escape would be useless for the alarm had already been given. For a few moments pandemonium prevailand then the so-called bad man stepped forth and said: Mrs. Friend, we surrender to you." He then gave her the kevs to the cells and hurried the others back into the jail. As the last one passed in he protested: "You damn fool! why didn't you knock that woman down and take those keys? you knew she had them." He replied: "I would be in jail til I rotted before I'd touch a woman.' And so a jali break was prevented because of the rev. erence that an outlaw had for a defenseless woman.
Another incident, strange but true, which had its setting in the home of Ben Friend several years after he retired from the sheriff's office. Mr. Friend had moved to his farm, a double log, pioneer type house with a hall between two main rooms, and shed rooms at the rear.
One evening late in the fall, Mr. Friend was frolicking with his children before the open fire place, when a stranger called at the door. Mr. Friend went to meet the man, with the little girl on his shoulder, and a couple of children tagging at his trousers.

The gloomy, sullen man was invited in to spend the night, and Mr. Friend, still playing with the children, tried to engage the man in conversation, but he would say very little, remaining sullen and gloomy. Supper was called, the stranger was invited to offer thanks. He refused, saying he had very little to be thankful for in this life. Mr. Friend then offered thanks and asked God's blessings be showered upon this stranger within his gates. After supper, all gathered around the fire place, and the stranger still refused to be led into conversation. At bed time, he was shown his bed in one of the shed rooms.
Next morning, Mr. Friend went to call the strange man to breakfast. He was gone.

A few months later, Mr. Friend received a letter, post marked in a western town. The writer related that he was the man who had accepted his hospitality a few months before; and that his mission was to kill the former sheriff for having gotten him convicted to the penitentiary while sheriff. He had intended to shoot Mrs. Friend, but feared he might injure the baby. He had seen the happiness manifestedi n his hosts family and that ferverent prayer for a wandering outcast, intent upon murder, struck to the core of his heart, and that the future did not seem nearly so dark as the night he had gone out into when he left the Friend home. His resolution to kill had left him and a resolution to be an honest, useful man, had led him into a life of usefulness.

## Powell \& Leeper

In the early winter of 1889 , December 17, John T. Mathes and W. H. H. Harvey headed their wagon train out of Gatesville over the Lampasas Road, for thev lived southwest of Gatesville in the Cowhouse River valley, They had been in Gatesville marketing cotton and nurchasing winter supplies. The day was sunny, and the slow moving wagon train lumbered across the prairies that stretch from the Leon to the brushy hills that overlook the Cowhouse valley. They reached Hard Bargain mountain and slowly descended to the leveler prairies at the foot of the steep hills. They were nearing their homes.
Back on the road, they had passed over, two horsemen were following them. At a side road, Bob Wells, who had been to his ranch, turned into the public road in time

then mounted and rode back toward Gatesville. M Matthes died about 36 hours later. The news of the murder spread rapidly. The next day Bob Wells identified Jim Leeper on the street. Mr. Matthes, before he died, told the people that one of them had taken a Mexican silver dollar off him. Jim Leeper had the silver dollar when arrested by Sheriff John Lanham. Powell told the sheriff that Leeper would be found at the Buster place (Mr. Buster was reputed to be a very fine gentleman. He knew nothing of the affair until a posse arrived to arrest Leeper.) Sheriff Lanham headed a posse, and arrested Powell. Within 24 hours of the robbery Jim Leeper and Ed Powell were behind the rock walls and iron bars of the old rock jail.
An exmaining trial was had and Ed Powell and Jim Leeper were charged with murder in the first degree. The case was set to be tried February 16, 1890. J. L. Crain, attorney for defense, made a motion for continuance of the case until the next term of court. The motion was overruled and the trial proceeded, in a heavily guarded courtroom, for it was feared that the enraged citizens would resort to mob action. The jury dliberated a short time and returned a verdict of "We the jury, find the defendants quilty of murder in the first degree, and assess the penalty at death.'

A motion for a new trial was filed. It was denied. A notice of appeal was given. On May 24, 1890, the Court of Criminal Appeals re-affirmed the decision of the trial court. A motion for arrest of judgment was filed in District Court in July, 1891. It was denied.
On July 23, 1891. Jim Leeper and Ed Powell, stood before Judge C. K. Bell, in open court for the purpose of having sentence passed. Again the Court was under heavy guard to prevent mob action. The spectators were very restless as they waited for Judge Bell to pronounce sentence of death. "Jim Leeper, Ed Powell, is there anything you would say before sentence of death is passed upon you?" There was no response. "I sentence vou to be hanged by the neck, at public execution, until you

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Much conniving was done by J. L. Crane to free his lients, or to stay execution, even thru Governor J. S. Hogg, but to no avail. On September 29, 1891, vast throngs gathered to witness the oonly official execution Coryell County has ever had. Armed guards were again placed at all strategic points, to protect the prisoners from mob violence. At 2 o'clock Sheriff John Hammack sprung the trap and the souls of the two men were released to the keeping of eternity. The double scaffold of the jail.

## Old Log Jail Is Moved

Since the preceding account of the Old Jog Jail was published the history minded people of Coryell County have placed the old eddifice in Raby Park as a memorial to the pioneers who dared carve a new country out of the wilderness nearly a hundred vears ago
Saturday, September 26, 1947, hundreds of people gathered in Raby Park to witness the dedication of the first unit of the Coryell County Museum, which was the old jail moved from the Powell farm to be set un as a place to preserve historical data, and pioneer relics of the long ago. The old edifice is now solidly set on a cement floor and is filled with relics and historical mementoes illustrating the early pioneer period of Coryell County.

In the dedication ceremonies, Horace Jackson served as master of ceremonies of a service which began at 4 o'clock. Ed Davidson, son of the rst couple married in Coryell County, delivered the invocation. Mayor Kermit R. Jones spoke an address of welcome; Mrs. Crawford Scott read the Corvell County records pertaining to the erection of the jail. The Gatesville High School Band played several numbers including "The Old Gray Mare." Judge R. B. Cross delivered the dedicatory address in which he euolgized the earl ypioneers and declared that the $\log$ building would be a "silent symbol thru the years to the determination of our forefathers to make this secof Texas a strong law-abiding country."
"These people were ruggedly honest", the judge said "They were workers whose prime concern was to build and erect a society here that would give their children and their children's children a maximum of liberty and freedom consistent with the law. Liberty and freedom were magic words in those days, serving as a veritable cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night to guide them in transforming this section from near savagery to a civilized communit
"May we hold high the torch hande dus bv our forefathers, and may we preserve the freedom they fough to give us. It is with this spirit that this historic little structure is dedicated as the Corvell County Museum.' Judge Cross then presented the keys to the building to Mrs. T. R. Mears. President of the Corvell County Historical Society which manages the Museum.
Mrs. Mears called for the supnort of the citizens in her organization's eflorts to collect historical data and relics. She surprised the audience by saving "the state archives contain less historical information on Coryell County than any other countv in the state. She also praised the pioneer mothers of the county saying they were deserv ing of equal honor with the men
Mr. Jackson then introduced all decendants of the Corvell County organizers, and recognized other pioneer citizens in the audience.
Ed Elms and his quartet. comboser of himself, Trov Jones, William Black. and 'R. H. Wicker, sang some old time songs, after which the program was closed with Mrs. A. W. Ellis' singing "The Star Spangled Banner." Here, let us pay tribute to Bain Allen and Emmett Dickie, whom it was, furnished the finances to remove the Old Jail from the Powell far moto Raby Park. In addition, it was historic relics drawn from Bain Allen's private museum to provide the newly dedicated museum with its first large collection representing pioneer times. Continued
