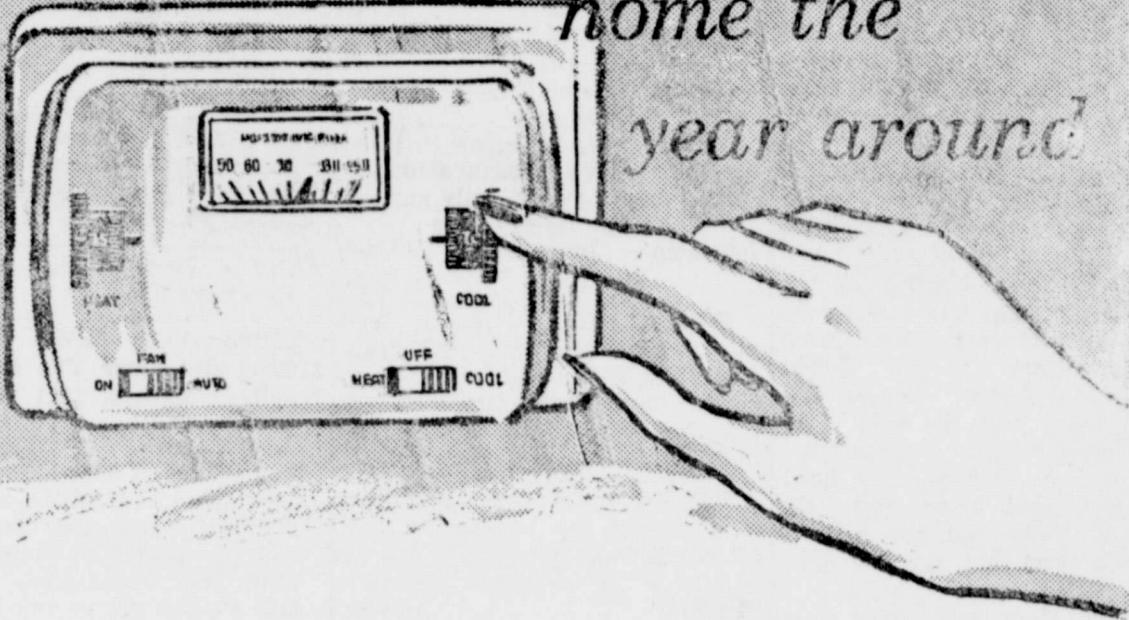

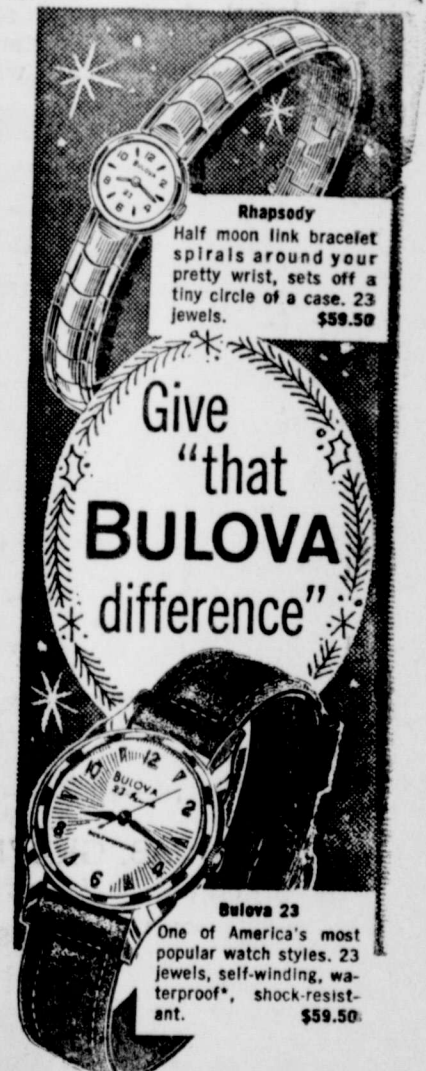

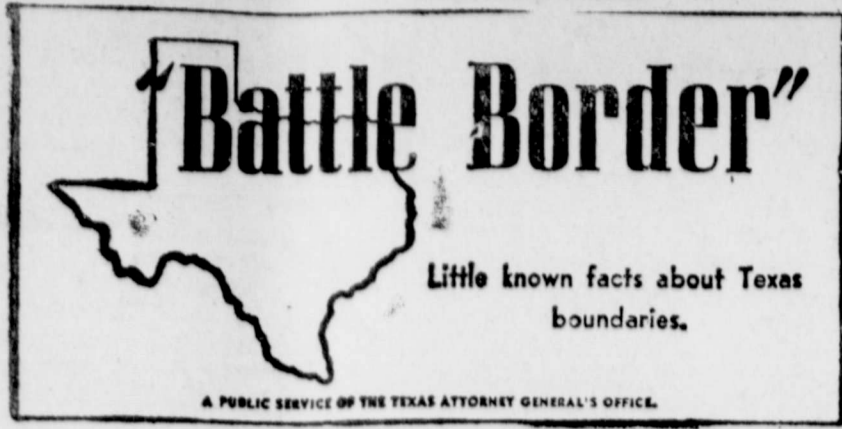

Then he turned southward to a point above th Canadian river where he had camped the winter before. Before he could finish that survey the Greer Couny controversy flared anew and he left the 10'rd meridian for the troubled 100th meridian.

In the meantime a survye of over 5,000,000 acre of land in Dallah, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Cochran and Hockley counties was made so the Capitol builders could pick their three million acres.

The Capitol Company dispatched Col. A. C. Babcock to Texas to make an on-the-ground inspection. The colonel proved to ze a real dude, travelig to Buffalo Spring in a four-mule "ambulance," bringing his own canned food delicacies. Cow chips became known as 'Babcock coal' in the high plains country," Wilson said.

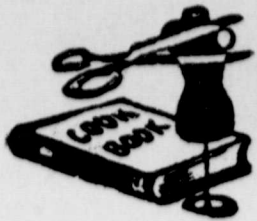

FOOD CHAIN STOCKS

Food chain stocks have been one of the poorest acting groups in the market this year with the majority showing substantial losses. While this has been the case, there is nothing on the

horizon to cause undue pessimism and it appears that the selling in these issues has been overdone. We recommend this industry as offering above average value in today's market and believe selected issues should be bought. Among those that appear attractive are: Food Fair (both the common and the convertible debentures), National Tea and Winn-Dixie.

Last year the food chain stocks were excellent market performers and by the year-end, most were making new highs. It is this fact probably more than any other that has caused this year's poorer than average market performance. By the end of 1958, many of these issues had outrun their near term market objectives and based on historical price earnings and yield relationships, stocks in the group looked high. Therefore, in 1959 investors had the alternative of holding these issues, where market action at best would probably only equal the overall market, or take profits. The latter proved to be the line of least resistance, and most food chains stocks fell 25% in value from the prices at the beginning of the year

Nineteen fifty-nine results for the industry as a whole will be at record levels even though the steel strike curtailed sales in certain key areas. These lost sales are lost for good. They are not deferred sales, such as the appliance industry might encounter by the strike. However, barring a few isolated cases, sales and earnings will be at a record. Next year, with a favorable economic climate expected, sales and earnings for the leading chains should be at another record for the first half and, while it is too early to predict, last half operations should also make excellent reading.

Looking further to the future, population increase alone should add 20% to food sales in the next ten years or 2% annually. On top of this, rapidly increasing standards of living will notably swell the dollar-volume going into consumer food purchases. One estimate is as much as a 40% increase from this source alone. Finally, only 37% of all retail food sales were handled by chains (11 stores or more last year), a percentage which will probably be increased significantly.

SCREWWORM DECISION

Despite an outstanding job in eradicating screwworm infestation in Southwestern states--Florida, Georgia, Alabama and part of South Carolina--the U. S. Department of Agriculture has decided against the same type of all-out campaign in the Southwest and adjacent Mexico at this time.

The main reason for the decision is the lack of natural barriers against the screwworm fly in the vast infested areas of Southwestern states and their Mexican neighbors just across the Rio Grande and the international boundary. The decision was confirmed in a survey recently completed by USDA personnel working in cooperation with the Republic of Mexico.

The eradication method used successfully in the Southwest was based on the release of vast numbers of sexually sterile screwworm flies to mate with native females of the species to produce eggs which do not hatch. The flies were reared in a laboratory and sterilized by exposure to radioactive cobalt.

The survey established that screwworms were able to live through the winter in about 70,000 square miles in Arizona, and 1,000 square miles in New Mexico. By contrast, the average overwintering area in the southeastern United States is less than 50,000 square miles.

Efforts to protect the United States and adjacent areas of Mexico from infestation from farther south would necessitate establishing some type of permanent buffer zone. On the basis of present knowledge, it was indicated that sterile flies would have to be continually reared and released in this zone with constant inspections and control of livestock movements.

The screwworm fly, a little larger than the house fly, attacks only the flesh of living, warm-blooded animals. The fly lays eggs in masses around the edges of wounds, the maggots or screwworms, hatching from the eggs, bury themselves headfirst in the wound, gouging out pockets by their feeding. An untreated wound may kill an animal in 10 days.

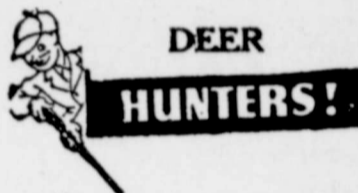
