

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

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TRAILERS, 4,000 POUNDS UP MUST HAVE LICENSE TAGS: NEW LAW

License plates for farm trailers not used for hire are now available, Bob A. Lilly, Texas Farm Bureau legislative director says.

\$5 is the fee, and they're in the assessor-collector's office If you have a trailer 4,000 and 10,000 pounds gross weight, you gotta have 'em.

Speed with these is limited to 30 miles per hour, but exempts trailers up to 10,000 pouds gross from brake requirements.

If you fail to obtain tags, might be fined, and must then get a commercial license, and one for a 10,000 pound trailer would cost \$55.

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



Sponsored nationally by the National Safety Council, USDA this safety week is also suported by the Production Credit Association of Texas.


