On State 36 from US 84 in Gatesville southeast 6.0 miles, a contract for grading, drainage structure, flexible base and hot mix asphaltic concrete paving has been let to R. W. McKinney for a total bid of \$419,295.72. No work order has been issued.

On US 190, Lampasas to Bell County line, a 7.8 mile project for grading, drainage structures, flexible base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement is 38 percent completed by Fred Hall and son, using 95 of the 200 contract days since work began Feb. 27 and doing \$177,999 worth of work on the estimate of \$514,370.

Texas State Highway Patrolmen 9-1 will get \$365 per month to \$386, depending on assignment. Trainees will get \$325 while in training at the Department's Law Enforcement Academy at Austin, and \$350 during their on-the-job training in the field.

Joe Dean McCutcheon Drowned 10:15 p.m. Wednesday, Lake Belton

Joe Dean McCutcheon, 25, of Flat drowned about 10:15 p.m., Wednesday in the Temple Park area of Lake Belton. He was a son of X Carl McCutcheon of the Leon Junction, Flat communities.

McCutcheon and 4 other men were fishing from a 16-foot cabin cruiser when it ran out of gas. Trying to refill the tank, the boat caught fire and all five, wearing life preservers, jumped out.

Coy B. Faucett of Temple, one of the men who leaped out, said he saw McCutcheon go under and tried to swim to him but couldn't make it in time. Others who escaped to safety were Bill Terrell, Temple, owner of the boat, Bob Bedford and Charles Clawson, both of Temple.

The Belton rescue squad was searching for McCutcheon's body late Wednesday night. The boat was still burning at 11 p.m.

Bill Couch, who lives at Belton Reservoir, saw the boat burning and put out in his boat and took two of the survivors off a fishing boat that had picked them all up. Two were hanging to the burning boat.

The boats then swept a large area but were unable to find the body, and Thursday morning, reports were it had not yet been found.

The cruiser drifted from a point near the east shore of the lake across almost to the opposite side before it sank.

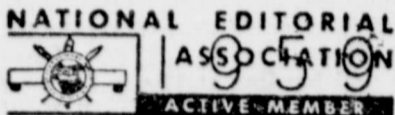

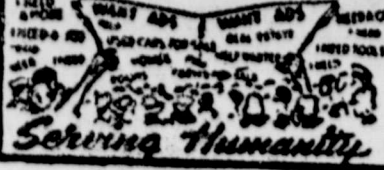

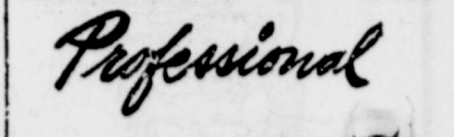

# WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDE

Congressman Thomas N. Downing of Virginia, the same state that gives Congress that very practical Senator, Harry Byrd, is espousing a plan to pay off the national debt.

Now, of course, everybody talks about the national debt and the need to do something about it. Usually, about that is done is to raise the debt limit.

So it is quite refreshing when Congressman Downing comes up with a plan.

Give or take a few billion, the national debt now stands somewhere around \$285 billion. It keeps growing all the time.

It is costing something like \$8 billion a year right now to pay the interest on this debt. In fact, Congressman Downing claims 11 cents out of every dollar paid in income taxes goes for interest on the debt, making this item second only to national defense in the national budget.

The interest charges are also bound to go up, as witnessed by the government's difficulty in making any more low cost loans. Uncle Sam now owes so much money that he is no longer considered a preferred borrower at low interest rates.

Rep. Downing also points out if the government postpones paying anything on the principal of the debt for the next hundred years, at the end of that time there will be \$10 billion dollars will be paid out in interest on the national debt will be \$10 billion dollars.

Thus, he feels it is high time that government face the facts like any individual does when he finds himself deep in the hole. He budgets out of current income something to pay on the principal amount of his debt, curtailing other expenditures.

Both Rep. Downing and Rep. James Wright of Texas believe there are sufficient frills that can be cut out to permit the government to budget a stated amount every year to apply on the debt.

His plan calls for a payment of at least 1% per year, which on the present basis would amount to a principal payment of less than \$3 billion per year. In 100 years the debt would be paid.

Now it is interesting to note that this annual payment on the national debt is substantially less than what is thrown away every year in foreign giveaways.

In fact, if this plan had been started a few years ago, instead of the world wide giveaways, the national government today would be well on the way to getting out of debt.

Undoubtedly this plan will get attention in Congress, whether it is put over depends on how much support is given it.

Obviously it is right and logical from a moral, economic, and financial standpoint, but such viewpoints don't always prevail in the Potomac madhouse. There are undoubtedly many who dream that they will wake up some morning and find that some magic worked by the night, and the debt is paid.

### A STORAGE RACK FOR BASEBALL EQUIPMENT

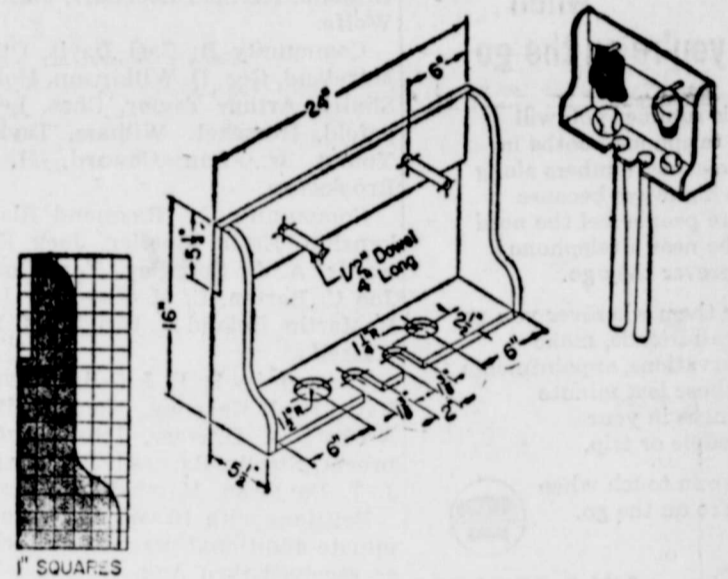
Placing baseball equipment in a storage rack helps maintain the equipment in better condition for next season.

The rack is made of 1 by 6-inch lumber and 1/2-inch dowel rods. The side panels are made as shown. The pattern is inscribed on the sides and the pieces cut with a coping saw. The bottom is cut to fit between the side panels. Holes and slots are made with an expansion bit and/or coping saw. Drill

holes in the back for the dowel rods with a No. 8 auger bit.

Assemble the rack using flat-head wood screws for the back. Fit the bottom between the sides and fasten in place with finishing nails. Glue the dowels in place. Sand smooth and round all sharp edges.

Hang in the youngsters' room or, in the basement. If attached to cinder blocks, use cut nails.

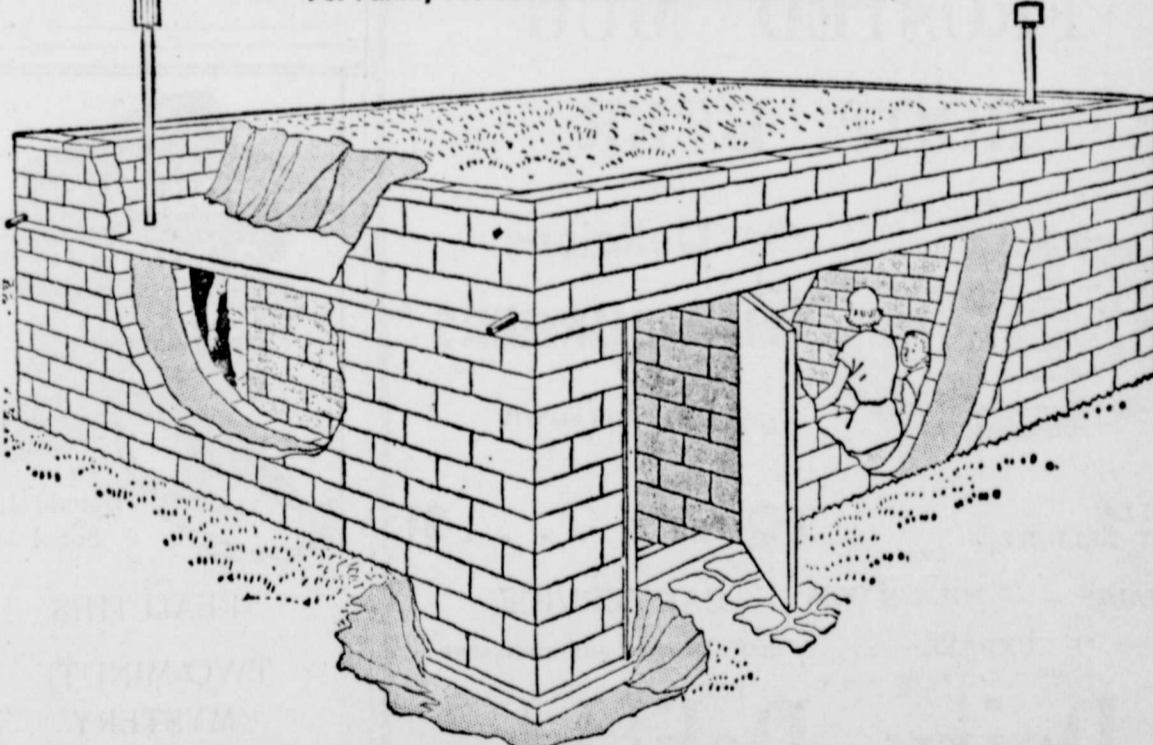

## ABOVEGROUND DOUBLE-WALL SHELTER

For Family Protection From Radioactive Fallout



AN OUTDOOR aboveground fallout shelter may be built of concrete blocks. It is recommended for houses without basements or for regions where water or rock is close to the surface, making it impractical to build an underground shelter. Two walls of concrete blocks are constructed at least 20 inches apart. The space between is filled with gravel or earth. The walls are held together

with metal ties placed in wet mortar as the walls are built. The roof is a six-inch slab of reinforced concrete, covered with at least 20 inches of gravel or earth. Unused wall space can be put to work if you install a cabinet for fancy chinaware or silver.

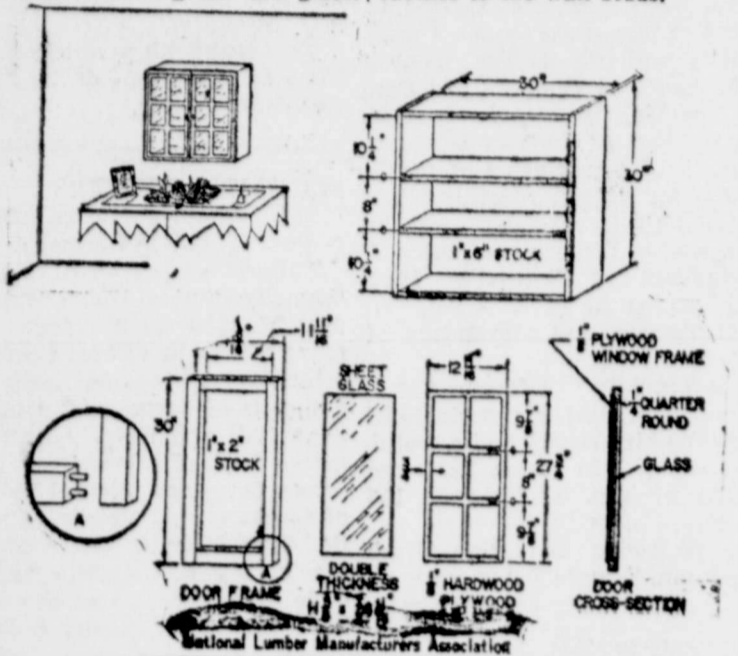
The cabinet frame is made of 1 by 6-inch lumber assembled with glue and wood screws.

Door frames are made of 1 by 2-inch lumber. Dowel joint the corners as shown in inset A. Quarter-round 1/4-inch moulding is nailed on the inside edge of the frame to provide a backing for the glass.

The moulding should be 1/4 inch in from the front face of the frame.

The window framing is cut from hardwood plywood as shown. The panes are 5 7/32 inches wide. Place the glass against the moulding and position the frame over the glass, fastening it to the door frame.

Hang the door. Attach the cabinet to the wall studs.

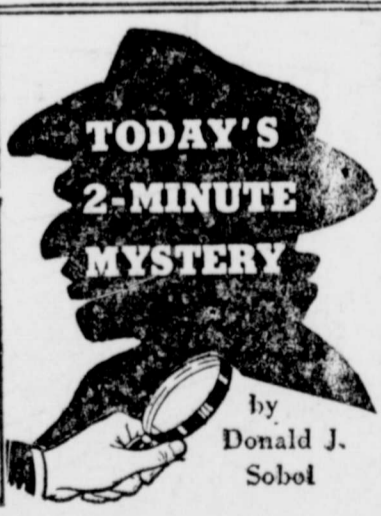

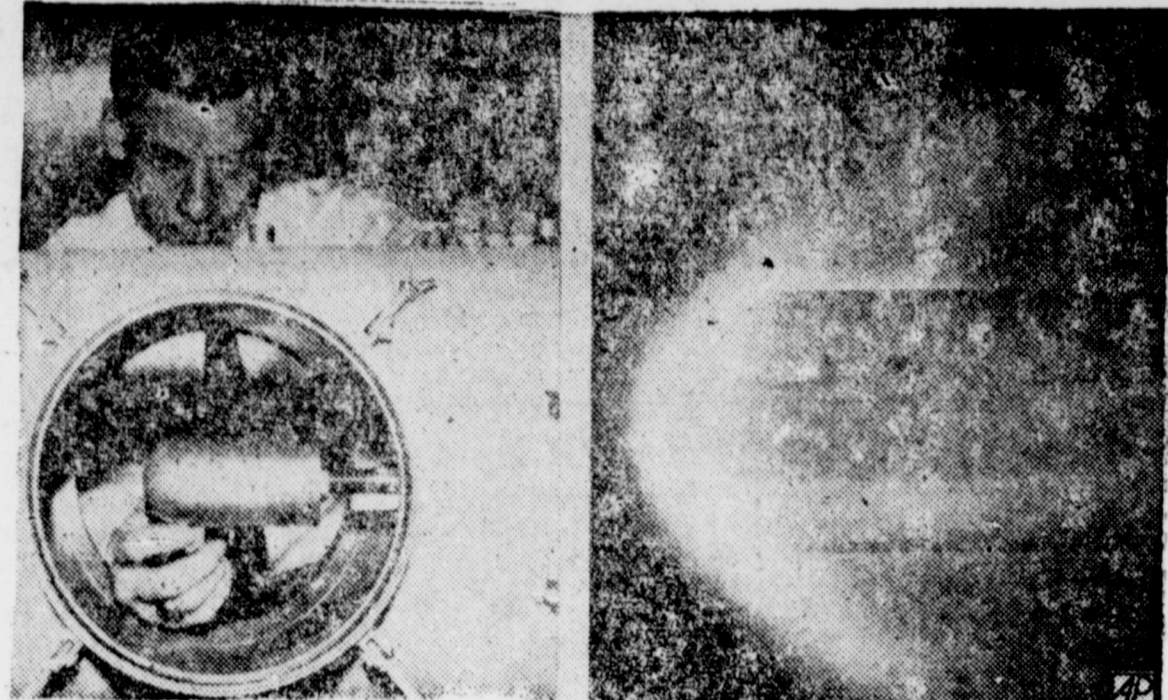
