### RADIO ACTIVE CAPSULE 'MIGHT' BE LOST IN **COUNTY: HANDS OFF!**

A radio-active capsule that "could be very dangerous" was lost off a truck between Huntsville and Sterling City. If you see it, notiiy the State Highway Patrol DON'T TOUCH!



From the first moment of life. men ought to begin learning to deserve to live; and, as at the in stant of birth we partake of the rights of citizenship, that instant ought to be the beginning of the exercise of our duty. If there are laws for the age of maturity. there ought to be laws for infancy. teaching obedience to others. And as the reason of each man is not left to be the sole arbiter of his duties, government ought the less indiscriminately to abandon to the intelligence and prejudices of fathers the education of their children, as that education is of still greater importance to the State than to the fathers. For, according to the courses of nature, the death of the father often deprives him of the final fruits of education but his country sooner or later perceives its effects. Families dissolve-but the State remains.-Rousseau.





He turned suddenly to the inspector. "I should start my questioning with Patrick Seaman." WHY?





tices work efficiently in your herd. 1. Follow a calfhood vaccination program with your replacement an'imal.

2. Buy only official vaccinated animals or animals from clean herds for replacements.

3. Keep fences in good repair to prevent wondering animals from introducing new infaction.

4. Prevent spread of disease by protecting water and feed from contamination with body discharges of animals.

5. Put animals that don't shed their afterbirth into a hospital trap until normal. Test all animals that abort. Send infected ones to slaughter.

6. Encourage your neighbors to cooperate in the fight to eradicate Brucellosis. Ask your County Agent about procedures for organiwing Convoll County into a control
