Two top spokesmen for the U. S. Devartment of Agriculture got up before the National Assciation of State Departments of Agriculture in Nashville, Tenn. the other day and gave conflicting versions of what our farm income looks like in these waning months of 1959.

True D., Morse, the under-secretary of agriculture who often speaks for Secretary Ezra T. Benson, painted a somewhat rosy picture in which he saw agriculture in general in a stronger position than at any time in the past several years. Then Oris V. Wells, administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service, anneared to give us an entirely different version but one which we knew was more nearly in line with the facts back home. It made some of us wonder whether one top hand in our USDA sometimes is completely uninformed on facts another top hand knows all about.

Wells reported to us that so far in 1959 farm prices have averaged four per cent lower and net realized income of farm operators some 10 to 15 per cent below the prices and incomes for the same months in 1958. This, of course, was in sharp contrast given us the year before, when Sally Maude at NEWS Office prices had run six per cent and reailzed farm income some 20 per cent higher for the first eight months of 1958 than for the same months of 1957.

But the economist was able to remind us that "the current trend in farm vrices and farm income comes as no surprise. We had expected 1959 to be not so good a year generally in terms of farm prices and income as 1958 but nevertheless better than 1937."

He quoted is prediction from Starlast year on te 1959 outlook, to the effect htat "although an increasing flow of products from farms will probably maintain total cash receipts from farm marketings, the elimination of acreage reserve program payments after 1958, and prospects for a furth- slight rise in production expenses could well bring a reduction of some five to 10 per cent in realized net farm income, depending largely on the level of 705 M scrop production next year."





-69Number of U.S. Workers In Government Tripled WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP) --The number of government workers of all types has more than tripled in 30 years, the Commerce Department reported Tuesday. Expansion of Igovernment protolls has far outpecid private employment. About 15 per cent of all job-

holders work for federal, state and local governments, the department said. In 1929 the proportion was about 7 per cent. Government payrolls have sored from 3,184,000 in 1929 to

9,918,000 The proportion of jobholders in this category declined from 41 per cent in 1929 to 31 per cent in 1957.

"The decrease is almost entirely a reflection of the declining importance of agriculture during the past few decades," the report said.

The only major shift over the 30 years was in the proportion of workers employed in households and by nonprofit institutions. There was a drop from 7 per cent to 51/2 per cent

strange decisions that sometimes come out of the Supreme Court, it was held that a state could levy income tax against an out of state business selling in that state on a pro rata of the income derived on its sales in that state.

Thus, a firm which only had traveling salesmen going through the states selling or-ders to be shipped from the headquarters, was liable to pay income tax.

Actually, while the amount of additional taxes that would be paid were in themselves no small item, these amounts were far overshadowed by the sheer cost of preparing audits in any state and tax returns.

It is qu' + interesting to note the proce are, followed in this matter. Susinessmen all over the nation wrote to the National Federation of Independent Business asking that something be done to offset the damage created to the economy by the Supreme Court decision.

The matter was laid before ers. Thus business today must Rep. Wilbur Mills as he serves have quick access to Congress.

There are other Congressional Committees that could have taken action on this matter, but traditionally Congressional committees are most reluctant to interfere with the taxing policies of the individual states.

* * * Rep. William McCulloch introduced a remedial bill. A nationwide poll of independent businessmen by Federation heavily backed the bill.

There was quite a hassle in Congress before a bill was passed.

The bill that was finally passed does not solve the problem completely, but probably serves as a stop gap. Under its provisions, no state can levy income tax on an out of state firm which solicits orders in the state and ships them from a point outside the state.

But in addition, the bill re-quires the Senate Finance and the House Judiciary committees to make a further study of the situation and to make recommendations.

It is interesting to note that independent business in the na-tion had adequate machinery and organization to meet this threat promptly.

At one time, before the Congress delegated a lot of its powers, as Congress went, so went business. But in recent years, the Supreme Court, as well as many government bu-reaus, have taken upon themselves many law making pow-
