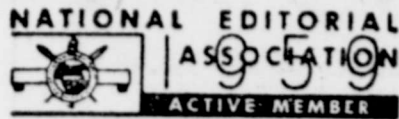

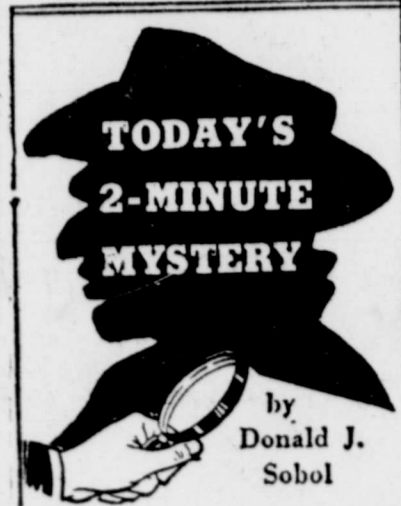
ALVIN YOUNG ADAMS

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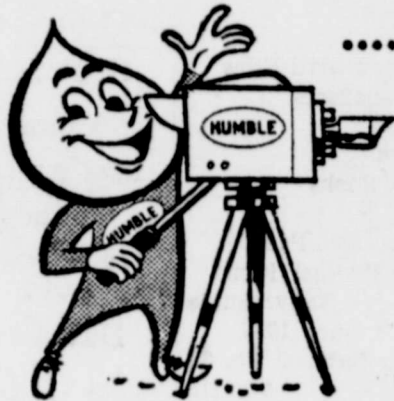

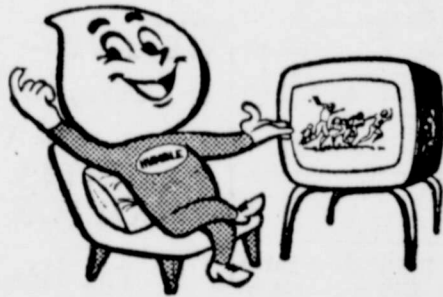

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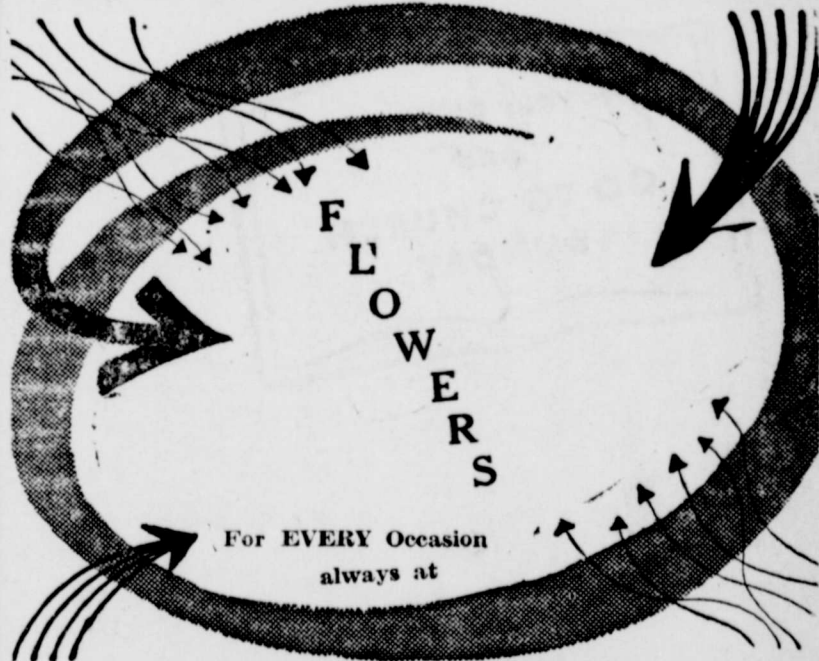

Disunity has become the great problem of Christianity.

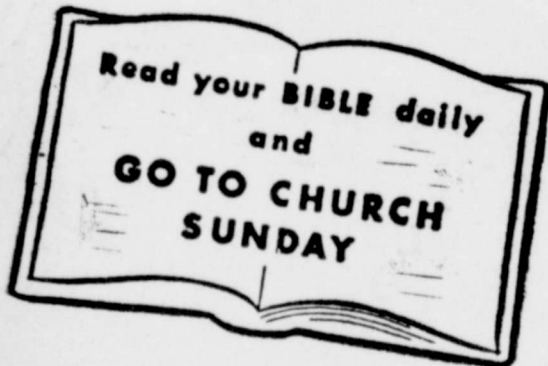
We in our modern world know something has to be done about it if Christianity is to win its greatest contest. Materialism is already far ahead in the race of winning humanity.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Governor Price Daniel signed the huge new state appropriations bill, but he exercised his constitutional prerogative to scratch out some items.

Daniel vetoed appropriations for (1) a \$26,000 home for old folks; (2) a \$200,000 tourist advertising program by the State Highway department; and (3) \$1,033,500 for interim legislative expenses.

He vetoed the old folks home, explained the governor, because "the hospital board does not have responsibility for seniles and . . . state policy should be to get these unfortunate people into private rest homes near their families rather than making them permanent patients of the state hospital system."

As to tourist advertising, the governor said that the Highway Department already is spending twice this much from other funds, and the appropriation would reduce activities.

Daniel said that he saw no need for the interim legislative expense money inasmuch as \$330,000 had been appropriated in a separate bill for future legislative expenses.

Legislative leaders replied that perhaps the state isn't supposed to be responsible for housing the aged, but the fact is it has some on its hands. They're now housed in the 50-year-old Confederate Home in Austin. It has been labeled a fire trap.

Legislative expense money was to be used to put a new carpet in the House, refinish desks and provide offices for House members. Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah said he felt it was "unprecedented for the executive branch to tell the legislative branch how to finance itself."

DIVIDING IT UP— Now that all state agencies know how much money they'll have for the next two years, governing boards have been busy deciding how to make the most of it.

STATE HOSPITAL BOARD, with an appropriation that had jumped 8.9 per cent to \$83,142,340, plans to spend \$4,500,000 for new buildings. This will include a new 300-bed unit at the Denton State School and a new home for older patients at Denton, a new ward building at Terrell State Hospital, a new recreation building and warehouse at the Austin

State Hospital and numerous road building and renovation projects.

TEXAS YOUTH COUNCIL, with a kitty that jumped from \$1,767,441 for the 1956-59 period to \$10,112,430 for the new biennium, plans to add both dormitories and personnel to the two correctional institutions, Gatesville School for Boys and Gainesville School for Girls. Some new construction and personnel also are planned for the homes for orphaned children.

SUIT OVER HAY SEEN — In the midst of plentiful rain, State Agriculture Commissioner John White has a problem arising from the 1953 drought-relief program.

White says the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture plans to sue Texas for some \$162,670 which the USDA claims it overpaid for shipping hay to Texas farmers and ranchers.

THE PAPER INDUSTRY

The paper industry in the last three years has seen its profitability decline materially under the impact of over-capacity and the 1958 business recession. In 1957 it was one of the first to feel the recession due to the excess plant constructed since World War II. With the general business recovery this year margins have been slow to improve as overcapacity continues and prices remain severely competitive.

On average, nevertheless, profit margins can be expected to become healthier over the next twelve months as supply and demand become better balanced. In the 1956-58 period total domestic papermaking capacity rose by approximately 5.8 million tons; an average of nearly 2 million a year. In the three year period 1959-1961 only 2.5 million tons are planned or around \$50,000 tons a year. Since gains in consumption are likely to average between 1.5 million and 2 million a year, we can expect the surplus paper plant to be utilized before long and that a healthier supply-demand relationship will be in existence by the end of 1960 and thereafter.

Over the longer range the growth potential for paper products remains bright. For the past quarter century the industry has grown at a rate of 4% annually. In fact, the trend could well be accelerated as new paper products and new uses are constantly being developed. The research effort in the industry has been intensified in recent years. There has also been research in forestry practices and the growth, Union Bag recently

developing a genetically improved tree which is expected to yield 25% more wood fibre than existing trees. There will thus be few problems with regard to the supply of raw materials and indeed further gains in tree research may well lower the cost of such raw materials.

A factor of increased future importance in the industry is the potential in foreign countries. Worldwide consumption of paper products is extremely low in comparison with the United States and as living standards improve in many foreign lands, the per capita demand for such products can be expected to rise markedly, as in the case of petroleum products.

The paper stocks have moved forward over the past year anticipating the healthier picture which began at the end of 1958, but many are still some distance from their previous highs. If earning power were to continue to progress over the next twelve months, we can expect further market appreciation to reflect it.
