The St. Lawrence Seaway seems to be doing very well, thank you! This joint enterprise of the Dominion of Canada and the U.S.A., already has indicated that the huge cost involved in its building, will turn out to be a sound

investment. In the current navagation season up to September 30, some 14,200,000 ons of cargo were carried hrough he St. Lawrence Seaway (from Monteal to Lake Ontario)... This represents an increase of 67 percent over the tonnage that passed through the old St. Lawrence canals for the time period of 1958.

For5 the month of September cargo carried though the feaway between Montreal and Lake Ontario amounted to 2,600,000 tons, 81 percent above September 1958.

As readers will recall, the Unied States procrastnaed about participating in this huge venture. It was not until Canada pulled Uncle Sam's whiskers a bit by threatening to go it alone that the U.S.A. finally decided to join hands. The success of the Seaway so far must be most reassuring to a formerly reluctant Uncle Sam. In turn, the Canadian authorities are to b commentide on their dogge determination and persistenc ein getting the Seaway under construction.

Once again it has been demonstrated that two peaceful neighbors by combining their efforts can accomplish much for the benefit of the citizens of both .. 69


