SIXTEEN GSSBS IN TWO GROUPS TAKE OFF: ELEVEN BACK AT 10:30

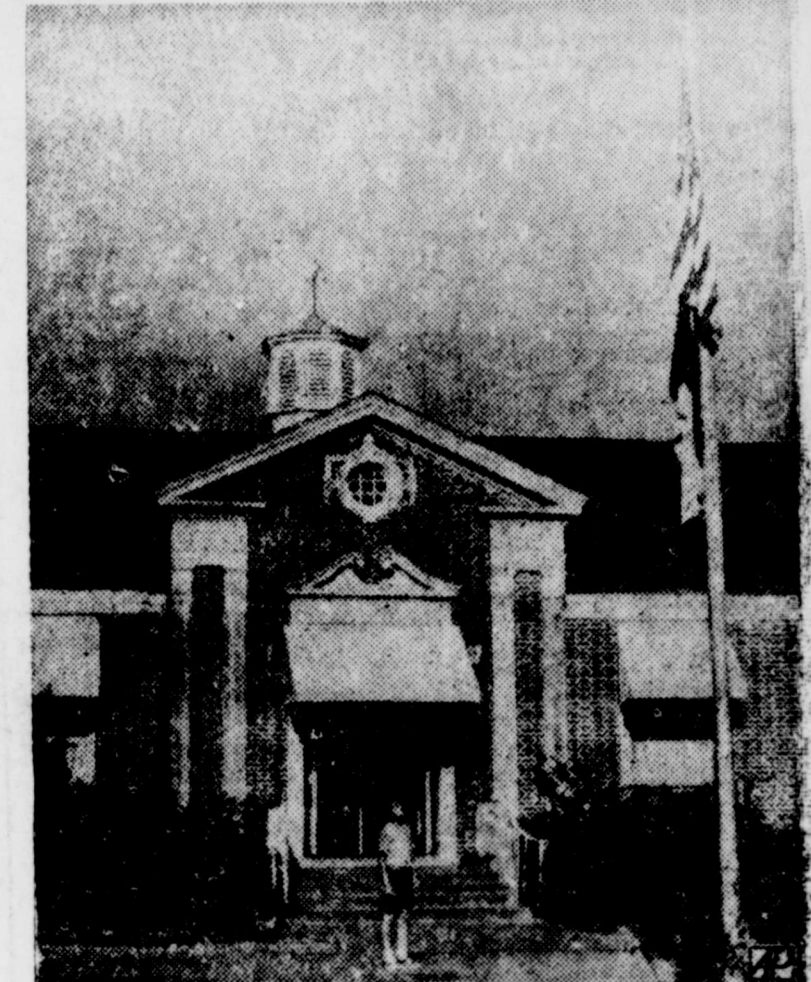
Sixteen boys in 2 groups escaped from SSB Sunday, and 11 of the 16 were back at 10:30 Sunday evening.

RADIO ACTIVE CAPSULE 'MIGHT' BE LOST IN COUNTY: HANDS OFF!

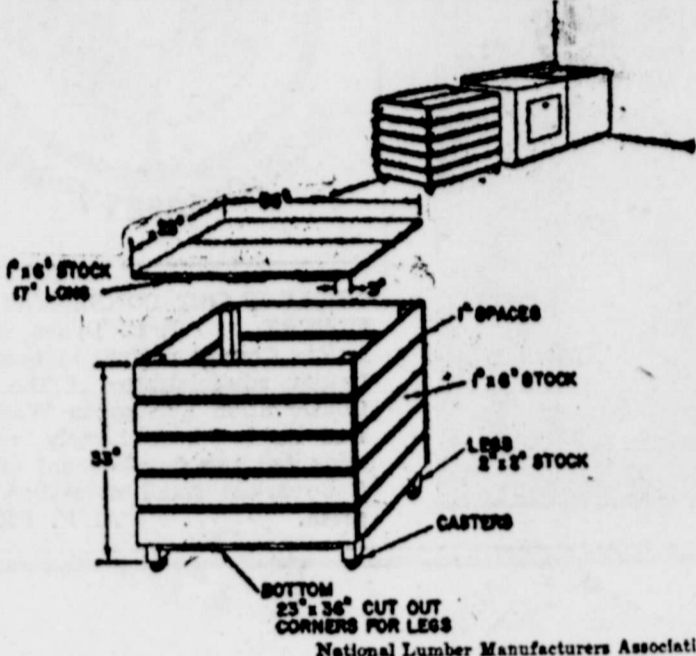
MAKE A LAUNDRY HAMPER

A laundry hamper can be easily made with a few tools and 1 by 6, 1 by 12, and 2 by 2 inch lumber. It can be conveniently placed under a laundry chute or near a washing machine.

Cut the legs to a length of 33 inches. Drill a hole on one end of each leg for the casters. The sides are made of 1 by 6-inch lumber. Cut ten pieces to a length of 36 inches.

Fasten five each to a pair of legs providing an overhang on each end of the side boards for the end boards to be fitted between them. Cut the end boards to fit so the overall width is 23 inches. Make the top and bottom of edge-glued 1 by 12-inch lumber. Use cleats for added support. Cut out the corners of the bottom.

Bevel all edges.

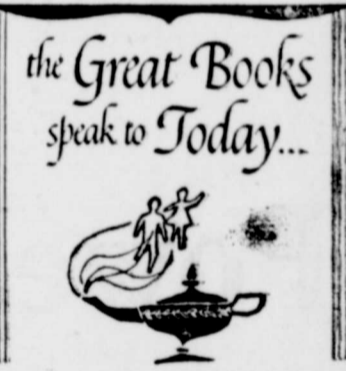

Education of Children.

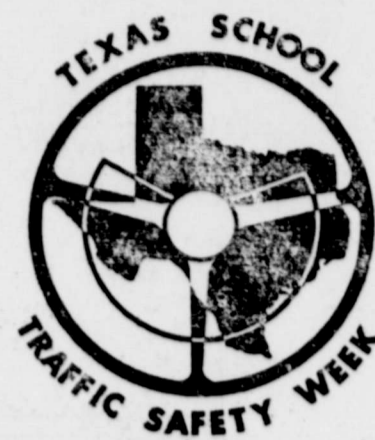

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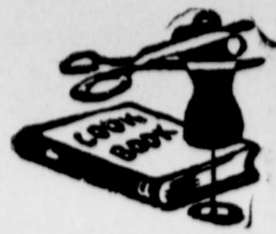

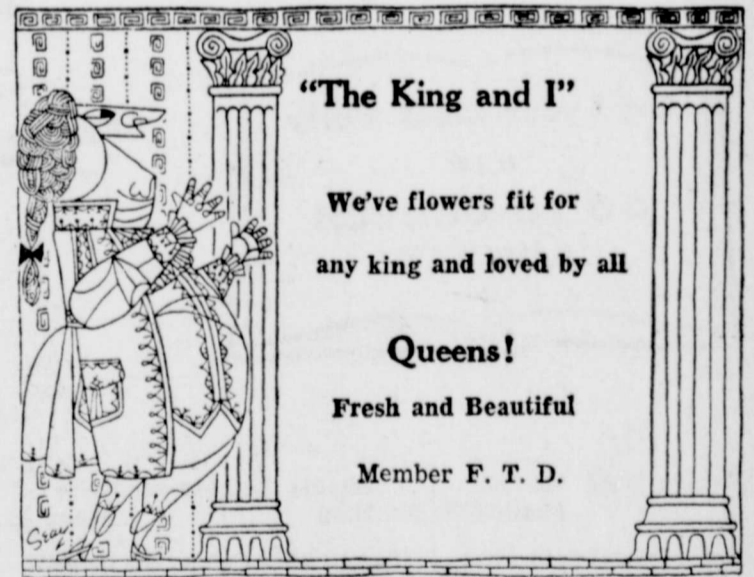

What the Law On Brucellosis Means To You

 As a cattleman in Coryell County, the Brucellosis Law enacted during the last session of the Legislature affects you. Cattlemen in Texas have become aware of the fact that twenty states and about 90 percent of the counties in the U. S. are now modified Brucellosis Free or Control areas. Texas has 7 percent of the counties so this leave only three per cent of the counties in the U. S. to which we can ship our breeding stock without any restrictions.

Available data indicates that one herd out of four contains some brucellosis or bangs infected cattle. Probably more than five percent of our cattle carry the disease. The disease directly affects you as follows:
 1. A portion of the carrier cattle about their calves.
 2. Of the animals that do not

Protect Dark Cottons From Lint In Laundry

Dark cottons will be in the family wash again this fall—Solid dark colors and plaids are popular among the school crowds as well as among other family members. Lint in the water can spoil the fresh, attractive finish on dark cottons. Here are simple washing precautions. Always wash dark cottons separately in clean water. This eliminates possibility of picking up white particles from towels, sheets and other white articles.

Brief, gentle washing is recommended, too. Washing time can be cut to a minimum with fine results if grease or oil spots are taken out with cleaning fluid before laundering. Don't overlook soiled neck lines. Thorough rinsing in soft water insures fresh colors.

One other precaution applies to any laundry, but is especially important for dark things. Go through all pockets for particles of lint. One piece of wadded cleaning tissue or one small paper napkin left in a pocket can "lint" the entire load. It may cling to fabrics through several washings and is particularly unsightly on dark pieces.

Be A Detective When You Buy!

Do you know how to be a detective when you buy furniture? If not, this column was designed expressly for you.

There are certain essentials for any home. (We can sell this "getting the facts".) They include comfort, beauty, suitability, and its needs and budget, etc.

Before you go to the store to buy, do some "private investigation." Know furniture styles—the Early American, Modern, contemporary, and traditional. Decide which best fits your needs, and the degree of formality which best suits your way of life. You will learn that styles can be moved, but with certain restrictions. Formal must be combined with formal; informal with informal.

Steps to Follow In Your Herd

Here are precautions you should follow to make the control practices work efficiently in your herd.

1. Follow a calfhood vaccination program with your replacement animal.
2. Buy only official vaccinated animals or animals from clean herds for replacements.
3. Keep fences in good repair to prevent wandering animals from introducing new infection.
4. Prevent spread of disease by protecting water and feed from contamination with body discharges of animals.
5. Put animals that don't shed their afterbirth into a hospital trap until normal. Test all animals that abort. Send infected ones to slaughter.
6. Encourage your neighbors to cooperate in the fight to eradicate Brucellosis. Ask your County Agent about procedures for organizing Coryell County into a control

The time limit has been extended for farmers to ask for rates to put their land in the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank until September 30th. There are 50 or more that has already requested a rate to be set up for their farms.
