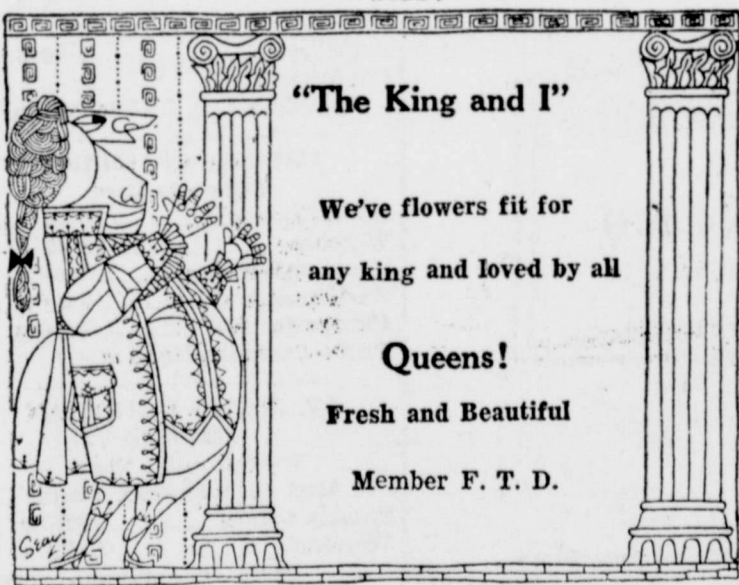

There is only one kind of equality that can be called Christian—the equality of freedom to go as far as one can with what one has, within a framework of mutual regard and respect. So far is this from socialist "equality" that calling socialism Christian is like saying chains are wings!
